MEETING CLUB MEETING.

GRAND PARADE AND SPEECHES.

No Rest on Republican Arms!

Yesterday night being the time for the regular meeting of the Michigan Club, Commander Brown called out the 100th regiment for parade. Most of the "C's" was absent at another meeting. Companies A. and B. responded and marched through several streets, returning at a very handsome appearance. After the parade and a return to the Hall, W. F. Rigs, Esq., was called on and made a short speech, which was well received by the audience. The chairman then announced a speech from the man who wore the "blue" and has been a Republican since birth, A. C. Carpenter. Mr. C. spoke as follows:

"GENTLEMEN: The Democratic party of the North is a sympathetic party. It has never been blinded by terrors of sympathy towards the southern democracy. It is the interests of the North, and not the dictates of an honest confidence in the interests of laboring men that southern democrats have differed in calling mud-sills and clod-poles. Indeed laboring men have been the mud-sills upon which the Democratic party have built the structure of their party, but have laid no further part than carrying its burdens, holding up the edifice of democracy. It is a colossal monument erected by laboring men and their interests. They have never regarded the needs of laboring men any further than the success of the party demanded. They are not doing so to-day. They have not done so, until the prejudices could fossilize into auto-bellum days are haried, never to be resurrected. Never until such leaders of the Democracy as Thurman, Voorhees, Jackson and Jefferson Davis came to place the colored man in the category of animals, and treat them as such, as regards their rights as human beings and as citizens.

It may be that there are those who believe that these things have nothing to do with the political situation to-day, that it has nothing to do with laboring men and their interests. It is possible, and I know it is true, that there are laboring men that think with these statements that this should be a man's government, controlled and managed exclusively by white men. Oh, gentlemen, they are not in the majority. The colored men had no vote in this proposition to make them citizens. But a majority of the Anglo-Saxon race in these United States declared they should be free, and gave them the right of suffrage. We, the loyal citizens of a Republic, should bow to the will of the majority. It was after twenty years has elapsed, and the negro has enjoyed the rights of citizenship unmolested in two-thirds of the states of the Union we find it would be to the honor and credit of the Nation to have a government controlled by that man exclusively, why we repudiate all this legislation and delegate the Negro back to his former condition? That is what the chivalric southern Democracy propose to do, and do and abetted by their condottieri, Voorhees, Thurman, Cleveland and other leaders of the Democracy in the North. I can hear my Democratic friends say, "This is too rank." It is rank, it is a shame that it is true.

I propose to touch upon this mooted question of a free ballot, and a fair count, and the hearing that it has done upon the colored citizens of the south, but upon the laboring men of the north.

Whenever it is asserted by any one that there is not a free ballot and a fair count in the south, no matter how much it is backed up by facts and figures, our Democratic friendship is at stake. This is notoriously a democratic argument anyway, and a way they

have, and a method on which they claim the patent right of availing the truth. Nevertheless I propose to give you some figures in relation to this matter, from which you can draw your own conclusions, and I give you my word as a workman and not an office seeker or political wire-puller, that these figures are not taken from a campaign document but from authenticated statistics in reference to the matter, and I will only supplement this by reminding you of the fact, with which you are no doubt all familiar, that the number of representatives in congress from each state is controlled and regulated by the number of the voting population. That is, throughout the whole United States, a certain number of voters have the right to send a representative to congress; and the sum total of the whole voting population of the United States make up the number of representatives in congress, who make the laws and save or squander the people's money. This is why it is called a government by the people. Republicans want this kind of a government for the whole people, and we want the whole voting population represented without regard to class or color. This is of vital importance to laboring men in the north as well as south, which I think I can clearly illustrate before I get through. And right here allow me to say, I think it is of more vital importance to laboring men, than what both the Democratic and Republican parties claim is the main issue in this tariff for revenue, or tariff for revenue and protection. Free trade or protection—which is it? Here are compiled figures showing the number of registered voters and the number of votes actually cast in a few of the northern and a few of the southern states for the purpose of comparison. Now let us consider these figures:

