In 1882 Great Britain made 8,493,257 tons of pig iron, Germany made 3,880,805 tons and the United States 4,728,320 tons. In 1891 Great Britain made 7,228,466 tons, Germany 4,452,919 tons and the United States 8,299,733 tons. This is a decrease for the free trade country of 14 per cent, and an increase of 33 per cent, and 80 per cent, respectively for the two protectionist countries.

The list of the jackets has been slipped over the breach of the great 13-inch gun at the Washington navy yard, and the immense piece of ordnance is now nearing completion. The gun will be the largest ever made in this country by the built up process. This modern steel rifle is made of 13 separate pieces of metal, exclusive of the complex carriage. Its total length is 49 feet. Its diameter at the breech is more than four feet, and it tapers to a thickness of 21 inches at the muzzle.

Several years ago James Johnson, a prosperous farmer living near Mason Warren county, Ohio, died. Having no heirs, he placed a strange provision in his will to the effect that \$200 of his money should be placed in the hands of the township trustees for the express purpose of keeping his grave green. The trustees have complied with his odd request, as well as having placed the amount out at interest, and interest being more than sufficient to have the grave of the deceased properly attended to. What will eventually be done with the money giving the trustees no small amount of worry.

The contributions of whisky sellers and saloon keepers in the cities make quite a handsome campaign fund for the Democrats in themselves. It is not denied that the Cook County (Chicago) Democratic convention lacked just two of having a majority of saloon keepers in the whole convention. In Massachusetts the "tea form" Governor Bunker "levying regular assessments upon the liquor men for his campaign, and his own brother is credibly alleged to be soliciting funds personally from these sources. In New York city the saloon-keeper is the agent looked to by the Democratic managers to carry the State for Governor Cleveland.

Cleveland's Generosity to Soldiers.

"I cannot but remember that the soldiers of our civil war, in their pay and bounty, received such compensation for military services as has never been received before since mankind went into war; that never before on behalf of any soldiers have so many and such generous laws been passed to relieve against the incidents of war."

This proceeds upon the theory that the soldiers of the Union hired themselves to be at for so much a month, and that they should not complain of the disabilities incident to their employment, since that was all settled as the war went on by the liberal pay received.

To get a clearer idea of what Mr. Cleveland considers the extreme of generosity toward soldiers it is worth while to look at the case more closely.

At the outbreak of the war volunteers were \$13 a month in paper. The next year this was worth 83 cents on the dollar. In 1863 the pay was increased to \$16. Each dollar was then worth 60 cents. At \$13 a month the soldier actually received \$11.44. In 1863 the \$16 a month was worth less than \$11. In 1864 the paper dollar was less than 50 cents, and the month's pay was worth only \$7.87 in gold. At this time common laborers were receiving from \$2 to \$2.50 a day and mechanics from \$3 to \$5, so that a man who went into the army had to sacrifice from \$44 to \$134 a month in wages. At that time wheat ran up to \$2.75 a bushel, and flour to \$12 a barrel; calico and muslin ran up to 75 cents a yard. A soldier's pay for a month would do little more than buy a barrel of flour for his family or a plain calico dress for his wife. But Mr. Cleveland insists that this pay was such generosity as the world never heard of before.

The American Axe.

All the world admires and wonders at the American axe helve. The American axe, fitted with that ingeniously carved and gracefully fashioned handle, is a marvellously effective weapon, vastly more apt for its purposes than the straight-handled axe with which the Italian fells trees, or the broad-faced hatchet used for the same purpose in France. The American axe helve is just what might have been expected of an inventive people laden with the duty of conquering and civilizing a forest-clad continent. The world has been using the axe since prehistoric times, but it remained for the American pioneer to fashion the ideal axe handle, at once light, strong and elastic. The axe, such as is familiar to all Americans, is rare in Europe, and it sells in all the British colonies as the American axe.—New York Sun.

Woodsmen, It Helps You.

We met a friend from the woods, an operator in pine and cedar, last Tuesday, and after greetings exchanged, we asked about business. "Good," said he, "only men are so scarce and wages are so high." "Then wages are high, are they?" we asked. "Higher than I don't know when, and yet there are no men; easier jobs elsewhere I suppose," said he, "McKinley jobs." Right he was, too; good times all around, in the shops, on the farms, in the mills, in the woods, "on account of the McKinley bill." Do you desire that condition of things to continue? Then vote the Republican ticket. Do you want lower wages and less work with a possible chance of a trifling saving in the cost of living? If you do, but you do not, and we will not disparage your good sense by suggesting that you vote with the free-traders.—Iron Port.

A Village of Criminals.

It is the village of Ardena, which enjoys an infamous notoriety, its inhabitants being robbers, thieves, and assassins. Milwaukee Scorched to the
Extent of \$6,000,000.

MUCH DAMAGE ON THE LAKES.

Cleveland, Ohio, Visited by Fire—The
Steam-barge Canisteo and Consorts
Aground on Lake Huron.

About 5 o'clock Friday evening a fire
broke out in the business part of Mil-
waukee and destroyed some \$6,000,000
worth of property; leaving several
hundred poor families homeless and
causing the loss of quite a number of
lives. The wind was blowing at a tear-
ful rate.

Cleveland, Ohio, also had a visitation
of fire; the Euclid Avenue Theater and
several other buildings are in ruins.

The blow on the lakes that night
caused a great loss of property and a
number of lives. On Lake Superior a
screw being in tow of a tug parted her
lines and at this writing has not been
heard from. She had on board seven
men.

Later dispatches bring the welcome
intelligence that the screw went on the
beach above Marquette and all were
saved. Cargo lost.

The steam-barge Canisteo, Cap.
Lynn, and tow barges Pomroy and
Stewart, were caught in the storm on
Lake Huron and went ashore some
twelve miles below Cheboygan. They
were reported in a good position and
could be easily released after the storm
subsided. Crews safe.

The British steamship Roumania
was wrecked on the coast of Portugal
and 113 persons drowned.

Several vessels are ashore in the
vicinity of Cleveland.

A number of vessels are reported
beached on the east shore of Lake
Michigan.
