



cord and practical unanimity. For these things neither the president nor congress is entitled to exclusive credit.

"For the humanitarian part of this program," the speaker declared, "the administration has no credit. The provision for hunger loans and self-liquidating construction were exclusively Democratic origin and literally forced through over the administration's stubborn resistance."

"I say that if you balance the routine budget of ordinary expense and revenue, fairly and honestly and openly, and principally by the plan proposed in the Democratic platform of a 25 percent reduction in expense, then you will establish the credit of our emergency needs in this depression."

"After his resume of the congressional program, the speaker said: 'The Republicans claim the exclusive credit for the emergency laws of the last session. They list a lot of defeated bills and call them the 'Democratic program.' At Des Moines, it was said that Democrats controlled the policy of both house and senate. Now on this state of facts, I have only one appeal to make to the common sense of the country and that is a question: 'If the Democrats controlled the policy of both houses, how could the enacted legislation be the exclusive program of the Republican administration and the defeated bills the exclusive program of the controlling Democratic congress?'

**Not a Radical**

At the outset of his address, Garner characterized himself in this fashion:

"I know I have been represented in certain partisan argument as a dangerous radical, either without the disposition to understand great public questions or with a satanic desire to turn things topsy-turvy with some wild idea of destruction. Actually, I am a plain business man who has happened to have had a long legislative experience as a representative of a conservative community."

The speaker prefaced his discussion of the budget by saying:

"Let me take up perhaps the most alarming declaration that was ever made by a president of the United States. Let me give it to you in the president's own words, at Des Moines:

"The secretary of the treasury informed me, said Mr. Hoover, 'that unless we put into effect a remedy, we could not hold the gold standard but two weeks longer because of inability to meet the demands of foreigners and our own citizens for gold.'

"I can tell you without fear of contradiction that to say that we were within two weeks of the edge of the gold standard because of any lack of gold is a libel on the credit of the United States."

"Our country has been in a bad way. Like every other American who has faith in our institutions, I believe that we are on the way to recovery and that if we face the facts, that recovery will come much sooner than if we play a double game of subtlety and deception. Because of my position in the government I know there was never a warrant for saying that we were on the edge of financial collapse, world crash and government failure."

ure. The whole thing is absurd."

The first administration indictment against the Democrats, said Speaker Garner, is that the president proposed drastic economy and the Democrats forestalled it.

On February 11, last," the speaker said, "Chairman Clegg of the house ways and means committee quoted the secretary of the treasury as saying the very limit of further economy was only \$90,000,000, or two percent. This was the time the president says the secretary told him the end of the gold standard was two weeks away."

The speaker said the Democratic leaders conferred with Treasurer Mills over the economy measure and that "in a few days we got a treasury revision downward of \$240,000,000. From that moment the whole subject went into a state of constant flux and uncertainty. One private expert authority after another went on record that the treasury figures were a billion dollars out even after this revision."

The sheriff, once robbed a gasoline station conducted at Sagola by the Sawyer-Goodman company, but was freed when he made full restitution.

The Cootware family has resided in Sagola for several years. Mrs. Cootware, who is about 45 years of age, is believed to have become so worried by industrial conditions and the shortened working time at the mill that she resorted to the threat letters in a frantic effort to frighten the company into restoring normal operations and extending generous credit at the store.

As to any possible knowledge that Mrs. Cootware might have to who started the fire, the deputy fire marshal and sheriff stated:

"The most we can say right now is that the one letter written, of course, before the fire, predicted precisely what happened. The letter referred to fire as 'a friend of oppressed people.' Both letters were written on May 21, 1932. The fire came on August 4."

"Whether that may be indicative of a direct connection between the Cootwares and the fire we have not definitely determined."

**THOMAS LISTS AID PROGRAM**

Norman Thomas, Socialist candidate for president, said in an address for delivery at a mass meeting here tonight socialism offers the only "permanent plan" for stabilization of industry in which the workers would have "any measure of security."

"Unemployment, both technological and cyclical, is inherent in the capitalist system," he asserted.

He said the two major political parties "have done or proposed nothing adequate to relieve unemployment, much less cure it."

He outlined a program for relief of the unemployed, including:

- "1. A maintenance wage to heads of families and individuals for whom there is now no work."
- "2. The prompt provision of work by a housing program, rural electrification, building of roads, bridges, etc., reforestation and, if necessary, the putting of idle men to work in idle factories to provide for their own needs."
- "3. Federal initiative to provide funds for this—at least ten billion—because only the federal government can control currency and equitably tax income and inheritance over the whole nation."
- "4. A mandatory five-day week, six-hour day in industry."
- "5. Unemployment insurance, preferably federal, supported by industry and the beneficiaries of the profit system, the latter through taxation."

