It is impossible to separate those who registered before noon from those who registered later, and it is said that the entire list may have to be thrown out. Fifty lending lawyers in the city hold that a registration office is a "public office" and within the scope of the Saturday half-holiday law.

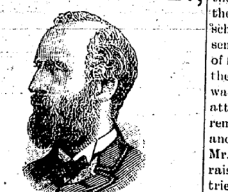