Here is nearly 80 per cent. or half the votes in southern states not counted; 14 per cent. of northern votes not counted, granting the southern states a ratio of 25 per cent. of falling off for legitimate causes, 10 per cent. more than northern states. One-fourth, or 250,074 votes were deprived of the privilege of voting in these four southern states, but were counted for representatives in Congress. With these facts and figures before us, what is the reasonable and just conclusion? Here is practically the same state of affairs that existed previous to the rebellious regards representation in Congress; brought about and upheld by whom? In both instances by the Democratic party, south, aided and abetted by the leaders of the Democratic party north, and are urging from stump and platform the right to be called the workingman's party. How was slave holding states' representation in Congress regulated before the war? Three fifths of the male Negroes, over 21, in each congressional district were counted for representation in Congress. They were counted for representation, you understand, without the right to vote; no more right than a southern mule or north-ern ox. The southern was loth to give up this power. To-day, with the aid of his northern allies, he wields a greater power by the increased representation of calling every Negro vote a man and depriving him of his rights of manhood by the suppression of his ballot.

Gentlemen, I shall vote the Republican ticket until my vote shall be of equal value in sending representatives to Congress, as any Democrat that has had the doubtful honor of cracking his whip over a thousand slaves.

These are the principles that cost me the best years of my life—for which I surrounded my prospects of an education for a business life, and made me an old man at forty years; for I carried a musket three years in defense of them—from '62 until Lee surrendered at Appomattox.

I was a soldier. I can see a great many comrades who stood shoulder to shoulder with me in this great struggle for equal rights and a recognition of equal manhood. And I want to ask you if you are willing to forget the vicissitudes you underwent, the wounds, hunger, thirst, privations and the awful moments of battle when your dearest friends went down by your side pierced by rebel bullets, or were torn to atoms by the explosion of a rebel shell? I want to ask you if you can forget the horrors, the torture, inhuman, unrelieved and villainous treatment our comrades received in rebel prisons; when these chivalric southern gentlemen wantonly murdered Union soldiers by the score for spies, without semblance of martial or civil law—unless it be the trail of blood and put them on the trail of those attempting to escape, and allowed them to be torn and mangled by their bloodthirsty hounds when brought to bay? I want to ask you after all this, if you are willing to forget these horrors perpetrated by southern fire-eaters, and reward them with what they failed to accomplish in four years of heartless, inhuman, devilish, fiendish war against northern workingmen—reward them with supremacy in the affairs of the government?

Governor Foraker, patriotically said in his speech at Richmond, Indiana, that no man since the war closed has awakened so much the feeling of sectionalism and hatred between the North and South as Grover Cleveland, our Democratic President. And how has he done this? By surrounding himself with southern advisers, by toadying to the prejudices and interests of the south; by offering to return to them their cherished bait flags, thus awakening in the minds of the southern people tender memories of a lost cause; by awakening in the minds of the people south the idea that their cause was righteous, and they were only defeated by circumstances and overpowering numbers.

Why, southern orators, from southern stumps and platforms, are telling the people of the south that the names of Jefferson Davis, Roberts, Toombs and other rebel traitors as in the world's history yet unblurred, will be held in reverent remembrance, when the names of Abraham Lincoln, Grant, Sherman and Sheridan are forgotten. Not only this, but are advocating the introduction of text books in their public schools containing these sentiments, to perpetuate them and pass them down to coming generations.

Our Democratic friends tell us these are dead issues, and we should let bygones be bygones. We would gladly do it but their leaders won't permit us to. Senator Thurman, the nominee for Vice-President on the Democratic ticket, who is dignified by the appellation of "Old Roman," and made ridiculous by the rebel bandanna, cannot let bygones be bygones—cannot forget his old sympathies with the south and his old sympathies with the southerners, not even when he becomes Michigan to be seen and make a speech in Port Huron, those old ideas and sentiments that prolonged the war, must have been uppermost in his mind when he returned to the Negro as a when he returned to the Negro as a "prolific animal." Senator Thurman also says in his speech that he is willing to give the Republicans credit for all they did, but two million Democratic soldiers did something towards helping the slaves in this country. Though I think the Senator has got the number of Democratic soldiers too high, no one has ever disputed the fact that soldiers who were Democrats aid-

ed in preserving the Union and freeing the slaves. But why does he not go on and complete the story? Why does he not go on and tell the rest of the facts in connection with this matter; that the Democratic soldiers did not do this good thing for which their memories should be cherished in the hearts of American people, under or by the direction of the Democratic party? They did not even have the consent of the leaders of the Democratic party to marshal themselves with the hosts that were the blue, whom one of their number chose to designate as "Lincoln's hirelings." On the contrary they had to meet the opposition of those leaders in the Democratic party, who believed that laboring men should be held as chattels, and treated like dogs.