This afternoon at Manhattan, Kas., in the wheat belt, Thomas outlined his views of the farm situation, as follows:

- "1. Drastic tax reform for farmers."
- "2. Cost reduction to farmers by socializing the farm machine combine, etc., and by reducing tariffs."
- "3. Price raising for farmers by increasing the power of wage workers to buy, by socializing processing agencies, by creating a federal non-profit marketing agency, and by controlled inflation through our program of unemployment relief."
- "4. Debt reduction by the same process of controlled inflation, a moratorium on foreclosures, and a refunding and actual reduction of farm debt accompanied by a capital levy on wealth to meet the cost of this and other debt reduction."
- "5. National and regional planning for the most efficient use of land."

**NOTED FORMER ACTRESS DIES**

Miss Jessie Bonstelle Succumbs Unexpectedly in Detroit

Detroit, Oct. 14. (AP)—Miss Jessie Bonstelle, whose name for 20 years blazed in Detroit's marquee lights as a theatre director and owner, died here today, in the midst of a fight to keep intact her Detroit Civic theatre, one of the few such enterprises in the country.

A heart attack induced by a heavy cold brought death to the former actress, who in the past decade had become nationally known as the "Maker of Stars."

She had been in failing health since last spring, but death was unexpected.

Held in universal esteem and affection in Detroit, Miss Bonstelle, during her 22 years of active theatrical life in Detroit, developed such stars as Katherine Cornell, Ann Harding, Ben Lyon, Melvyn Douglas, Frank Morgan, Jessie Royce Landis and Minor Watson—all who served apprenticeship under her direction.

Organized Civic Theatre

In 1910, after successful appearances on the New York stage and successful management of stock companies in Toronto, Buffalo and Rochester, N. Y., Miss Bonstelle came to Detroit to open a stock company. She leased the old Garrick theatre, and her stock company appeared there for 18 years. Then, in 1928, she opened her own theatre, known as the Bonstelle Playhouse. Two years ago she organized the Detroit Civic Theatre, and fought a losing battle to keep it intact.

The Civic Theatre suffered with the legitimate stage, and despite the assistance of theatre-lovers in Detroit who contributed small sums, it was threatened with failure to open this year. Miss Bonstelle threw all her resources and effort into a campaign to keep the Civic in operation.

Despite an offer to open a stock company in Hollywood which would serve as a training school for motion picture actors, she refused to leave her "Civic Theatre," declaring she would "keep on as long as I can keep fighting." Her name was a tradition among Detroit's playgoers.

For a time she appeared in a radio drama, and recently assisted in the direction of a New York stage production at the request of her friend, William A. Brady, producer.

She was born near Greece, N. Y., but her age was a matter of speculation among her associates. She bore the theatre's traditional fear of "growing old." One member of her company said she was between 60 and 70 years old. Two sisters, Mrs. Georgia Raynsford, Detroit, Mrs. Ada Benedict of Rochester, N. Y., and a brother, Harry Bonstelle, survive. Burial will be in Rochester.

Telegrams and messages from actors and artists in all parts of the country flooded her home today, all mourning the death of "Bonnie," as she was known by friends.

**INSULL KEEPS U. S. PASSPORT**

Won't Be Turned Into A "Scamp", He Tells Consul

Athens, Oct. 14. (AP)—Reiterating his refusal to surrender his passport, Samuel Insull, former utilities leader wanted in Chicago to answer an indictment, declared in a letter to the American consul today that he would not be turned "into a scamp who can neither stay anywhere nor go anywhere."

He said he was "very much surprised" at the American state department's attempt to take up the passport, an action he interpreted as cancellation of his citizenship.

To the press Mr. Insull denied reports that he was planning to leave for Istanbul, Turkey. He makes his plans from day to day, he said, and so he did not know what he would be doing the next few days.

Denying reports that he had ordered Mr. Insull to leave Greece, the minister of interior said that on the contrary he had authorized a Chicagoan to remain here.

There was considerable speculation in Athens about the status of the Greek-American extradition treaty. Formal instruments of ratification of that treaty have not been exchanged. It appeared that even if these instruments could be exchanged immediately there would be local difficulties which might prevent making the treaty retroactive to cover the Insull case.

**Newberry Woman Fatally Injured**

Mrs. Eliza Heppie, 67 years old, of Newberry, was fatally injured Wednesday night when she fell down a flight of stairs in the home of her daughter, Mrs. Alice Thompson, of Big Bay.

