Washington, Oct. 25.—Calmly and peacefully as a little child sinks to sleep n its mother's arms Mrs. Harrisc went to her eternal rest. The devoted family early yesterday were made aware that death would come in a very few hours. They waited in silent anguish until 1:40 this morning, when the eyes of the sufferer were closed forever. The death bed scene was typical of the life of the president and Mrs. Harrison

She spoke to the president in affectionate terms at noon and continued to recognize members and continued to recognize member of the family at intervals until between 1 and 2 o'clock yesterday afternoon From that time she was unconscious President Harrison though almost worn out with incessant hore himself manfully. His grief wa too deep to easily find expression, and he was silent. The son and daughte were also present, and while their sor-row was at times uncontrollable, they showed resignation to the inevitable.

EVERY boy, and, for that matter, every girl, should learn how to swim.

The boy who is not willing to learn, if the chance begiven him, has something wrong about him. Yet, while all the urchins who have access to the water acquire the ability sooner or later, some attain far greater pro-ficiency than others. This is due partly to natural differences and partly to the fact that some pay greater attention to swimming as an art than they do to fun pure and simple. In addition to the mere ability to propel himself on the surface of the water the boy should learn how to swim the boy should learn how to swim under water with his eyes open, on his back, on his side, and with one hand, while holding something in the other. He should also become familiar with the various phases of drowning accidents, and should know how to attempt a rescue with the greatest chance for success and the greatest degree of safety to himself.

SOME BIRDS ARE ÆSTHETIC.

SOME BIRDS ARE ÆSTHETIC, Feathered Native of Asstratia Which Build and Adors Flayhouses. The most remarkable instance of rishicidism among birds is that exhibited by the Australias Bowen birds, which, according to Chambers' Journal, build long galleries in which to play, adorating fithem with shells feathers leaves becose or any colored or giltering object which comes in their way.