Mr. Thurman himself was one of those leaders, and what he believed to be true then he believes to be true to-day; and is too honest to conceal wholly his innermost thoughts and convictions. He and the leaders of the democracy then, recognized in Abraham Lincoln, only a mighty tyrant; and the Union army as a horde of criminals. Do you want proof of this? Read the Democratic platform of 1864. Yes read the platform of the Democratic party for 1864, a document that was the foundation of a contemptible attempt to compel the Union army to surrender its victories and admit the war a failure. An attempt to make the loyal soldiers of the north to admit defeat when the hydra-headed monster rebellion was writhing in the last throes of ignominious death.

When northern workingmen had about completed the lesson to southern aristocrats and fire eaters, and taught them that the south was not invulnerable or the doctrine of secession and human slavery infallible. Now, after a quarter of a century has passed away, the leaders of the Democratic party of the north to-day, Thurman, Voorhees and their allies have the hardihood to assert in legislative halls and other public places that they were then the friends of the Union soldier and wage earners and have since, ever renouncing their friends, and claim to represent a workingman's party. Is any gentleman that such a workingman's party as these facts and figures disclose, should be relegated to oblivion, ignominy and defeat by the workingmen of the loyal north next November.

Though, the Democratic party have been boisterous and loud in their denunciation of what they call the republican fraud of 1876, in seating in the presidential chair, Rutherford B. Hayes. In the light of facts, the frauds perpetrated upon the people by the seating of Grover Cleveland, the Democratic incumbent are, as mountains are to mole-hills in comparison. A solid south, made solid by fraud, intimidation and treachery, aided by the great Civil service reformer, George William Curtis, consummated the achievement long hoped for by the Democrats and gave the country a Democratic president, Grover Cleveland, with honeyed words and promises, with which he is always loaded, won to his support this latter faction, and all men, that have the good of the country at heart, hoped to see him in a measure, at least, obey the teachings of his early childhood; as I am told, his parents were pious people, and undoubtedly he had read the heroic incident in the life of a former president, when he said, "Father I cannot tell a lie, I did it with my little hatchet."

Cleveland with the enthusiasm of an earnest reformer, declared himself irrevocably opposed to the spoils system, in the distribution of office in the public service, but ere half his term has expired the ruling machine, that he so emphatically denounced, to secure votes, becomes the ruling machine in his administration. And gentlemen, one-half of the post-offices in the

country are typical illustrations of Petroleum V. Nasby's post-office at Kentucky crossroads, to-day.

What shall I say about President Cleveland's veto of pension bills for the relief of destitute Union soldiers? If these vetoes had been made in a manly spirit without voluminous comment for their justification, and he comes the head of this government as the justice and equity of the bills in question, I would hesitate to say anything in condemnation. But President Cleveland does not do this; but descends from his high position, as Chief Magistrate of this Nation, down to the level of a common black-guard, and stoops still lower to ridicule men for ever having worn the blue uniform of a Union soldier or sat with his feet in the stirrups of a military saddle? Gentlemen in my opinion, if the pensioning of soldiers rested with President Cleveland, there would be non-pensioned but those who wore the gray uniform of the democratic soldiers in the south south.

In conclusion I would ask you to preserve the liberties of working men, north and south, and the rights, honor and credit of old veterans by voting Cleveland out—the Democratic party and policy, on the sixth day of November next.

TRI-WEEKLY PIONEER.

Talks on the Tariff.

"I was in Detroit, Mich., in 1870," said Hon. John F. Scamman of Chicago, to a "Press" reporter a few days ago, "and I thought I would test the results of protective tariff and revenue tariff or free trade in their application as illustrated by the conditions of Canada and the United States at that date when we had the highest protective tariff we ever had, and Canada had a large free list and her highest tariff was not over ten percent.