Mrs. Heppie was crossing from one room to another in a hallway upstairs, carrying a lit lamp, and made a misstep which threw her off balance and caused her to fall down the stairs. She sustained a severe blow on the right side of her forehead and broke her right shoulder, right wrist and two or three ribs. The breaking of the ribs caused a hemorrhage, which hastened death. She died at 10:10 o'clock, 45 minutes after the accident occurred.

Coroner John Stiegel, of Marquette, who was called to the home of Mrs. Thompson about 4:30 yesterday morning, decided no inquest would be necessary.

Mrs. Heppie leaves her husband, August, and three sons, Roy, Melville and Floyd, all of Newberry, and two daughters, Mrs. Thompson, of Big Bay, and Mrs. Lucy Chapman, of Newberry.

Funeral services will be held Sunday afternoon. Burial will take place in the Newberry cemetery.

**Conservation Office Stays In Munising**

Marquette—In connection with the replacement of J. A. Vizona, of Munising, by Colonel William A. Bergin as chief of the state conservation field forces in the upper peninsula, the conservation commission has decided that the upper peninsula headquarters office will not be moved from Munising to Marquette.

George R. Hogarth, director of the conservation department, informed The Mining Journal yesterday that the office would remain in Munising and that rumors to the contrary were without foundation.

When the conservation commission held its meeting recently in Ishpeming and announced that plans were under way for a "re-vamping of the field force in the upper peninsula" it was understood that the commission had in mind the establishment of an upper peninsula headquarters office in Marquette. When Mr. Hogarth subsequently announced the transfer of Mr. Vizona to the land division of the conservation department in Lansing and the appointment of Colonel Bergin to take charge of the U. P. field force, he made no reference to the location of the headquarters office, but it was assumed in some quarters that the conservation commission intended to move it to Marquette.

W. H. Newett, of Ishpeming, a member of the conservation commission, said yesterday that the commission did give consideration to a plan of moving the office to Marquette, but that it was decided to keep it in Munising.

### Across Party Fences

(EDITOR'S NOTE: These parallel articles are the first of a series of 10 dealing with presidential campaign personalities in opposite party camps. Appearing daily, the articles will highlight the careers of each briefly and touch upon the roles each is playing in the political drama.)

Washington, (AP)—The war that broke over the world in 1914 limned into the ears of a bulky, busy and successful American in London a message that ultimately was to be blazoned large in the pages of history. For it came at a moment when Herbert Clark Hoover, Iowa-born adopted son of California, was planning retirement.

At 40 the man who was to be president, yet who never dreamed for himself of a political career, had reached a point where he thought of withdrawal to his campus home at Stanford, his California alma mater. For Hoover disliked travel; yet he roamed the globe as a mining engineer. He had no love for the sea; yet destiny chartered him a course that criss-crossed most of the seven seas.

He shunned speech making; yet was to know all the stress and turmoil of political campaigning. Four years as president have whitened the hair above Herbert Hoover's face, small featured despite his physical bulk. New lines have been cut deeply.

But though his public addresses rarely are accompanied by a smile it beams easily in private and when he is in his ordinary conversation.

Washington (AP)—When Franklin D. Roosevelt styled Alfred E. Smith the "happy warrior" of politics he voiced an expression that was long to outlast the presidential campaign in which it was used. For now as Roosevelt, the dem-

ocrat, battles for the presidency there are those who apply the term to him in token of his zest for political life.

From early manhood to middle age, when he achieved a presidential nomination, he has found a thrill in political life, tasted defeat apparently undismayed and endured physical misfortune with never a sag of his shoulders.

This spirit shows itself in the tones of his voice, in the smiling glance that accompanies his most serious words.

Few men have climbed to the height of a presidential nomination endowed with such capacity to enjoy it all, day by day, hour by hour, good news and bad news alike, as has this New Yorker.

When first he ran for governor, in a neck-and-neck struggle that a handful of votes might determine, he styled it as the count came in "an elegant horse-race." The game itself was worth playing to him, even if he lost.

### Use Care Packing Children's Lunch

An adequate and well-balanced meal is as necessary for the school lunch-box as the home luncheon. This meal must be a satisfactory supplement to the other two meals of the day and must be nourishing and inviting. If carefully thought out and planned the day before, there will be less confusion in the morning before school when every minute must count.

It is very easy to let school lunches become monotonous. Certain foods pack easier than others. It is true, but different combinations and changes can be worked out that will make the luncheon more interesting to both the packer and the child.

Careful consideration should be given to personal likes and dislikes. Neatness and order appeal to all children. Girls, little and big, like daintiness. Boys, on the other hand, scoff at this feminine trait and want big thick sandwiches, big thick cookies and so on through the list.

Another factor of importance is the age of the child. Children under twelve require a different sort of lunch than that planned for the boy or girl in high school.

