THAT TAX LAW

Section 135 of the tax law of 1903 seems to have raised some question as to its tenor in a tenor throughout the state, and from no apparent cause save that some party or parties, interested from personal motives, have sought to raise a question by befogging the plain intent of the section, and failing in that through the decision of the attorney general. They are now disputing its constitutionality. In this attempt they are meeting with a success, since they can, if not in action, at least in the public eye, have been brought into the limelight of this country that it seems with constitutional law, and they never appear before a court of law, but practice principally on street corners and in places of public resort. Their opinions are numerous, because usually delivered free, but they should not be regarded as cheap, since they are generally misleading (intentionally or otherwise). These appear to be the practitioners upon the tax in the matter, we can see no reason why the legislature to prescribe any other rule, regulation or condition with reference to the acknowledgment of any alleged defects in the title.

It is not the intention of the Republican to assume a similar role in discussing the "tax law," but, simply to present a few historical and legal facts in connection with that act. It may be generally known, but it is not, nevertheless, that the present tax law of Michigan is, in all its essential provisions relative to conveyances, a copy of the Minnesota law, which has been in force for many years, and goes much farther in its requirements relative to deeds than is contemplated in section No. 135 of the Michigan law, since it demands a perfect tax history of each deed recorded, extending back to the first government patent, and establishes a permanent auditor and registers for infractions of its provisions.

The constitutionality of these provisions in the Minnesota law has been established beyond question in its court of last resort, notably in the case of the State of Minnesota ex rel. Julia D. Ashton vs. Register of Deeds of Ramsey county, found in Minnesota Reports, Vol. xxvi, Minnesota Reports, Vol. xxvi, page 521, et seq. A brief statement of this case, which involved the constitutionality of that clause in the Minnesota tax law from which section 135 of the Michigan law is copied a part as follows:

Mary J. Ashton, being owner in fee of certain real estate in the city of St. Paul, on September 21, 1877, conveyed the same to the plaintiff by warranty deed, duly executed and acknowledged, and on October 24, 1877, J. H. Ashton, her son, having an interest in certain real estate in that city, conveyed the same to the plaintiff by a quit-claim deed, also duly executed and acknowledged. Neither of the deeds having been recorded, the plaintiff, on September 10, 1879, presented the same to the defendant, as register of deeds, at his office, for record, tendering the proper fees. Neither of the deeds had indorsement or certificate in relation to taxes or assessments, and for want of such statement the register refused to receive or record the deeds. The plaintiff sued out an alternative writ of mandamus requiring the register to show cause for his refusal, which the respondent answered, setting up the lack of a statement and certificate. His answer was held to show no legal excuse, by Justice Wilkin of the district court of Ramsey county,

and the writ was made peremptory. The respondent appealed from that decision and the cause came up for hearing before the supreme bench of Minnesota on June 28, 1880, and the order of the lower court allowing a peremptory writ of mandamus was reversed. In the opinion of the majority of the court, written by Justice M. B. Curtis, the following statement of law which is peculiarly significant since it bears directly upon the objections raised against section 135 of the Michigan tax law, and upon the power of the legislature to enact such a provision. Justice said: "It cannot be doubted that in the exercise of its general legislative authority, to provide for the manner of transferring real estate, and for the registration of conveyances thereof, and failing in that through the decision of the attorney general. They are now disputing its constitutionality.
