HER LIFE WORK ENDED.

Death at Washington of Mrs. President Harrison.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 25.—Calmly and peacefully as a little child sinks to sleep in its mother's arms Mrs. Harrison went to her eternal rest. The devoted family early yesterday were made aware that death would come in a very few hours. They waited in silent anguish until 1:40 this morning, when the eyes of the sufferer were closed forever. The death bed scene was typical of the life of the president and Mrs. Harrison. It was serene and holy.

Mrs. Harrison was unconscious most of the day. She spoke to the president in affectionate terms at noon and continued to recognize members of the family at intervals until between 1 and 2 o'clock yesterday afternoon. From that time she was unconscious. President Harrison though almost worn out with incessant watching, bore himself manfully. His grief was too deep to easily find expression, and he was silent. The son and daughter were also present, and while their sorrow was at times uncontrollable, they showed resignation to the inevitable.

In populous towns no amount of supervision can prevent a great of filthy evil; but in the country towns slops should be carried out to trees, and poured in small quantities here and there as a fertilizer. Trees will take up a large quantity of water, and be grateful for it. There must be simply constant intelligence in the disposal of waste.—Farm Life.

The cities of New York and Chicago were united by telephone. Figuratively speaking it was a civil marriage, the mayors of the two great cities, a thousand miles apart, performing the ceremony. It was a distinguished gathering in the office of the American Telephone & Telegraph company in this city which acted as witnesses to the ceremony. Gathered within an arched glass chamber made brilliant with colored electric lights and whose sides were ornamented with potted plants and flowers were many men famed in electrical science and skilled with the pen. Radiating from this cabinet were twenty for thirty receivers that were distributed among the guests in order that they might hear for themselves what science had accomplished. President Hudson explained to the assemblage in the New York office that this new connection between New York and Chicago was the longest telephone line in the world. The long distance telephone Paris and Marseilles was only 500 miles in length and that between London and Paris less than 250 miles, whereas the New York-Chicago line was nearly 1,000 miles.

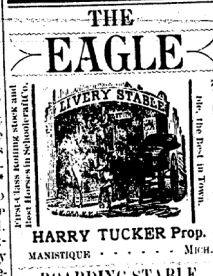

Dr. Robert Russell Booth have resigned from the board of directors of the Union Theological Seminary, as a result of the complications following the seminary's dispute with the Presbyterian church. Dr. Hall's resignation was received and at a meeting of the board was moved to lay it on the table and suspend any action until a committee could be appointed to wait upon him to try to induce him to reconsider his withdrawal. Nothing has been done as yet, however, and inasmuch as Dr. Hall probably gave the matter full consideration before taking the step it is hardly likely that he will recede from his position. Dr. Booth's resignation was not altogether unexpected. He made known his position early in the controversy.
