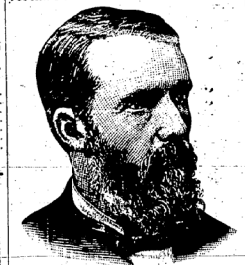

Samuel M. Stephenson was born in the Province of New Brunswick in 1831. In 1846 he came to Delta county, Mich., locating first at Flat Rock, near the present city of Escanaba. He engaged in lumbering and in 1856 came to Menominee, where he became interested with Abner Kirby, of Milwaukee, in the lumbering business. The firm was then and is still known as the Kirby, Carpenter Co. In 1877 he was in the legislature, and afterwards served three terms in the state senate. Mr.



Stephenson has filled numerous positions of honor and trust, and has always proven himself to be the right man in the right place. Four years ago he was selected by the state convention as an alternate to the republican national convention, and this year he was elected as a delegate. The first seventeen years of Mr. Stephenson's life were spent in New Brunswick and Maine. He came west forty-two years ago and worked for Jefferson Sinclair, one of the old-time lumbermen of the Escanaba river. After a year's experience in the western wilds, he returned to Maine, worked in the woods and in the spring helped to drive the winter's log cut down the St. John's river. He then came west and has since then made the upper peninsula his home. He is a man with a clean record, and whatever he believes and whatever he does, he believes and does with all his might and with all his soul.

A TRUE FRIEND.

In the year 1884, when the K. O. L. were organized, one of the first to join the order was Henry H. Aplin. Soon after the organization of the order, that is, in 1885, the celebrated strike of the mill hands in the Saginaw Valley took place. What promise was in the outset to be a short struggle, became through the obduracy and the wealth of the mill owners, a protracted one. Both sides were determined and eventually they became somewhat bitter. War to the knife was declared. And especially bitter were the mill-owners towards all who were assisting the men in their stupendous struggle. They threatened every merchant who would furnish money or food to the strikers with a withdrawal of their patronage.

The natural result was that many good friends hesitated to aid the strikers either by word or deed. One by one, even their aid and countenance dropped off. It was a time that "trial men's" souls.

In the meantime, the little savings of the men had been exhausted, their credit was exhausted, and their children were crying for bread.

Their cause seemed doomed to an early and disastrous defeat. It was the good will of the community could be openly avowed and substantial aid given.

It was at this time—a time when it required great courage to do so—that Henry H. Aplin stepped into the breach. Entirely neglecting his business for the time being, he set himself at work to organize a systematic and thorough canvass of the city of that day City for assistance. The result was magical. Supplies came in so fast that no laboring man's family in this city need go to bed hungry.

And when even that source of supply was seemingly exhausted, then it was that he cheered them up to renewed hope and activity.

"Boys, don't surrender! Victory is ours! Stand by your guns! I will see that rations are sent to you every week as long as the strike lasts and so long as you have a dollar in money or credit." In pursuance of his assurance he contracted a debt of \$800, and rations were issued regularly every Saturday evening to every head of a family who was out of work. Of the above amount all but \$300 was repaid by Mr. Aplin by the K. O. L.

And what was the result of the strike? Every laboring man knows it. The men got all they asked for, viz: ten hours a day and no reduction in pay.

It requires no great thinker to see from the above simple facts that this happy result was very largely due to the indefatigable efforts and unselfish devotion of Mr. Aplin.

For was the aid in the strike the result of his sympathy. When, later on, the organ of the K. O. L. was in danger of collapsing, Mr. Aplin came to the rescue and loaned \$400 to tide it over its financial difficulty.

There was Mr. Aplin's charitable and open only to those who were members of an organization, but every deserving poor man who came to him received not only kind words, but also substantial assistance. No one was ever known to go away empty-handed.

Mr. Aplin's aid to the cause of

labor has not been confined to the Saginaw Valley either. Since his accession to office he has given substantial aid to many struggling labor papers and to individuals, among others the "Advance and Labor Leaf," which received the printing of the tax list in 1887, against the protests of the party organ, which went so far as to vow vengeance on him for withdrawing so much "pap" from it.

In his appointments, too, Mr. Aplin has sought out some of those who were without any influence of the kind which usually obtains preferment.

For these reasons alone he is entitled to the hearty support of every honest man, without respect to party affiliation. The objections of both the Republican and Democratic party organs to him must show everyone that Mr. Aplin has steered that middle independent course which a State officer should. If an officer is to be elected merely because he will use all his powers of patronage in the interests of the party which elects him, irrespective of his duty to the public, then the organs may be right in their opposition to him, but if it is right to recognize every element which makes up the public, and not a narrow section of it, then Mr. Aplin has done the fair thing and should be supported.

The result of his large-heartedness is plainly seen in the whole state, but especially in the Saginaw Valley. There is no laboring man but loves him. And we feel they will show their regard by an increased majority for him at the coming November election, and that the last majority of 16,521 will be largely exceeded in 1888. —Onward.

Two Boats Each Week.—Mr. Huson,
of the Goodrich Transportation Com-
pany writes: "I have under the
steamer Ludington will leave Chicago
every Saturday night and Milwaukee
every Sunday morning for Manitowish,
Thompson, Garden and Payette, etc.,
and all points touched by the De Pere,
via Green Bay. Also touching at all
west shore points the Ludington
will be in addition to the De Pere—
this will make two boats each week.

Not only the G. A. R. but the whole
country ought to be indignant over
the black flag order issued by direction
of the return of War Soldiers, requir-
ing that crippled soldiers and widows
and orphans shall be dismissed from
every army and arsenal of the
United States and Democrats put in
their places. This infamous order is
utterly without precedent in the
American history.

The army, the
troops, arsenals, armories and military
grounds of the United States have
always heretofore been considered
non-political. This order not only
raises the black flag of a war of exter-
mination upon faithful old soldiers,
but also upon widows and orphans of
Union soldiers, and for the openly
expressed purpose of putting Demo-
cratic politicians in their places.
The order reads as follows:

ORDINANCE DEPARTMENT, WAR DEPT.,
WASHINGTON, D. C. JUN. 4, 1898.
[PRESIDENTIAL]

To the commanding officers of all of the
National armories at Springfield,
Mass., and Rock Island, Ill., and of
the United States arsenals at—New
Troy, N. Y., Philadelphia, Pa., Bos-
ton, Mass., Benicia, Cal., etc.:

—That while arsenals, and the
armories are not intended to be con-
verted into political machines, two
political parties are recognized. It
is therefore ordered that hereafter, in
employing and discharging employes
in any and all grades, other things
being equal, and qualification satis-
factory, Democrats will be favored,
the object being to divide the force in
the different grades gradually between
Democrats and Republicans. This
rule will apply to women and children,
as well as to men and will be strongly
enforced.

—Resp., your obedient servant,
"St. V. BERRY,
"Brigadier-General, Chief of Ordnance,
United States Army."

Gen. Bennet, being questioned, said
that the order was issued by the per-
sonal direction of Secretary of War
Elliott. The Senate is very prop-
erly taking steps to investigate the
matter. Gen. Bennet also said that
the officers of the arsenals and armo-
ries had written to him saying that
the Democrats already have been
given a majority of the places.—Lan-
