THAT SPEECH.

Tuesday evening when the door of the rink swung to let your reporter in he found a disappointed looking lot of Democrats trying to appear interested in what a speaker (who bears the distinguished name of Brown) was saying. This was the meeting last night of Detroit, was to speak to some Democratic friends disappointed in people sometimes.

Will Brown was doing his best to make a speech, and the utterance that brought forth the greatest round of applause was when he spoke of that greatest of statesmen, James G. Blaine, as the magnetic man. Then he tried to make his intelligent audience believe that without a duty on imports that there was no other way in which the expenses of the government could be met. He said no sane man in the country would or could dispute it. Then he scolded the Republican party because of the tariff that made wages so high that Canadian labor flocked into the lumber camps, and then the peckey Canucks would go back home in the spring and buy their clothing cheap, made so by cheap labor in Canada. He carried the idea that the influx of Canadians caused wages in the woods to decrease, and almost in the same breath told how woodsmen that two or three years ago received only \$12 or \$16 per month now receive from \$24 to \$32 for the same work.

He scolded the Republican party because, as he said, our cotton manufacturers could and did sell cotton cloth cheaper in foreign countries than the foreigners could sell their own goods, but he did not tell his audience that these same protected home manufacturers were selling us cotton cloth cheaper than it was ever sold, and that the employees in the cotton mills in this protected country receive more than double what was paid in free trade England.

His position on the liquor question was at times so un-Democratic as to cause one or two third parties to applaud lustily, and at other times it was so un-Democratic (?) as to cause temperance people to blush. He was on all sides of the liquor question, in fact he was "anything to get that vote."

He said, "Gentlemen and ladies, send me to the legislature and I will vote for a tax so high that it will drive all the low groggeries out of existence." This, he said, would put the liquor business into the hands of rich, respectable men, and would make the business respectable. He assumed so many attitudes on this question that your reporter left the hall while he was yet speaking.

If he is the man that the Democrats are running for the legislature he will get beautifully snowed under on Nov. 6th.

EDITOR PIONEER:—I see in the 'Sun' a badly garbled report of Mr. W. F. Riggs' address at this place on last Friday evening. Among other things this report quotes Mr. Riggs as saying that the taxes of Michigan would be considerably lower if she had her share of the surplus now in the U. S. treasury. This is a mistake, for Mr. Riggs said nothing of the kind. What he did say though was, that if Michigan had refunded back to her the amount of the direct taxes which she paid into the U. S. treasury as a war tax, and which the ex-rebels now in Congress have refused to allow to be considered in legislative session, it would pay her safe taxes for two years. 'Democrat,' in his report, also makes another false statement alleging that Mr. Riggs said of the Newark City election, held the 6th inst., that the Republicans had a majority of 900. He said that the Republicans reduced the Democratic majority 900. I now see it reported better than that by more than 100. One year ago the Democrats had 1,308 majority in Newark, and now a trifle over 500. Surely 'tis a significant straw. 'Democrat' better try again. But what better can we expect of a Democrat?
