

DUBOIS SUICIDES; WIFE'S BODY FOUND

HUSBAND HAD SLAIN WOMAN ABOUT AUG. 10

REMAINS REVEALED UNDER FLOOR IN BASEMENT

Plymouth, Mass., Sept. 16 (AP)—The body of Mrs. Edith Dubois, of Tuckahoe, N. Y., was found buried under the concrete floor in the basement of her summer cottage late today, five hours after her husband, Charles E. Dubois, 39, had committed suicide by shooting himself in a Quincy rooming house.

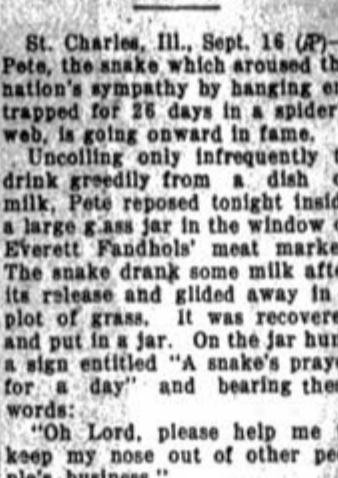
SOO MAN GUILTY OF MANSLAUGHTER

ROOSEVELT TO SPEAK TODAY

Germany Shuns Arms Meeting

Berlin, Sept. 16 (AP)—Germany, having turned her back on the world disarmament conference, will begin on October 1 to build her third "pocket battleship," another of the 10,000 ton cruisers said to be as efficient as a battleship of twice the size.

Within Treaty Limits

The tenor of the note was a reiteration of the German thesis expressed on several occasions by high government officials to the effect that Germany is willing to disarm to any level provided that the other nations reduce their armaments to the same point.

Orders to Build "Pocket" Battleship Given by Admiralty

The admiralty issued an order today for laying of the keel. A few hours later the government published the text of a note to the chairman of the disarmament conference notifying him there will be no German representative present next Wednesday when the conference is resumed at Geneva.

Malt Tax Money Helps Sanatoria

Lansing, Mich.—Approximately \$1,100,000.00 has been returned to the counties of the state since the present malt tax law became effective, according to Department of State records.

The law provides that the state pay \$1 per day per patient in county tuberculosis sanatoria. There are 44 such institutions in the state and funds from the malt tax have been divided equitably among the institutions. In addition, \$40,000 has been paid for the care of tubercular patients in the University of Michigan hospital.

The malt tax law also provided that after July 1, 1932, funds be segregated to provide \$400,000 for a second state tuberculosis sanatorium in the northern part of the lower peninsula. During July and August \$148,603 was placed in the sanatorium building fund.

Gar Wood Hopes For Good Weather To Better Record

Algonac, Mich., Sept. 16 (AP)—Hoping for favorable weather tomorrow morning, Gar Wood tonight announced that his Miss America X is in readiness for an attempt to set a new world's record over a mile straightaway on the St. Clair river near here.

The present record, 119.81 statute miles an hour, is held by Kaye Don, English pilot, in his Miss England III, Wood, who recently defeated Don in the Hargmorth trophy races on Lake St. Clair, must travel one half of one nautical mile per hour faster than Don's mark in order to be awarded an official record.

The course, one nautical mile in length, has been laid out in the St. Clair river at the north part of Algonac. Idis Porter, official timer of the American Automobile Association and representative of the American powerboat association, will be in charge of the electrical timing devices to record the two consecutive mile runs, one with and one against the current of the river. The average of the two runs will determine the speed of the boat.

Horseshoe Pitchers At the World's Fair

Chicago, Sept. 15 (Special)—Horseshoe pitchers of the Middle West are invited to compete for the championship of the Central States on September 22 on the Midway of a Century of Progress—Chicago's 1933 World's Fair.

The tournament is being held under auspices of the Exposition and under sanction of the National Horseshoe Pitchers Association, whose secretary, D. D. Cottrell of North Cohocton, N. Y., will be in charge of the national tournament on the Exposition grounds next year.

Champions of Ohio, Indiana, Illinois, Michigan, Wisconsin, Minnesota, Iowa, and Missouri will attend the meet, which will be called the Central States Tournament, to defend their titles.

Entry blanks have been mailed to more than 300 contestants in the eight Central states. In addition, the Illinois Agricultural Association is sending blanks to all members of farm bureaus in these states and will assist in running the tournament.

Any one is eligible to take part in the championships. Contestants may send their entries through farm bureaus or directly to Harvey J. Boone, at a Century of Progress, Burnham Park, Chicago, Ill.
