POLITICAL.

DEMOCRATIC PRO-WORK.—The Democrats held their Senatorial and Representative conventions here on Tuesday. That is, the party managers from Chippewa and Mackinac were here to administer the dose prepared by them weeks before, to their brethren of Law and Schoolcraft. Alger and Emmet Democrats did not come at the "sick call" to take their medicine. Chippewa and Mackinac had a "you-tickled-me-and-I-tickled-you" game to play. The first was to have the Senator and the other the Representative; the counterpart was to be Brown and Chambers. Law and Schoolcraft each had a candidate, and men, to that their endogamy and were the best Democrats in the district. But it was no use; it had been decided that the east end of the district must make the westerners, and they did. Schoolcraft's aspirant had no hopes upon his political character, except that last spring he went into a Republican caucus and aided in the nomination of a village ticket, and his friends here worked hard to get him nominated for Senator. Lawyer Smith made an eloquent presentation of his name and even the Brown men applauded his utterances. But it was of no use; the previously made compact could not be broken. Barney Blumerson received the vote of his county, two from Law, that had an eye to gain in the Representative convention, and one vote for pure friendship from Delta—seven votes all told, but the Brown ball contained 11 grains (votes) and that knocked Barney's Senatorial collar "higher than a kite." In the evening the other convention was held and the same game was played, but on different victims. The "flax" star was to be Chambers, of Lake; but Berlie, of Law, had been promised him in the past for services rendered and he must be got out of the way by a "solid" east confronting a shattered minority west. The majority speakers slaughtered Berlie all over with praises for his good works, but just now they wanted the other man as a candidate, and he must stand back. Schoolcraft's county that was going to be deeply reworked on Mackinac, got in a split kick giving Berlie two of its votes and these with his own county made him just four votes for the office for which he has been working for several years. Chambers got things having received the big nine and Schoolcraft's two. Taking it altogether it was a very fair convention, smooth on its face, but showing unmistakable signs of having been nicely set up beforehand. Our reporter was on hand and enjoyed the occasion very much, as it was rich all the way from Judge Sutton's introductory remarks to the eloquent misstatements made by the would-be Senator Brown. Schoolcraft Democrats have no rights whatever that their friends in the east seem inclined to respect. Personally we have nothing to say against the successful candidates. We have known them many years and are friends, but politically we are bitter enemies and such shall do all in our power to defeat them. They are not the men we want in the positions to which they aspire; their policies are rotten to the core. They may get the strength of their party in this race which, at itself will amount only to defeat, but still we don't believe it. The Republican ticket will be elected.

ELECTION PROCLAMATION.

STATE OF MICHIGAN, OFFICE OF SEC. OF STATE.

LAUNING, Aug. 29, 1888.

To THE SHERIFF OF THE COUNTY OF SCHOOLCRAFT.

Sir: You are hereby notified that the General Election to be held in this State, on the Tuesday succeeding the first Monday of November next, the following officers are to be elected:

Thirteen electors of President and Vice-President of the United States; a Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Secretary of State, State Treasurer, Auditor General, Commissioner of the State Land Office, Attorney General, and Superintendent of Public Instruction; also, a member of the State Board of Education in place of J. J. Jenks, whose term of office will expire December 31, 1888; also, a Representative in Congress for the 14th Congressional District of this State to which your county belongs; also, a Senator for the 30th Senatorial District, comprising the counties of Schoolcraft, Alger, Luce, Chippewa, Delta, Emmet, Mackinac; also, a Representative in the State Legislature for the Representative District, comprising the counties of Schoolcraft, Luce, Chippewa, Alger, and Mackinac.

You are also hereby notified that at said election the following proposition is to be submitted to the people of the State for their adoption or rejection, viz:

An amendment to Section 6 of Article 6, relative to Circuit Courts provided for by Joint Resolution, No. 11, Laws of 1887.

Section 6. The State shall be divided into judicial circuits, in each of which the electors thereof shall elect one circuit judge, who shall hold his office for the term of six years, and until his successor is elected and qualified. The legislature may provide for the election of more than one circuit judge in the judicial circuit in which the city of Detroit is or may be situated, and in the judicial circuit, the county of Saginaw is or may be situated. And the circuit judges or judges of said circuit, in addition to the salary provided by this constitution, shall receive from their respective counties such additional salary as may from time to time be fixed and determined by the boards of supervisors of said counties. And the board of supervisors of each county in the Upper Peninsula is hereby authorized and empowered to give and pay to the circuit judges of the judicial circuit to which such county is attached such additional salary or compensation as may from time to time be fixed and determined by such board of supervisors.

You are also hereby notified that at said election there will be submitted to the people of the State for their adoption or rejection a Revision of the laws authorizing the business of banking, provided for by Act 205 of the laws of 1887, in accordance with the Section 2, Article 15 of the constitution of this State.
