One of the unaccountable methods in the free trade proposals is the proposition to cheapen the necessities of life in this country, without reducing the wages of the laborers engaged in producing them. The necessities of life in this country are the food the workman eats, the clothes on his back, the carpet on his floor, and the dishes on his table—to which may be added coffee, tea and sugar. Professor Senior has pointed out the fact that the wages of laborers are highest when the laborer is employed in the production of the things which the laborer himself uses. The American laborers (with the exception of the coffee, tea, and sugar) make all these commodities now, and all of them which are consumed in the average American family are already as cheap in this market as in any other in the world. Taking the laborers together, they are distributed through these industries, and the wages are equalized as fully as the perfect mobility of labor between the different industries will permit. If wages in one industry are reduced, they will be reduced in all. Any injury to one class will be felt by all.

Commodities are as cheap now as they can be, unless they are cheapened at the cost of a reduction of the laborers wages. He cannot increase them except by the exercise of more skill or more effort. If clothes, and hats, and shoes, and carpets, and dishes are to be made in foreign countries because they can be made cheaper there, then the makers of these things, on the free trade economists' theory, ought to live in the foreign country. He must, therefore, under free trade either expatriate himself, or find "something else" to do, and make the things with which he can buy them.

Proper Care of the Eyes. In reading, says Dr. David Webster of New York, the book should be held at a distance of from ten to fifteen inches from the eyes. The reader's position should be such that the light may fall on the book, and not on the eyes. The light itself should be sufficient. Nothing is so injurious to the eyes as poor light in reading. Next to sunlight the incandescent light gives the best illumination for reading, and all notions of the injurious effect on the eyes of the electric light are erroneous. The reading while sitting in the cars should be avoided. The jolting and shaking of the train causes a great strain to the eyes and injures them. There is a great deal of popular prejudice against spectacles, but there are two good reasons why they should be worn, and only two. One is that we may see better, and the other that strain on the eyes may be relieved. The near-sighted child should wear spectacles, because they are the best preventive against the increase of his sightlessness, and also because he loses a great part of his education in not being able to see more than a few feet away. When a person grows old the power of accommodation is lost, and even if he be not nearsighted, the hardening of the crystalline lens prevents sight at short distances. This is why the majority of persons who wear glasses can see as well without them. They use them to avoid a constant strain on the eyes. The act of focalization is a muscular one and uses up nervous energy. The over-sighted eye, in which the focus comes behind the retina, has to perform this muscular act continually. The results are headache, irritability, and nausea. The only remedy in such cases is to wear glasses. For eyes in a healthy state pure cold water is the best wash. When the eyes are inflamed a weak solution of salt and water makes the best domestic eye lotion. Never apply poultices to the eye.