If there is not a school cafeteria, a hot drink or soup should be carried in a thermos bottle. The hot food aids digestion and does much to relieve nerve strain. The sandwich is the mainstay of the lunch box and must be concocted to furnish much food value. Variety of breads as well as fillings make it possible to vary the sandwich from day to day.

Carefully wrapped celery, radishes, carrot sticks and hearts of cauliflower give balance to the meal by supplying bulk and crispness to a diet that is likely to be concentrated and soft.

Whenever meat is used in a sandwich, try to combine it with lettuce, grated carrot or minced celery. The combination gains both food value and piquancy. Fresh fruit always is suitable and desirable for dessert and is easy to pack. Individual baked custards and firm tapioca puddings can be used occasionally for variety. Cookies and cup cakes are popular and are easy to eat. Three or four dates, raisins, figs and well scrubbed prunes also will satisfy a child's natural craving for sweets and add nourishment as well.

The packing of the food in the lunch kit is of vast importance. There are so many attractive containers available at small cost that the task is lightened and neatness is assured. Well-wrapped foods stay fresh and appetizing, so use plenty of waxed paper, wrapping each article before putting it in the box. Put the dessert in first. Otherwise the box must be unpacked to reach the sandwiches and there is the possibility that the dessert only will be eaten and the rest of the lunch overlooked.

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EDITORIAL

BOARD MADE SAVING

THE Delta county board of supervisors did a good stroke of business at Thursday's budget meeting when it fulfilled its promise to the taxpayers to ease the burden that has been resting heavily on their shoulders.

The county tax levy has been set at \$179,000.57 as compared with \$229,656.54 last year, a savings of \$50,655.97. Most of the reduction was accomplished by a general lowering of salaries, which is in line with the economy measures that have been taken in commerce and industry.

Property taxes are still further reduced by the elimination of the county road tax, which levy amounted to \$73,499.70 last year. Funds for county road purposes will be derived from the state gasoline tax under the provision of the Horton act.

THE AIRPORT PLAN

FROM the standpoint of offering jobs to the unemployed and preparing for aviation needs in the future, the proposal of the county to purchase a site for an airport should receive general approval.

It was brought out at the board of supervisors' meeting that a 150-acre tract of land can be purchased for this purpose. It is located just west of the present airfield, and with the removal of stumps and some leveling off the county would have a satisfactory landing field, according to the report of Major Floyd E. Evans, director of the state board of athletics.

The present airport is in private hands, thus giving no assurance as to how long it would be available for use for aviation. If an opportunity should present itself to the private owners to dispose of the property for other uses it would be natural that they would do so.

The airport project can be launched without any increase in taxes. It is proposed to purchase the land at a reasonable figure and on contract. Money would be taken from the county park fund to make the payments.

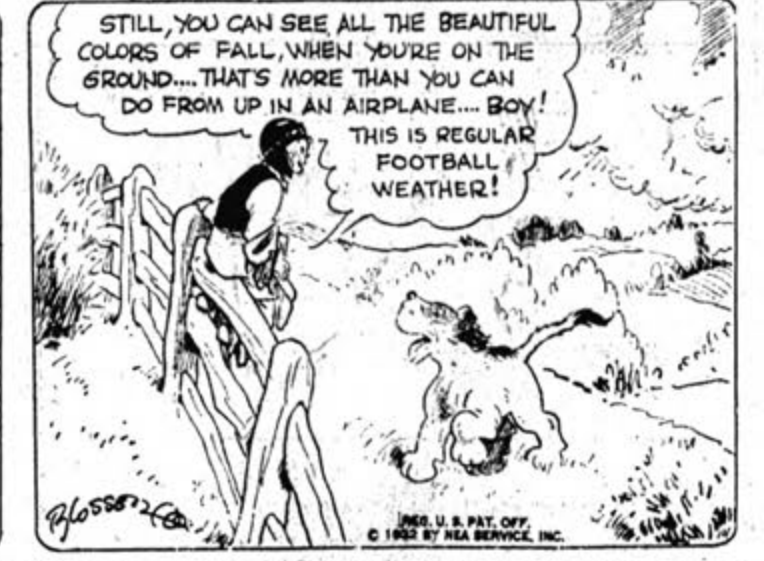

### Women In Thick Of Presidential Campaign Battles

Washington (AP)—For a woman's vote, much desired but hard to predict, both major parties in the presidential campaign are bidding their star feminine stump speakers.

The republicans, with Dolly Gann among the headliners, rely on an array that includes Rita Child Dorr, economic expert; Helen Varrick Boswell, whose political experience dates back to pre-suffrage days; Laura Ingalls, aviator; Florence Nash, actress; and Mrs. John W. Garrett, diplomat's wife.

