



The production of this corn gave employment to more than 12,000 farmers and farm hands. From this corn about 300,000,000 pounds of starch were produced, 07-per cent, of which was consumed in this

ountry.

The present duty on starch is 2 cents a pound, The Mills bill proposes to reduce it to 1 cent a pound. Starch is sold by the manufacturers at a little less sold by the manufacturers at a little less than 4 cents a pound. It can be imported, duty paid 4½ cents a pound, If the duty language less a pound, in the duty language less than 6 imported for considerably less than American starcherán be made at the present price of corn and cost of labor.

The passage of the Mills bill would therefore, paralyze the American starch-making Industry, destroy the home market for 12,480,000 bushels of corn, and the employment of 14,000 to 15,000 and the employment of 14,000 to 15,000 persons engaged in producing corn and making corn into stairch in this country. When this was done, starch would-go up in price and all we should have to show for the "revenue reform" policy would be abandoned cornfields and starch mills.