"I went over to Windsor across the river from Detroit on Sunday, and tried to find some one who speak favorably for that country. In the suburbs of Windsor I found an English-Canadian. It was Sunday. He was dressed in free trade clothes, patched overall trousers, no coat. He was smoking a clay pipe and was perched on a rail fence. Saluting him, I asked how times were.

"Times are very poor." "How do you account for it?" "Well, two out of three of our working people are going over into the States where they can get \$1.75 per day and plenty work, while we can get all the men we want at this side for \$1 per day."

"What is your business?" "I am a vegetable farmer."

"Where is your market?" "Over in the States."

"If the United States were removed or closed to you, would you have any market?"

"No; we would only be raising enough for our own families."

"What do you pay for taking your goods into the States?" "From ten to fifteen per cent. on vegetables and grain, twenty-five per cent. on stock."

"You pay that out of your pocket, for some free traders over in the States tell us that we pay that duty."

"Well, I wish they would show me how it is done, for I have to pay the cash out of my pocket before I can land my goods in your market."

"Going down on the river front I visited a sulphur spring that the proprietor had erected a hotel near by. I asked him how much he valued his land, spring and hotel at."

"About \$5,000." "How much will you give me if I remove your spring, hotel and land over into the States, which was about a mile distant." "I will give you \$5,000, and I will make \$5,000," answered the proprietor.

"Now, here," said Mr. Scamman, "is the lesson I want to draw from my experience. Here were two countries lying side by side; the one was free trade, the other high tariff, and the prices for labor, land and all products were over 100 per cent. better, and the same was the case with the home market."

"Here were all the requirements that go to make up our civilization healthier in a protective tariff country than a free trade country, each having the same natural surroundings. Under such circumstances it is only fools that would favor free trade."—"Press."

ELECTION PROCLAMATION.
 STATE OF MICHIGAN, OFFICE OF SEC. OF STATE, Lansing, Aug. 23, 1888.
 TO THE SHERIFF OF THE COUNTY OF SCHOOLCRAFT:
 Sir:—You are hereby notified that at the General Election to be held in this State, on the Tuesday succeeding the first Monday of November next, the following officers are to be elected, viz: Thirteen electors of President and Vice-President of the United States; a Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Secretary of State, State Treasurer, Auditor General, Commissioner of the State Land Office, Attorney General, and Superintendent of Public Instruction; also, a member of the State Board of Education in place of their predecessors whose term of office will expire December 31, 1888; also, a Representative in Congress for the 11th Congressional District of this state in which your county is embraced; a Senator for the 30th Senatorial District, comprising the counties of Schoolcraft, Alger, Chippewa Delta, Emmet Mackinac; also, a Representative in the State Legislature for the Representative District comprising the counties of Schoolcraft, Alger, Chippewa, Alger, and Mackinac. You are also hereby notified that at said election the following proposed amendment to the Constitution of this State will be submitted to the people of the State for their adoption or rejection, viz:

An amendment to Section 6 of Article 6, relative to Circuit Courts provided for by Joint Resolution, No. 11, Laws of 1887.
 Section 6. The State shall be divided into judicial circuits, in each of which the electors thereof shall elect one circuit judge, who shall hold his office for the term of six years, and until his successor is elected and qualified. The legislature may provide for the election of more than one circuit judge in the judicial circuit in which the city of Detroit is or may be situated, and in a judicial circuit, the county of Saginaw is or may be situated. And the circuit judge or judges of said circuit, in addition to the salary provided by this constitution, shall receive from their respective counties such additional salary as may from time to time be fixed and determined by the boards of supervisors of said counties. And the board of supervisors of each county in the Upper Peninsula is hereby authorized and empowered, to give and pay to the circuit judges of the judicial circuit to which such county is attached such additional salary or compensation as may from time to time be fixed and determined by such board of supervisors.

You are also hereby notified that at said election there will be submitted to the people of the State for their adoption or rejection a Revision of the laws authorizing the business of banking, provided for by Act 205 of the laws of 1887, in accordance with Section 2, Article 15: of the constitution of this State.
