**CLEVELAND IS ELECTED  
 AND WE ARE A**



There can be no conclusive general election news given yet, more than to say: Cleveland has been undoubtedly elected President. Michigan it is believed has elected the entire Republican ticket.

**County Election.**

We cannot at this time give the official vote of this county, but enough is known to concede the Democrats nearly 100 majority on state and National ticket and they may have elected one or two of the minor county officers; but the Republican nominees for Judge of Probate, Clerk, Sheriff and Treasurer got there in the shape.

The Democrats fought hard, sacrificed everything else for the latter three offices named, and these they fought hard for; slanders the Republicans unmercifully. They put up their strongest men in their party; but the people had had quite enough of that kind of local rule, and went in for a change. The Prohibitionists helped the Republicans on Sheriff and Clerk whilst the People's Party lent its strength on Clerk and Treasurer, directly and indirectly by dividing the Democratic vote between J. H. Allison and the Democratic nominee, Gorman Carr. Rep. was elected Sheriff by 88 majority; Ashford, against whom the Democrats had worked hard "got there by 111 majority and Merseman the man that they said could not possibly defeat McKinney scored 63 majority. This is the grandest victory ever won in the county. We believe that several of the other offices are Republican, but we cannot say positively. It is believed that McNamary, their candidate for Circuit Court Commissioner is beaten. We are well pleased at this great Republican success, in a county that is usually Democratic in everything. **A Great Freight Carrier**

The new twin screw steamer **Bovic** of the White Star line, sailed from New York the other day on her first, outward voyage with what is said to be the biggest cargo ever taken from this port, and with the greatest number of bales of cotton ever carried in a ship. Besides 700 cattle on deck, she had 8,003 bales of cotton, 9,400 sacks of flour, 16,000 bushels of grain, 1,650 packages of lard, 979 boxes of bacon, 63 tierces of beef, 1,194 barrels of cottonseed oil, 60 barrels of paraffine wax, 300 tons of cottonseed cake, 100 tons of copper ore, 100 tons of acetate of lime, 190 packages of candles and one refrigerator containing 1,600 quarters of beef.—New York Letter.

**Reading in Bed.**

It is a widespread belief that to read while in a lying position is hurtful to the eyes, and is, therefore a dangerous luxury. As a rule, some truth can be sifted out of every popular saying. More or less influence by the superstitious which seem a part of our very organization, we have often abused this privilege, quieting our conscience by a kind of mental protest. Experiencing no inconvenience from the enjoyment of reading in bed, we came to the point of questioning the truthfulness of the saying, however hoary with respectability age has made it.

The reporter got the opinion of the surgeon in charge of the Presbyterian Eye, Ear and Throat Charity Hospital on the matter. "Injury to the eyes in reading," he said "comes not from the position of the body, but from the way in which the light in which the light falls upon the book. Provided the open page receives the light, and at the same time the eyes are shielded from the direct harsh rays, reading can be indulged in to any extent when the body is in the recumbent posture. No one questions this when, during their summer outing, they stretch themselves on the turf or in a hammock, under the shade of a friendly tree. Why should they question it when they lie on a soft couch at home?"

The straining to sight comes from the improper illumination of the printed surface; as, when persons read in bed from a distant gas jet, which throws the light on the back of the book, and necessarily into the eyes of the reader, while the page perused is in shadow. If the gaslight in the center of the room or at the bureau is good and the reader reverses the pillow to the foot of the bed, so to have the light fall on the open book, no more harm can come to the eye from the recumbent posture than from reading at a table with the light overhead.

"The popular saying of our grandmothers that reading lying down was injurious originated at the time when artificial light was proverbially indifferent, and when the centre table oil lamp was the only light fit for reading purposes. The tallow dip substitute, placed on the side of the bed, should have been classified with moonlight reading, which no sensible persons should ever be guilty of."

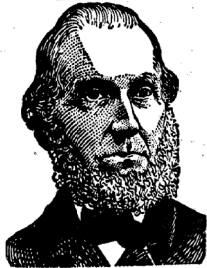

**Lions and Buffaloes.**  
 A well-known traveler in Africa says that he made his long journey by a camel across the dislocated skeleton of a buffalo almost intermingled with the broken bones of a lion, the skull of which was lying near, while the skull of the buffalo was also near at hand, but devoid of the nasal bones. The ground evidence was at the scene of a desperate combat in which both animals had succumbed.  
 It is a common practice among lions, this gentleman says, to hunt in company. A friend of mine in South Africa had a peculiar example of this. His friend V. had rounded a bull buffalo, which had retreated within the forest. The two hunters carefully followed the blood-track, but after a short advance were startled by a succession of loud roars, which betokened lions close at hand.  
 There could be little doubt that the wounded buffalo had been attacked. Therefore, with proper precaution, they approached the spot until an exciting scene presented itself suddenly on the other side of a large fallen tree, which happily concealed the two hunters.  
 Three lions were engaged in a life-and-death combat with the gallant old bull, who made a desperate defence, first knocking over one of his enemies, then going another to the ground, and exhibiting a strength which appeared sufficient to defeat the combination.  
 Suddenly the buffalo fell dead. This was the result of the original wound, as the rifle bullet had passed through the lungs.  
 The lions were not aware of this, and began to quarrel among themselves about their imagined victory. One huge beast reared to half its height and placed its fore-paws upon the body of the prostrate buffalo, while at the head and the hind-quarters an angry lion clutched the dead body in its spreading paws, and growled at the possessor of the center. This formed a grand picture within only a few yards' distance, but two rifle-shots stretched two lions rolling upon the ground, and the third bounded into the thicket covert and disappeared.

