## A Political Farce.

Nearly two hundred persons, a goodly number of whom were Republicans, attended the Democratic meeting at the Opera House, Saturday night, and as expected, it was the grandest farce of the campaign. The band was present and played a piece the candidates on the Democratic County ticket were seated in chairs on the stage. Chairman Putnam called the meeting to order, and announced that Hon. John Power, whose name had been put on bills circulated that morning—perhaps to draw a crowd—had disappointed them, and was not present, therefore he introduced to the audience Tax-list Democrat—Rev. T. J. Macmurray, who was received by cheers and an occasional hiss. That "distinguished" individual proceeded to tell that he was slow a Democrat; but said out in words as to how long he would remain in that party. At the conclusion of the remarks that fixed T. J.'s political status for the time being, the agent for Prison-made Socks, J. Maurice Finn stepped to the front and began asking Republicans questions, at the same time giving them the privilege of answering. After repeating his challenge, one or two gentlemen belonging to the Republican and People's Party took the liberty granted them by the speaker and did answer some of his charges. Democrats got on their feet and yelled "sit down" "put him out," etc. This demonstration only aided the Hockleberry candidate for Congress in getting as mad as a "cat hen," and he proceeded in his way to reply to them by making charges both untrue and untrue. GLAD TO BE LYNCHED.

Thanked the Crowd for "Working Him Out."

REDDING, Cal., Oct. 3.—John W. Smith was lynched by a mob last night, and just before they pulled the rope he made a short speech in which he cordially thanked them for hanging him, and hoped that he would meet them all in a brighter and better world.

The crowd yelled and some one shouted "don't preach." Then half a dozen men grabbed the rope, and in less time than it takes to tell it John W. Smith was suspended twenty feet from the ground and fifty bullets were lodged in his body.

Smith's crime was a peculiar one. Last night he and his wife and little girl camped near town. During the night Smith killed the child and shot his wife and also cut her horribly with a hatchet.

BATTLE OF PHANTOMS.

A Ghostly Conflict That Induced a Praying War.

All primitive peoples and some considerably advanced in civilization, have legends of the ghostly warriors who are said to have been slain in the past.

In this valley, long ago a great battle is said to have been fought, and in this battle one whole nation of red men was wiped from the face of the earth by a victorious invader who thereafter possessed the land.

All around him there seemed to be an invisible host of men some on horseback and some on foot, and these men appeared to be in deadly conflict. The noise of the trampling hoofs and rushing men could be plainly distinguished, while the sound could be distinctly heard.

Backward and forward the battle of ghosts seemed to rage for over an hour, yet all the while not a thing could be seen in the valley, and Willis was almost convinced that the sounds were the result of a dream.

THE RATTLE-SNAKE'S TAIL.

How the Caudal Alarm Clock of the Creature is Constructed.

The structure from which the rattle-snake takes his name—the rattle—consists mainly of three or more solid horny rings placed around the end of merely dense portions of the general outer skin of the body, but the rattle has also a solid foundation of bone.

The pieces of skin thus retained become a loose ring in front of the incipient rattle, says the Quarterly Review, and thus forms a first joint or ring of the future perfect rattle. The same process is repeated at each joint, to the perfect rattle being thus formed every time the skin is shed.

The flume which conveys the water from the mountains to the reservoir at San Diego, Cal., is said to be the largest and longest thing of the kind in the world. It is thirty-five miles long and is composed almost wholly of redwood. In its course this monster flume crosses 315 streams and cascades on trestles, the longest of which is 1700 feet long and 85 feet high.

The prosecution or persecution of Commissioner Peck by the Magumps at Albany does not seem to lag at all by reason of the fact that his report is battered and corroborated by those of the Democratic officials in Massachusetts, Indiana, and elsewhere. Even if the Magumps should succeed in disposing of this very embarrassing document, they would still be confronted with the concurrent testimony of all other authorities, that times are more prosperous since the passage of the McKinley law than they were before.

There were only thirty delegates in attendance on the session of the people's party convention at Grand Rapids Wednesday which nominated Judge Newton for the place on the supreme bench resigned by Judge Moree. It is said to have been the slimmest and sickest state convention of a political party ever held in Michigan. The people's party in this state consists mainly of claims made for it by these reckless and starving organs that advocate its principles. It has neither a respectable leadership nor an influential following.—Mining Journal.

Mrs. Gilmore, the widow of the popular bandmaster who died last week, has declined to allow the New York papers to get up a popular subscription to build a monument for her husband. In her letter to the New York Herald asking that this subscription be stopped she says that Mr. Gilmore "was adverse to what he called 'forced tributes' to any honor not conferred by spontaneous public impulse, and the only shrine he would ask, could his silent lips speak, would be that raised by love alone in the hearts and memories of the people." Such a shrine will undoubtedly be his while the present gen-

eration live to cherish the memory of his name.

**How They Saved the Bank**

Many years ago, in consequence of a commercial panic, there was a severe run on a bank in South Wales, and the small farmers jostled each other in crowds to draw out their money. Things were rapidly going from bad to worse, when the bank manager in a fit of desperation, suddenly bethought him of an expedient. By his direction, a clerk frying heated some sovereigns in a frying pan, paid them over the counter to the anxious applicant.

"Why, they are quite hot!" said the latter, as he took them up.

"Of course," was the reply, "what else could you expect? They are only just out of the mould. We are counting them by hundreds as fast as we can."

"Joining them!" thought the simple agriculturist. Then there is no fear of the money running short." With this their confidence revived, the panic abated, and the bank was enabled to weather the storm.

**A PROBABLE GOVERNOR.**

John Kean, Jr., whom the New Jersey Republicans have nominated. Congressman John Kean, Jr., of Elizabeth, N. J., was recently nominated by the Republicans of New Jersey for governor, and it is constantly expected that he will defeat Judge Werts, the Democratic candidate. Perhaps an idea of Mr. Kean's remarkable strength, politically speaking, may best be gained by the following sketch of his personality, taken from the New York World.

John Kean, Jr.—you mustn't forget the "Jr." because John, later, is still to the fore—was born one fine morning about thirty-eight years ago, and there

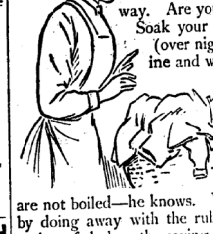
