The President has been forced by his party to send the British minister, West, out of the country, whose only crime in the eyes of that party was in being caught in the act of asking his friends to help England by voting for Grover Cleveland. Sackville West gave the true inwardness of the present campaign, and got caught at it. Saturday Grover joyfully declined to dismiss the meddlesome agent of the British government, but the leaders of the Democratic party got frightened and finally forced him to officially decapitate his friend. On general principles, the sending of West home is right; for as a representative of a foreign power he had no business whatever in meddling with our political matters. But why didn't the President at once hand him his passports. The trouble is, West had played the cards for Cleveland's benefit and Grover sought to bridge over the difficulty; hence the delay. Forced to dismiss in order to catch votes is what ailed the President. That was all. Republicans have said that Great Britain has been managing Cleveland's campaign, and the West letter shows that to be the fact. What England will do in the matter is yet only a matter of conjecture.

Many people come here upon the railroad and express the opinion that there are no farming lands in the country; but this is a mistake. We have the very best, both as to quality of soil and growth of the different kinds of hardwood timber. The railroads of the country, where practicable, are always built on the lowest levels, through swamps, etc., which is decidedly the case with the Soo line, both east and west from here. The only drawback in the way of farming is that there are not half as many men engaged in it as there is room for.

SPIKED BY THE K. OF L.  
The villainous assault upon Gen. Harrison by one Edwin P. Gould, who invented the "dollar-a-day" lie, has been turned with crushing force upon the party that hired him to do its dirty work. The following is a copy of a circular sent to K. of L. assemblies regarding the matter and it needs no explanation:  
To all Knights of Labor, Greeting:  
Armstrong Assembly No. 2212, INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Oct. 11, 1888.  
In the interest of our order we believe it to be our duty to call attention to the following circular, which was issued by local assembly 263, K. of L., at Canisteo, N. Y., which contains a letter dated at Indianapolis, Ind., Sept. 11, 1888, signed with the seal of D. A. 106, K. of L., and signed by Edwin P. Gould as recording secretary of the same. We do this for the following reasons:  
First, Edwin P. Gould was not authorized to write such a letter. He used the seal of D. A. 106 and signed as recording secretary, not only without authority, but without the knowledge of the master workman or the members of D. A. 106, or the sanction of the legislative committee.  
Second, The Knights of Labor connected with D. A. 106 and with the local assembly represented by D. A. 106 did not know of the existence of such a letter till its publication in the Indianapolis newspapers, more than three weeks after the date it was alleged to have been written.  
Third, We denounce and condemn the action of Edwin P. Gould as wicked and doing a great wrong to our order, it being well understood, and a part of the law governing our order, that political action shall not be taken by an assembly.  
Fourth, It is fully understood by the members of the K. of L. in this city that Edwin P. Gould is an unscrupulous political worker, and that he has sought to use our order for furthering his political schemes on other occasions as well as this. We understand and fully believe that he has been and now is in the employ of the Democrat party, and that he has been sent into the State of New York by the managers of the said party to advise the interests of Grover Cleveland to injure the reputation of Gen. Harrison, and to destroy as far as possible the usefulness of our order.  
Therefore, We warn all Knights of Labor everywhere to beware of Edwin P. Gould as unreliable and wholly untrustworthy.  
Fifth, We denounce as maliciously false the statements made by said Edwin P. Gould that Gen. Harrison said that "a dollar a day was enough for any working man," or "that he would force them back to work if he had to wade in blood up to the tips of his fingers," or that he "would shoot them down as dogs," and other similar statements.

ELECTION PROCLAMATION.

STATE OF MICHIGAN, OFFICE OF SEC. OF STATE.

LANSING, Aug. 20, 1888.

TO THE SHERIFF OF THE COUNTY OF SCHOOLCRAFT:

Sir: You are hereby notified that at the General Election to be held in this State, on the Tuesday succeeding the first Monday of November next, the following officers are to be elected, viz: Thirteen electors of President and Vice-President of the United States; a Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Secretary of State, State Treasurer, Auditor General, Commissioner of the State Land Office, Attorney General, and Superintendent of Public Instruction; also, a member of the State Board of Education in place of Bela Jenks, whose term of office will expire December 31, 1888; also, a Representative in Congress for the 11th Congressional District of this State by which your county belongs; also, a Senator for the 30th Senatorial District, comprising the counties of Schoolcraft, Alger, Leelanau, Cheboygan, Delta, Emmet, Mackinac; also, a Representative in the State Legislature for the Representative District comprising the counties of Schoolcraft, Leelanau, Cheboygan, Alger, and Mackinac. You are also hereby notified that at said election the following proposed amendment to the Constitution of this State will be submitted to the people of the State for their adoption or rejection, viz:

An amendment to Section 6 of Article 4, relative to Circuit Court Jurisdiction, for by Joint Resolution, No. 11, Laws of 1887.

Section 6. The State shall be divided into judicial circuits, in each of which the electors thereof shall elect one circuit judge, who shall hold his office for the term of six years, and until his successor is elected and qualified. The legislature may provide for the election of more than one circuit judge in the judicial circuit in which the city of Detroit is or may be situated, and in the judicial circuit, the county of Saginaw is or may be situated. And the circuit judge or judges of said circuit, in addition to the salary provided in this constitution, shall receive from their respective counties, such additional salary as may from time to time be fixed and determined by the board of supervisors of said counties. And the board of supervisors of each county in the Upper Peninsula is hereby authorized and empowered to give and pay to the circuit judges of the judicial circuit to which such county is attached such additional salary or compensation as may from time to time be fixed and determined by such board of supervisors.

You are also hereby notified that at said election there will be submitted to the people of the State for their adoption or rejection a Revision of the laws authorizing the business of banking, provided for by Act 205 of the laws of 1887; in accordance with Section 2, Article 15 of the constitution of this State.

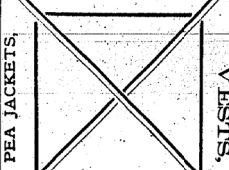

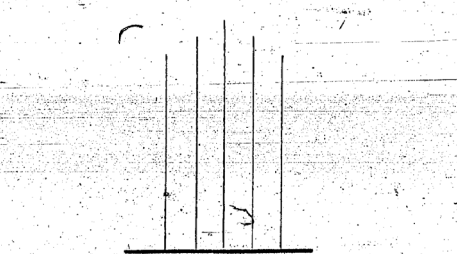

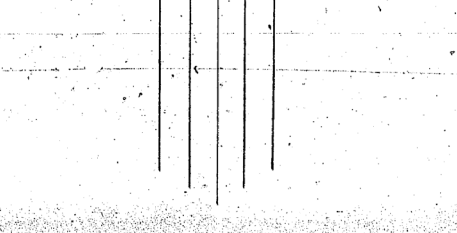