**A Wonderful Signal Light.**  
 The experiments with a powerful search light on Mount Washington have made some highly interesting results. The light, which is of one hundred thousand candle power, produces a sufficient illumination at a distance of twenty miles from the summit of the mountain to render ordinary print legible. A narrow beam of light, visible overhead at Portland, eighty-five miles away.  
 The elevation of the light above the surface of the earth at Portland has been made more than eighty miles. When it was made to flash "dot and dash" signals in the air, a telegraph operator at Portland readily interpreted the words thus transmitted to him, and to prove that he saw the signal, telegraphed the words back to Mount Washington.  
 He could not see the light on the peak, which was hidden by intervening clouds, but only the beam of light passing at a height of eighty miles above his head.  
 This fact seems more surprising when we reflect upon the excessive rarity of the atmosphere at such an elevation, for of course the beam of light would not be visible if it did not illuminate the air through which it passes just as a ray of sun light, entering through a knot-hole, makes a luminous beam in the dusty air of a barn.  
 It is evident at a glance that these

experiments have a most important bearing upon the art and practice of securing a safe and effective means of light through the air in the case of any emergency of communication at sea.  
**WATERPROOF COAT.**  
 A well-known manufacturer of waterproof coats has a unique method of making them. The building was intended for the purpose of their own use, but the manufacturer decided to enlist the interest of the natives in the project, especially as the projectors wished to secure a site as low as possible. A Building and Finance committee was appointed, and an old resident, a Mr. Buffon, was made one of the three members of it.  
 He was the owner of a lot on which the summer cottages had set their hearts. At the first meeting of the committee the matter of contributions was broached. Mr. Buffon left his colleagues in no doubt as to his position. He declined to contribute a cent.  
 Then the two cottagers labored with him over the site. Fifteen hundred dollars was his lowest figure. They explained to him the advantages that would accrue to the place from the erection of the casino, and the inevitable enhancement of the value of his property; but he held out for fifteen hundred dollars. Finally one of the committee said:  
 "Mr. Buffon, you should either knock off something from the price of the lot, or, if we buy it for fifteen hundred dollars, you should make a handsome contribution."  
 "Well," said Mr. Buffon, "I'm ready to do something for you. I can't let the land go for less than fifteen hundred dollars, but if you'll make the figure sixteen hundred dollars, I'm ready to contribute one hundred dollars to the fund."  
 The meeting was adjourned on motion of one of the summer visitors.  
**Train of Exiles.**  
 All travelers in Siberia desire to see something of the criminal exiles, and the author of "From the Arctic Ocean to the Yellow Sea" was no exception to the rule. He had met and talked freely with many prisoners—the first of them was of whom seemed to him to be having a pretty comfortable experience, their crimes being taken into account—but had not yet seen a body of convicts on the march. When, therefore, he was informed that a detachment was to start from Tomsk, he took a conveyance and drove out to meet it.  
 He had driven a considerable distance without seeing the slightest sign of life on the deserted highway, when suddenly on the crisp, frosty air it distinguished a faint, distant sound, so peculiar and weird that it at once attracted my attention, as it was evidently approaching us.  
 It was not unlike the noise which would be produced by hundreds of birds singing all at once, yet I could see nothing of any sort anywhere on the vast plain. As well as I could, with my limited Russian vocabulary, I drew my driver's attention to it. To him it was neither novel nor interesting; he knew what it was at once.  
 "The arrestans are coming," he answered briefly; and shortly after, on ascending a rise in the road which had concealed them from our view, there came in sight a big body of men coming slowly along, and I discovered that the strange noise which had so impressed me was produced by the heavy chains they wore.  
 But then, alas! all preconceived illusions vanished, for it was a loathsome and depressing sight, rendered doubly so by the bright sunshine.  
 There was about it absolutely nothing of the poetic, such as I had been led to expect. It was simply a huge crowd or what looked like—and probably was—the very scum of the earth, for the bright sunshine was at once making a villainous and evil-looking lot of men as one could possibly see.

Stains may be removed from nearly all light colored silks by the application of a mixture of five parts of spirits of turpentine to one of common limes, thus rubbed gently in with a linen rag.
