### EDITORIALS AND CLIPPINGS.

**Gov. Rich** has signed the bill extending the term of the legislature.

**DEATH.** In June 3.—Twenty-five men walked into this city of 2,000 people this morning and struck up a man on the principal street, without meeting any opposition. The victim was Samuel Bush, a negro, accused of outraging two white women. The details of the lynching were sensational from start to finish. Bush was in jail awaiting trial.

**Four** Inl. June 4.—Thomas J. McDowell, one of the pioneer newspaper men of the west, a leading man of this city and identified with newspaper publications for nearly fifty years in Michigan, Ohio and Indiana, dropped dead at his home in this city yesterday of heart failure, aged 61 years. He also served this city an official capacity for twenty years.

**The management** of the Manistique bank of Manistique is being severely criticized in this city for lending out \$200,000 to Lupton & Co. and about \$300,000 to its president, Frederick T. Day, when its capital was only \$250,000. The stockholders are only for twice the amount of their stock, or \$400,000, and it is considered certain that depositors will lose nothing. Assignee Plankinton, who held but a small interest in the bank, will endeavor to unshackle his affairs as far as possible. President Day seems to have been very much of an enticement and to have run the bank entirely to suit his own notions.

**Too Previews.**

**As usual,** our democratic friends could not wait for the adjournment of the legislature—much less for any reliable basis—before opening their mouths for extravagance against the republicans. They were quite national, since figures usually "flour" democratic arguments and claims, and will probably do so in this case when the fact is revealed. It is about \$100,000 that the republicans are charged with spending. Our democratic friends may as well understand right now that they must raise those figures if they would hope to "stay in" since here are two items that will alone knock them out. In 1890 the republicans turned the state treasury over to the democracy with a balance of over \$600,000. The democrats returned the treasury in 1893 with a balance of over \$1,000,000. They had increased the balance of the treasury, which they had \$420,000 of refund from the United States, and that was all spent. Here are over \$700,000 which our friends spent and neglected to charge to themselves in their budget. That leaves but about \$100,000 for the republicans to account for, and the governor has a host of bills in his hands yet unpassed.
