NEW ORLEANS, Oct. 4.—Over 2,000 killed and nearly \$5,000,000 property annihilated in the recent great gulf storm in Louisiana. There has never been anything approximating it since the country was settled. More than half the population in the region over which the hurricane swept is dead.

Everything is wrecked and not a house is left standing, while the survivors are left in the most destitute condition, without food or even clothing, for most of them were sleeping in their beds when their homes were crushed by the wind or waves.

There have been several similar disasters on the coast. At Lost Island, where 280 people lost their lives, and at Johnson's Bayou the list numbered 222, six years ago, but Monday's disaster surpassed these in horror.

The work and injured were all killed, and in the settlements where the storm was worst not a child survived and very few women. The survivors are the young men in the vigor of manhood. Not one of them but has a terrible story to tell, not one but is badly bruised and injured.

They escaped mainly on rafts or logs, floating for twenty to ninety hours in the water. With the wind at 115 miles an hour. The deaths so far reported and which are confirmed, aggregate over 2,000.

The largest mammoth skeleton in the world is on exhibition at the Washington State building at the Chicago fair.

In the spring of 1879 Mr. Copelin, a farmer living in the southwestern part of Spokane county, state of Washington, was digging a drain through a muddy hill, about 50 feet square, when he came upon some unusually large bones.

He wisely exercised great care in digging out the bones, and the result was the discovery of a valuable prize.

Professor W. K. Higley has prepared a record of this work, showing that all bones or their fragments had been found, aggregating 700 pounds in weight.

The length of the tibia is 9 feet 10 inches; circumference of the tibia at base, 21 inches; number of laminae of tibia, 18; breadth of lower teeth, 8 inches; length of lower jaw, 10 inches; breadth of lower jaw at the middle, 23 inches; breadth of atlas, 18 inches; height of atlas, 9 inches; height of pelvis, 21 inches; breadth of pelvis, 23 inches; length of scapula, 18 inches; length of humerus at middle of shaft, 19 inches. These are accurate measurements of the true bones in the mounted skeleton.

The height of this skeleton as mounted is 38 feet, while that of the famous Dr. Peabody specimen is only 9 feet 4 inches.—Toledo Blade.

Almost immediately another volunteer fell in a similar fit, and in the course of the next two minutes five more dropped to the ground insensible, leaving only five of the 12 men present unaffected. The ambulance corps soon appeared and found the remaining five men in a state of intense excitement. It was a long time before several recovered from their fits. One man, a corporal, insisted on returning at once to duty, but all the others were invalided.—Cor. Westminster Gazette.

**Prof. Currier's Scheme.**  
 Prof. Currier has been named by Mr. Peffer's latest bill, but his education can hardly be justly held to be a disadvantage. It is the "A" hall of science learning, the arts and sciences and promote the general welfare by founding a college of scientific learning in the District of Columbia. The bill consists of 19 sections.

The first provides for a department of education under the control of a secretary for the construction within three years in the District of Columbia of a college of scientific learning, in which shall be taught all the classical and professional studies and arts and sciences necessary to give students a knowledge of the highest courses appertaining to such education and learning.

**Longest Track Laying This Year.**  
 The longest stretch of track laying done thus far this year has just been completed by the Minneapolis, St. Paul and South St. Marie company in the extension of its line from Valley, N. D., to Sterling, on the International boundary, a distance of 162 miles, all traced since last spring. At the boundary line connection is made with a branch of the Canadian Pacific, now building from a point west of Regina, about 160 miles long, which will be completed in September, thus making the Soo line an important part of a new route from St. Paul and Minneapolis to the Pacific coast, and inaugurating a competing line which may greatly disturb existing conditions. No work of railway building in 1903 is likely to be more important in its effects than that which virtually extends the Canadian Pacific system to the Mississippi river.—Railway Age.

A city littleness has been paid out by the government in premiums to the builders of naval vessels during the present year. By exceeding the speed required the Bancroft netted her contractors \$45,000; the Detroit, \$100,000; the Albatross, \$200,000; and the Mackinac, \$450,000, a total of \$440,000. This amount is likely to be increased. The money may be regarded as well invested if it does no more than call attention to the high standard of excellence attainable by American shipbuilders.—Boston Transcript.

The whole question of the revision of the method of popular representation in Belgium is blocked at present by the attitude of the government in relation to the recognition of the senate, which may lead ultimately to a conflict between the houses and may involve the throne. The correspondent of the London Times at Brussels says: A more perplexing matter is the utter insignificance of the points at issue. Apart from the 25 senators to be elected by the provincial councils without paying any taxes in the senate to be composed only of non-taxpayers in the proportion of one to every 3,000 inhabitants or may it not be admitted that the inhabitants who pay the highest taxes in each province under 1,500 francs should be equally eligible for the senate in the proportion of one to every 3,000 inhabitants? Upon this the whole question turns. The latter proposal, while still constituting a senate of which three-fourths are to represent the great landed proprietors, would raise the number of those eligible from 1,200 to 2,000. And this is for the petty differences that the revision of the constitution is not only postponed in the house of representatives, but exposed to the danger of ultimate failure.

As fine a display of fireworks as could be desired might have been witnessed after midnight the other morning in the mountainous farm lands covering the northern portion of Saratoga county, N. Y. Frost comes early thereabouts, and three years out of five damages or destroys the corn and buckwheat.

A Swedish farmer on Hedley hill suggested the use of "frost torches" in time of danger, and explained that Scandinavian agriculturists made them of petroleum soaked peat. Frost is not handy in the locality of Hedley hill, but pine is plentiful, so in odd times during the summer a number of farmers cut stakes 6 inches in diameter and 4 feet long and provided themselves with kerosene.

At 8 o'clock the other evening the experimenters fell to 28 degrees, and the thermometer put their stakes to soak. At midnight they set them up, 50 to the acre, in the buckwheat field and by 1 a. m. had them blazing and smoking. Every man who tried the plan saved his crop. On other farms, where nothing was done, the probable yield is reduced at least two-thirds. The "frost torches" cost in all a half cent each.—New York Sun.
