READ AND REFLECT.

The world's history contains the record of many smart, learned and diligent men who have made it the business of their lives to invent perpetual motion and apply it to practical uses as a motive power. Following the history of their career, we find them, in youth, bright and thoughtful; in manhood, morose and cranky; and later on in life, lunatics, and finally they disappear within the doors of mad-houses, and the world lags along without missing the wonderful benefits to be attained by perpetual motion. The philosopher with great assurance said that if a place was given him on which to stand and place his fulcrum, with a lever he would throw the world out of its accustomed track.

Free traders tell the American workmen if they will endorse the past history and present policy of the Democratic party and by their ballots continue them in power and control of this government, they will inaugurate free trade whereby workmen will have the benefit of the cheapest markets of the world in purchasing the necessities and commodities of life. With the assurance of the perpetual motion crank, Democrats tell us this will be the dawning of the millennium for American workmen. A large majority of these learned graduates of free trade theories discard them as impracticable or practicable only by a certain class of men who in times past were called freebooters, roppersheads, traitors, rebels and slaveholders. These men were never known to be the friends of labor or particularly anxious to emancipate the workmen from the serfdom of low wages or slavery. These men never championed the equal rights of men on forum platform or on the field of battle, but have waged war, pitiless, heartless, bloody war to perpetuate serfdom among their own race, and slavery of the Negro. These men are championing the cause of free trade today and want nothing protected but what they fancy their own interests. The Democratic party that has control of the affairs of this government, hold it by the strength of the party in the South that dictates its policy with the hope of agrarianism and the restorative and perpetuation of southern slaveholding ideas. They advocate free trade to the victor belong the spoils. Their ethics of government is founded on the efficacy of brute strength and the shot gun policy. Does the assertion in the legislative halls of this nation that the holding of human beings as slaves was a God given right to the southern people, and that they thought, acted and suffered to preserve the liberty to do it and the Angels looked down from Heaven and wept at their failure by force of arms to perpetuate this hell born curse on the American people, does the applause of the Democratic party at this boast indicate a working man's party? Does the fact that the old Roman of Democracy voted to pension Jeff Davis, the incarnate devil that sanctioned the murdering of Union soldiers in Andersonville and Libby prison by slow torture, indicate that the Democratic party is the friend of Union soldiers? Comrades, if these men are our friends, who are our enemies? If these men are the working man's friends, then he has no enemy but himself. Strip the cloak of sophistry and hypocrisy from the Democratic party and see how much is left to admire; how much there is left to tempt the workmen of this country to place their vital interests and sacred rights in his keeping.

ELECTION PROCLAMATION. STATE OF MICHIGAN, OFFICE OF SHERIFF OF STATE.

LANSHING, Aug. 20, 1888. TO THE SHERIFF OF THE COUNTY OF SCHOONER.

Sir:—You are hereby notified that the General Election to be held in this State, on the Tuesday succeeding the first Monday of November next, the following officers are to be elected: Vice-Thirteen electors of President and Vice-President of the United States; a Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Secretary of State, State Treasurer and Auditor General, Commissioner of the State Land Office, Attorney General, and Superintendent of Public Instruction; also, a member of the State Board of Education.

Section 4. The State shall be divided into judicial circuits, in each of which the electors thereof shall elect one circuit judge, who shall hold his office for the term of six years, and until his successor is appointed and qualified. The legislature may provide for the election of more than one circuit judge in the judicial circuit in which the city of Detroit is or may be situated. And the circuit judge of said circuit, in addition to the salary provided by this constitution, shall receive from their respective counties such additional salary as may from time to time be fixed and determined by the boards of supervisors of said counties.

Section 5. The State shall be divided into judicial circuits, in each of which the electors thereof shall elect one circuit judge, who shall hold his office for the term of six years, and until his successor is appointed and qualified. The legislature may provide for the election of more than one circuit judge in the judicial circuit in which the city of Detroit is or may be situated. And the circuit judge of said circuit, in addition to the salary provided by this constitution, shall receive from their respective counties such additional salary as may from time to time be fixed and determined by the boards of supervisors of said counties.

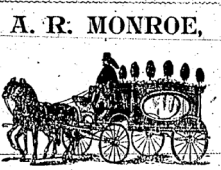

THE VOTES FIT THE MAN.

It is not surprising that a gallant soldier, like Senator Hawley should have warm words when speaking of Cleveland's pension vetoes. Any patriotic blood would boil when called upon to read the gibes, the sneers, the insinuations and the cheap wit in which these disgraceful documents abound. "I wish to God that every voter in the land could have a copy of these veto messages," said the Connecticut Senator. They certainly bespeak the character of the man in the White House. These veto messages are insulting and disgraceful in tone. Insulting to Congress and a disgrace to the high office of Chief Magistrate. In many cases they contain sentences that reflect seriously on both houses of congress, recklessly accusing the committees of carelessness and favoritism.

In other cases the statements made by the President are untrue. It is untrue, for instance, that the theory has been adopted that "any cause from which a man died was traceable to service in the army." These and similar insinuations are simply false. The language of former Presidents has been dignified and courteous said Senator Hawley. Cleveland, on the contrary, is coarse, vulgar and in some cases brutal. He sets himself up as a judge of petty facts of which he has no special knowledge, and acts on the assumption that there is no moral integrity left in congress.

Senator Hawley was none too severe. The President's 178 pension vetoes are a fair example of the petty spite and hatred of a man that was too cowardly to take his musket and go to the front, but hired a substitute and let that substitute die in a soldier's home.

It is a pitiful sight to see brave Confederate soldiers obliged to defend such messages as these.—Allegan "Journal."
