A Washington correspondent, has been studying the habits of applicants for office, says that those who are seeking Presidential positions are working hard to show who are to be chosen. President Cleveland are tobacco chasers. This may explain why the President has ordered the White House closed two days in the state of Kansas, does not have some time to visit the floors.

The women of Kansas are taking a great interest in the spring elections. It is thought there have been 4,000 women registered as voters in Leavenworth, 2,534 in Emporia, 882 in Fort Scott, 1,285 in Jaynes, 612 in Atchison, 322 and in Wichita, 2,410. This will make the election a very interesting affair in these Kansas cities, and if the men do not do better in the future than in the last two years, it would be a good idea to turn over all the offices in the State to the women.

James McMillan, Chairman of the Republican State Central Committee and Daniel J. Conroy, Chairman of the Democratic State Central Committee, have just issued an address to the voters in relation to the election of State officers. Every voter should give the amendment his hearty approval.

The amendment is on the ticket just below the names of the candidates.

Escape and Capture.
All Michigan has been in a state of excitement for a few days over the dramatic escape of R. Irving Latimer, the man who was serving the life sentence in the state prison, at Jackson, for the murder of his mistress. He succeeded in poisoning two of his guards, one of whom died almost instantly. He went the keys of the prison gate from the pockets of the guard and got outside of the prison.

He succeeded in getting as far as the village of Ferris, where he was recaptured and is now again in the state prison. Will the legislature still refuse to restore the death penalty by murder?

The whole thing shows up a very loose and lax system of guarding the state prisoners, and the Warden of Jackson prison, under the Wardenship that "renowned" Democrat, Davis. The newly appointed Warden, Chamberlain, takes charge of the prison Saturday morning.

Salaries of State Officers.
To the Electors of Michigan:
Among the amendments to be submitted to the people of this state at this spring election, is one relating to the salaries of certain State officers. The officers directly affected by the amendment are the Lieutenant Governor, Secretary of State, Superintendent of Public Instruction, and Commissioner of the State Land Office.

The change is not proposed out of any compassion for the officers now occupying these positions, but with the view of changing the entire system, and hereby securing the personal attention and attendance of the officers to the many duties devolving upon them by virtue of their respective offices.

It is a matter of public notoriety, and public concern that the amount of the meager salaries paid by the State, that the positions held by the above named State officers are considered

more as places of honor than as positions of personal trust. The salaries were fixed at the present amount in 1850. Since then the wages for every class of work have increased nearly two and one-half times. Their farm hands received from \$8 to \$10 per month, they now receive from \$17 to \$25 per month. The wages of clerks and artisans have increased in like proportion; but while wages have increased the cost of living has increased quite as fast, and if the people would receive the personal services of these officers they must pay a sum that will afford them a reasonable living.

Not only have the wages in all departments and the cost of living increased, but the net result necessarily for the personal services of these officers, by reason of the advancement of the wealth and population of the State, have increased in a far greater proportion.

The Lieut. Governor is now a member of many of the most important boards in the State of Michigan, and it is for the interest of the people that he be so compensated that he can better afford to give his time to the duties devolving upon him.

It is proposed to fix the salary of the Lieut. Governor at \$1,200, a sum certainly reasonable in amount.

The Secretary of State, Commissioner of the State Land Office, and the State Treasurer constitute the Board of State Auditors. That board has to make all the printing and supply contracts and audit all the miscellaneous claims against the State.

In the year 1850, during the entire year, 212 claims were presented against the State, amounting to \$1,753. There has been a continual increase in number and amount of claims from that time to the present. In January, 1893, the claims presented amounted to \$27,196. The amount allowed was \$18,196. The average monthly allowance is from \$15,000 to \$18,000. That is to say, the Board of State Auditors must now examine and pass upon about twenty times as many bills in number, and ten times in amount each month as they were required to pass upon in a whole year in 1850. Any negligence in making contracts or auditing accounts must necessarily bring high financial interests of the people.

It is proposed to fix the salaries of the Secretary of State and Commissioner of the Land Office at \$2,000 each, sums certainly far more reasonable now, when viewed in the light of the present duties and responsibilities, than the original sums which viewed in the light of the original duties and responsibilities he was wages than paid to others.

While the changes above enumerated show a great increase in the demand for the time of the Secretary of State and Commissioner of the Land Office, the increase in the duties demanding the personal efforts and personal attention of the Superintendent of Public Instruction is quite as large. Since 1850 was \$217,000. The money expended in 1883 was \$5,385,100, which sum has constantly increased from that time. The Superintendent of Public Instruction is required by law to perform the important duties of general superintendent of all the schools. He is obliged to visit all the State educational institutions, attend teachers' institutes, and should be obliged to give his entire time in looking after the educational interests of the State. He is allowed no fees, nor perquisites of any kind. The salary fixed in 1850 of \$1,000 is not a reasonable compensation for a man who has the requisite ability to fill the position.