They were proclaiming Herbert Hoover, "the same humanitarian who won the woman-balls in 1928."

The Democrats, through Nellie Taylor Ross, Ruth Bryan Owen, Emily Newell Blair and others are pointing to the Democratic claims made for Roosevelt in the field of welfare work.

The Democratic campaign is being made more colorful by such national figures as Mrs. Charles Sabin, organizer of women anti-prohibitionists, who speaks on the wet plank only; Labor Leader Julia O'Connor Parker, who participated in the Boston telephone strike; Mrs. J. Borden Harriman, Washington hostess; Rep. Mary T. Norton, of New Jersey; and Mrs. Henry Morgenthau, jr.

Mrs. Boswell, in charge of the republican women's bureau of speakers, recalled the campaign of 1900 in which the speeches, so few were the women in action, created much comment.

She said that the depression has brought women actively and vitally into today's politics.

She named Mrs. Garrett, wife of the Ambassador to Italy, willing to leave her luxurious Baltimore home for the rigors of campaigning; Mrs. Theodore Roosevelt, widow of the president; and Mrs. Ogden Mills, wife of the secretary of the treasury, and Flor-

ence Nash, the actress, a volunteer who never before this year made a political speech.

She reported Dolly Gann first among the Republican women in "audience interest" and Rep. Ruth Baker Pratt, of New York, next in demand, but available for only a few speeches because of her own campaign.

Very active also has been Mrs. George Wyeth, new president of the National Women's Republican club, and wife of the cancer specialist.

Owning and flying her own plane, Miss Ingalls has volunteered to trail-blaze for Republican women speakers.

Isabel Rhee Kappeyne, just back from Holland, was reported active among club women. Mrs. Edward T. Herbert was described as particularly effective among "southern-born women in the north." Mrs. Charles E. Gregory is listed as an able creator of pithy paragraphs for women speakers.

On the Democratic side, Mrs. Ross, ex-governor of Wyoming, the Democratic party's vice-chairman, is considered by her colleagues "a fact-handler, perhaps more than any other woman speaker."

Representative Owen of Florida, daughter of the late Williams Jennings Bryan, travels by plane to make many of her speeches, which Democratic friends regard as bearing the stamp of the Commoner's oratorical ability.

Demilitarist, brown-eyed Mrs. Blair of Missouri is fond of saying women should not be content to follow the pattern of men in politics. Her advice has been sought by women groups eager for her "specialized slant."

Yet there's really no figuring whose votes these women will win.

Men are asking to hear Dolly Gann. And a woman in Democratic headquarters said that when arguments from men had failed, Ruth Bryan Owen, in a radio speech, won her husband to Roosevelt.

