The Standard's correspondent also says that the situation promises trouble.

WASHINGTON, July 18.—A dispatch regarding the arrival of a ship at Valparaiso with a cargo of 60,000 seal skins taken in Antarctic Ocean was sent to President G. He replied: "The rookeries in that part of the world have been practically abandoned for some years past, the reason that owing to Great Britain's failure to protect the seals they became almost extinct and did not pay for the time and trouble spent in hunting them. It may be that in a few years of comparative safety have resulted in the restoration of the seal life to its former extent. It is so, I would think that Great Britain will undertake to protect the rookeries now."
