It may appear somewhat stranga, but it is nevertheless true, that one must upo outside to fifd the largest, and most sousomical road wagons ever built in this country, writes Mr. C. M. Plumb of Ca.lio.nia in Good Roads. The larger area has no very well defined bounds and there is scarcely a limit to its present barrenness. That portion within the state of California extends some 200 miles west.

It is not a region of simple alkali plains but of diversified mountain ranges, immense sloping valleys, dry lakes and sunken river beda a deers of sandy and rocky desolation.

The deep sink in the northerly portion of the desert lay in the pathway of the overland emigration of 49 and 50, which at Sait Lake divided, one division moving southerly and entering California by way of Ca, on Pass.

It is noticeable that while a railroad freight car weighs over one-half its greatest load, two of these Death Valley wagons, weighting less than eight tons often carry 22 or 23 tons of borax besides the casks of water and feed for the 20 animats!

Two of these wagons are joined together, and between the spr. ags and dry camps a tank wagon is also attached for water, the whole train drswn by two horses and 18 mules!

The horses are placed at the wheel and the meet intelligentspan of mules in the lead. The doubletrees are attached to a heavy chain leading from the font axles of the wagons. The driver, seated either upon the lead, governs his team by means of a small rope 120 feet long, called a jork lind. rope 120 feet long, called a jerk line, attached to the bitof the near leader.