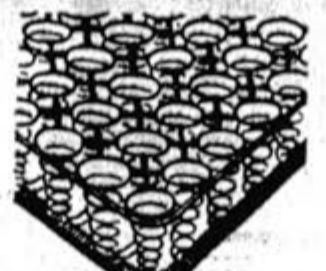

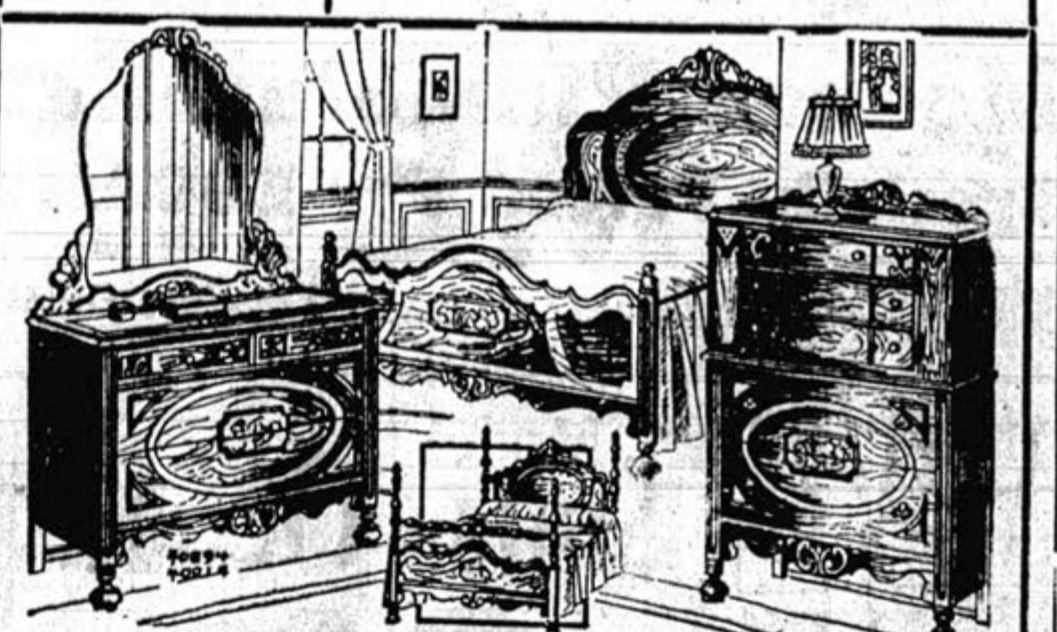

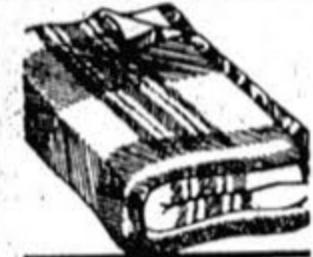

## New House Building Nearing Completion

Washington, (AP)—At a cost considerably below first estimates the new House of Representatives office building will be ready for occupancy with the turn of the new year.

While congress originally provided \$5,400,000 for the land and building, of which \$7,500,000 was for the latter, it is estimated now that the building's cost will be \$4,243,000.

Congress later acted to provide for purchase of the building's site just west of the present House office building and south of the Capitol, from the \$7,500,000 appropriation first set aside for the building alone. This was done.

To Turn Back \$800,000

Due to the lower total cost David Lynn, architect of the Capitol, expects to turn back into the treasury between \$800,000 and \$1,000,000. The saving is attributable to lower prices for materials than those expected in 1923 and 1924.

The furniture, for which \$400,000 was appropriated, has been contracted for at a cost of only \$174,000.

The new building, probably to be designated as "West House Office Building" to distinguish it from the building in use, has an exterior of Georgia marble on a base of pink granite from Maine.

The interior lobbies are lined with Alabama limestones, the court with Indiana limestone and the main corridors of Maryland marble. The roof is of copper.

Adds To Capitol's Dignity

Architecturally, the new building is in keeping with the present office building, and though of imposing dignity it adds to, rather than detracts from, the commanding Capitol.

Built on the west grade of Capitol Hill, in order to keep the height of the building on a level with the Senate and House office buildings, it was constructed seven stories tall at the west end, on the down-hill side, and only four at the east.

With 441,300 square feet of useable floor area, the building when completed will have 251 two-room suites for representatives, and 12 committee rooms.

## Ancient Romans Began Business Of Superstition

By MERLE OLIVER

Ann Arbor, Mich., Oct. 11 (AP)—Superstitions, which formerly influenced the entire life of man, still have an important part in every-day existence, according to Dr. Eugene S. McCartney, editor of scholarly publications in University of Michigan graduate school.

Dr. McCartney, who has made studies of superstitions past and present, says that almost four thousand separate superstitions were found in a single state (Kentucky) and that as large a number might be found in any other state.

In an article entitled "Folklore Heirlooms" Dr. McCartney mentions the rabbit's foot, number three, the owl, the raven, spilling salt, stepping over a broom as things associated with modern superstitions which also were known to ancient Romans and Greeks.

Uneven Numbers

Two thousand years ago the Romans used the foot of a hare as an amulet, and in the twentieth century we read that the captain of a university football team wore a rabbit's foot into action. The superstitious report is that, "you will have good luck if you wear the left hind foot of a graveyard rabbit, shot by a red-headed, cross-eyed negro in the dark of the moon."

"In an effort to appease the Gods after Hannibal's overwhelming victories," Dr. McCartney says, "The Romans in 217 B. C. vowed games which were to cost 333,333 1/3 bronze pieces."

The modern version is "three times and out," but the idea was old when Vergil wrote: "The God delights in uneven numbers."

"The superstition that stepping over a broom causes ill luck is old as well as it is widespread, since it existed among the Greeks," says Dr. McCartney. "Pythagoras warned his followers against stepping over this useful but dangerous object. The belief that it is unlucky to spill salt existed among the Romans."

Down through the ages the raven and the owl have been "messengers of death" to superstitious man. An owl sitting upon a house or other building for hundreds of years has been regarded as a reliable sign of death. Shakespeare in Macbeth referred to it as "the fatal bellman which gives the stern'st good night," and southern

negroes still fear the owl. The "fatal raven" has been reputed to bring equally doleful prophecies.

Less Potent Today

Dr. McCartney likens superstition to a stream of muddy water which occupied the whole channel of life in ancient times. "In the channel of modern life," he says, "superstition is making obstinate resistance to the encroachments of science, for it is fighting for its birthright, complete possession of the channel. This figurative channel may be compared to an actual one in Switzerland in which waters from glaciers and waters from lower sources race side by side for a considerable distance, with their contrasting colors indicating how much of the channel each occupies."

