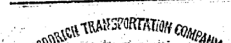

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ELECTION PROCLAMATION.

STATE OF MICHIGAN. OFFICE OF THE CLERK OF THE SUPREME COURT.

To the Sheriff of the County of Schoolcraft:

You are hereby notified that at the General Election to be held in this State on the Tuesday succeeding the first Monday of November next, the following officers are to be elected, viz: Thirteen electors of President and Vice-President of the United States; a Governor or, Lieutenant Governor, Secretary of State, State Treasurer and Auditor General, Commissioner of the State Land Office, Attorney General, and Superintendent of Public Instruction; also, a member of the State Board of Education in place of Bela Jenks, whose term of office will expire December 31, 1892; also, a Representative in Congress for the 11th Congressional District of this State to which your county belongs; also, a Senator for the 22d Senatorial District, comprising the counties of Schoolcraft, Alger, Luce, Chippewa Delta, Emmet, Mackinac; also, a Representative in the State Legislature for the Representative District, comprising the counties of Schoolcraft, Luce, Chippewa, Alger, and Mackinac.

You are also hereby notified that at said election the following proposed amendment to the Constitution of this State will be submitted to the people of the State for their adoption or rejection, viz: An amendment to Section 6 of Article 6, relative to Circuit Courts provided for by Joint Resolution, No. 11, Laws of 1887.

Section 6. The State shall be divided into judicial circuits, in each of which the electors thereof shall elect one or more judges, who shall hold their offices for the term of six years, and until his successor is elected and qualified. The legislature may provide for the election in more than one circuit the judge in the judicial circuit in which the city of Detroit is or may be situated, and in the judicial circuit, the county of Saginaw or may be situated. And the circuit judges or judges of said circuit, in addition to the salary provided by this constitution, shall receive from their respective counties such additional salary as may from time to time be fixed and determined by the boards of supervisors of said counties. And the board of supervisors of each county in the Upper Peninsula is hereby authorized and empowered to give and pay to the circuit judges of the judicial circuit to which such county is attached such additional salary or compensation as may from time to time be fixed and determined by such board of supervisors.

You are also hereby notified that at said election there will be submitted to the people of the State for their adoption or rejection a Revision of the laws authorizing the business of banking, provided for by Act 205 of the laws of 1887; in accordance with Section 2, Article 15; of the constitution of this State.

EARLY REMINISCENCES.

CONNECTED WITH THE SETTLEMENT OF THIS COUNTY. BY SAMUEL HAYNES.

The following is one of many letters that were written from Mr. Hayes, who was a pioneer here from October, 1822, to 1832.

MEMBERS OF MONSIEUR IN 52 & 53.

The Indian village was on Indian Lake, on the north side of the outlet. There were some eight or ten families here, numbering about fifty persons. Remember the names of some of the persons. The Chief Ossawinukoo and Sandy called him Widder Machie (as a name). At that time, I should judge, he was 50 years of age; of medium stature, and ordinary appearance. I recollect nothing about his appearance or bearing that would cause anyone to pick him out of a crowd as a superior being. Yet, as I remarked in a former letter, he was the dentist, or at least the tooth-puller, for the whole northern peninsula of the state of Michigan, and he could pull a tooth out not without—at least dispatch for a quarter). He often came to my boarding house at the head of the lake and asked Old Sandy for something to eat. (The boarding house stood at the north end of the bay, about 100 feet from the water's edge, and from it the view south was directly across the outlet of the bay into the lake between the wooded front on the left and the sand hills on the right. Old Sandy generally growled, and grumbled, and swore, but the effect of the provender to fill his stomach was all the same; for Sandy said that he "kinder hated" to send his wife away hungry. They would come alike, too, for Old Sandy had more beard on his face than a woman.

One day the chief came to the house for his dinner. His face was painted in the highest style of Indian art—black and spots the size of a half dollar decorated both cheeks and forehead, and one might say, his whole countenance. Old Sandy took a good look at him and, with an intense expression of disgust on his face, burst forth: "Now, you see, if you think you look as pretty as that, you had better go and drown yourself, for you would look a kinder sight better dead than alive." These playful remarks of our chief did not seem to dismay or even offend the great Ossawinukoo, and in a few minutes he was industriously stuffing himself with beans, bread and

Kenosha (pickarel) was the oldest Indian in the village and was, to my mind, the typical Indian—very tall, neat and spare, with his long black hair and piercing eyes. He seemed to young men to be the incarnation of the Indian spirit and ferocity; but he was not at all fierce, only in looks. He was a very mild-mannered, old man, honest, a teetotaler as regards strong drink, and was much respected by all, both white and red men. I never saw him walk more than a few steps at a time—always the Indian way, or lope—and he would ridicule, in his Indian way, any person who would walk slowly or in a lazy manner.

I believe that there were no drunken Indians at the village at that time but one, and his name was Agawattah (Old Sandy called him Aquafortis), and he was rarely under the influence, probably on account of the scarcity of opportunities. There were several Indians whose names I do not remember. There were two young men who made Mackinaw boats, and first-class

In the spring many Indians came from the Beaver Islands to fish. They camped on the east side of the bay and stayed two or three weeks, catching and drying fish.

The Montisique Indians were Catholics and were visited once a year by a French priest from Cross Village, on the north shore. He came with three Indians in a boat and after a short stay, went up the lake to the Bay DeNoquet to visit other tribes or villages. Ossawinukoo always devoutly crossed himself, after sitting down to the table, before eating. While the priest was at Montisique he was looking about the

saw mill, and in talking with different ones he accosted one of the men (Tom Evans, a short stub of a Welshman with a big coarse voice), in French. "What?" answered Tom. "Oh, I thought you was a Frenchman," said the priest. "Hell!" said Tom. "Do I look like a Frenchman?" The conversation between the reverend father and the irreverent Tom terminated abruptly. I talked with the priest a short time and recollect him as a very pleasant and agreeable gentleman, with a strong French accent. During the rebellion I saw a company, or more, of Indians belonging to the 27th Michigan infantry, and I understood that they were from the northern peninsula. They carried their knapsacks—not like white soldiers—but like Indians—with the strap across their foreheads.

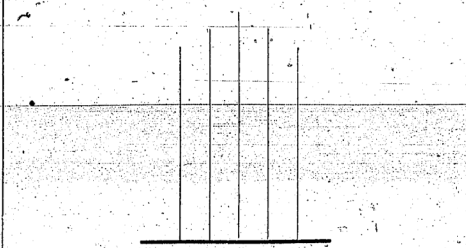

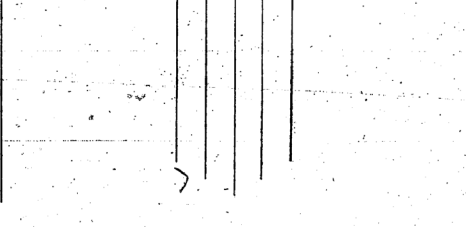