"In prehistoric times, however, the stream of superstition had undisputed possession of the entire channel. Eclipses, comets, thunder, earthquakes and all violent and unusual manifestations of nature aroused alarm in man. Even in the enlightened periods of classical antiquity there were doubtless thousands of persons

who were superstitious all day long, whether rising or dining, farming or fishing, staying indoors or going on a journey, saying prayers or mumbling incantations."

"Into the stream of superstition, which originally had no rivalry, finally a few drops of clear water began to trickle and gradually to increase in volume and make their presence felt. We find the Greeks and Romans expressing gratitude to the men who freed them from this or that superstition and marveling at their genius."

DON'T COOK TOO LONG

Long cooking toughens the fiber of cabbage, although the idea is prevalent that cabbage must stay on the stove a long time to become tender. Ten or fifteen minutes is enough for new cabbage. Half an hour is long enough, usually, for the oldest leaves. When cabbage has been properly boiled its texture resembles that of asparagus. Don't expect it to be soft as a boiled potato.

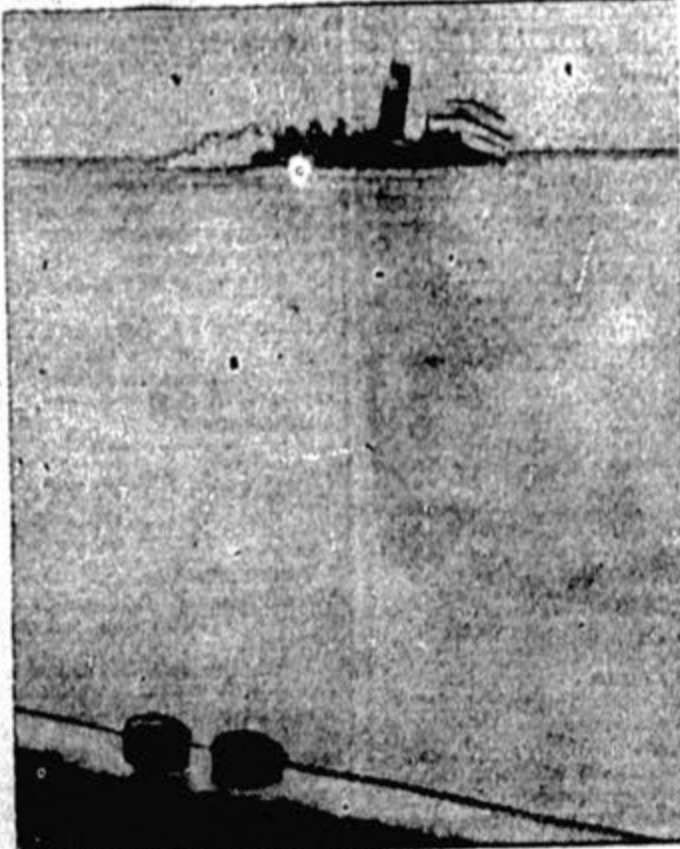

## Earl Carroll Serves His Girls With Dressing in Stage Comeback

New York—Drop him as you will, Earl Carroll has a way of bouncing back.

So here he is again, after travail and financial upset, adding more lights to Broadway and shouting that his new "Vanities" spectacle is in every way "bigger and better." Well, it is bigger.

Wherever he may get the money, Carroll manages to give the impression that he spends it with lavish hands and goes to extravagant limits. That his products could be in far better taste at half the cost is, of course, something else.

But Carroll is devoted to the visiting buyer from out-of-town, the uptown and side-street crowds of New York that want plenty of birthday cake scenery, the extremely tired business man, and a male audience in general. For whatever he may or may not put into his shows, he does get beautiful girls. He chooses this year to undress them less often. For the most part, the "Vanities" is costumed this time.

Fact is, the current edition is quite a different Carroll show. It is sort of international vaudeville revue. For Carroll went scouting over the globe, picking up this Frenchman and that Britisher and several other fellows. He even has a touch of the highest art, as displayed by Harriet Hector, the wire-like danseuse who has just returned from a long London season.

He has Milton Berle, a promising young master-of-ceremonies who has been fast growing up in the vaudeville sector; he has Will Fyfe, the Scotch comedian and a fine, old-time performer; and Helen Broderick, from the smarter revues; Lillian Shade, the blues singer; Keith Clark, a suave magician who deals in lighted cigarettes; Edwin Styles, a London comedian, and a list so long that it must help the theatrical depression.

Carroll's mechanical tricks are as interesting as ever: neon rods that light up for the chorines; scenery that splits many ways and lifts and drops and dissolves; staves that lower and rise; novelties of every sort.

Many blocks down Broadway, in the old Maxine Elliott Theatre, there is manna for the moderns, the thinkers and the satirists, the liberals, the smart crowd, the folk who take their minds and their smoots to theatre with them.

For John Howard Lawson is back in the playwright field, after many gold-lined seasons in Hollywood. And his play is "Success Story," done with something of the white heat and mockery and aliveness and tempo that marked his "Professional," which now holds quite a place for itself.

As the title suggests, it concerns a young man who becomes hero of the typical "success story," but doesn't know what to do either with his money or success after he gets them. He rises with quick bounds, taking whatever he seems to want with him. His love-life is messed up and in the end he is

## O. Henry's Widow Writes But Home Is First Concern

Asheville, N. C. (AP)—Although she feels that it is no more wonderful to write a good story than to bake a good cake, Mrs. Sara Coleman Porter is carrying on a writing tradition established by her husband, who brought the short story a new meaning.

Mrs. Porter, widow of O. Henry, is not writing short stories now, however. Her products are novels, and in her mountain home near here, where William Sidney Porter died, she is following her avocation.

Termed herself a "semi-professional," Mrs. Porter says her writing is not a vocation, that her home work takes precedence over her writing, and that a serial she is now doing is being done "on faith."

She regards "the writing urge" as similar to measles saying "both may crop out at any time." Her work, she says, does not resemble that of O. Henry, whom she characterizes as "almost incorrigible."

"That man was a law unto himself," she said, and added that "no one could manage him." He was modest and retiring, she explained and extremely reticent. He once was interviewed after he had dodged a reporter vainly and the next day the story heralded the fact that O. Henry was paid 25 cents a word for his work.

Asked by members of his family if that were true, he replied gloomily: "Yes, but right now I can't think of even one word."

Short stories, serials and two novels are credited to Mrs. Porter's name and now she is working on another she says will be called "Unseen Cables."

## Women Voters Aid St. Louis To Set Registration Mark

St. Louis (AP)—Campaigns by the League of Women Voters, the Chamber of Commerce and other organizations to encourage citizens to register for the coming general election has resulted in a 66 per cent increase over the 1928 registration in St. Louis, setting a new record.

In the four-day enrollment period this fall 356,037 voters were registered, compared with 361,968 four years ago. The latter figure constituted the previous high mark.

Small editions to the four-day totals are usually recorded in the final figures, after persons unable to register then are given a later opportunity.

Various wards of the city showed changes in voting strength ranging from zero to almost 25 per cent increase. One ward of the 25 enrolled exactly the same number as in 1928.

## Man Who Confessed Robbery Still Held

Flint, Oct. 12 (AP)—Police here are still holding Napoleon Partin, 52, pending an investigation of his story that he and four companions robbed an express car on a Southern railway train more than twenty years ago, obtaining \$190,000. Word is still lacking from officials of Jackson county, Alabama, where Partin said the robbery occurred.

## RAY FOR CANCER

Philadelphia—The discovery of a new ray was reported to the American Chemical Society by Drs. Ellis McDonald and A. J. Allen, of the cancer research laboratories of the University of Pennsylvania. This ray, which consists of ultra-violet light rays, is believed to be of great value in the treatment of deep bacterial infection and in the study of cancer.

## Swartmore Through Playing Grid Teams Of Large Colleges

Swarthmore, Pa., Oct. 12 (AP)—Swarthmore college football team will not meet the University of Pennsylvania on the gridiron next year, or "any other large colleges."

"We will stay within our class," said Dr. Frank Aydelotte, president of Swarthmore college, today as he also barred Princeton, Columbia and Army football teams. Dr. Aydelotte said Swarthmore and Pennsylvania decided "with the utmost friendliness" to end their gridiron series which had continued with certain breaks for 54 years.

Termed football "a manly sport," the Swarthmore president said he had no opposition to football when played on an "even, competitive basis."

"Our relationship with Pennsylvania has been ended," he said, "because both institutions realize that modern football has developed into a game which can no longer be played on anything approaching equal terms between large institutions and small."

Dr. Aydelotte's decision followed Swarthmore's 54-0 defeat by Penn last Saturday.

In all other sports such as baseball, basketball, soccer and tennis, Swarthmore will continue its relations with Pennsylvania and other large universities in the east.

## BEWARE—HESSIAN FLY

Washington—The Hessian fly, deadly enemy of wheat farmers, threatens to injure materially the 1933 wheat crop. Dr. Larimer, of the Department of Agriculture, says that the secret of the Hessian fly control is to time the planting so that the young plants do not come up until the adult flies have left flax-seeds.
