**Eight Lives Lost.**  
DIXON PARK, Mich., Oct. 9.—A disaster on Lake Superior, by which not less than eight lives were lost, came to light yesterday, when a drifting boat was picked up by the crew of the Muskegon life saving station. The derrick was sighted yesterday afternoon, and by the aid of strong glasses it was ascertained that the craft was disabled and drifting.

The craft was found to be a fishing boat of the large size which operates in this part of Lake Superior. Those on board had left Whitefish Point October 7 for Trout Point. There were on board a crew of at least five and W. H. Carpenter, his wife and one child. No one was found on the wrecked boat. It is impossible to learn the names of the crew, and it is believed all have been lost.

At TRIN, Mich., Oct. 9.—William Carpenter, who is supposed to have been lost from the captured fish boat found near Trout Park yesterday, was an extensive fisherman, and was moving his plant from Whitefish Point to this place. His brother Edward was with him, but the names of the rest of the crew are unknown. It is believed that their boat capsized eight miles from the Deer Park life-saving station in Saturday's northeast gale, which prevailed throughout the night. It was the last trip of the season.

The carpenter is reported to have been a short time ago resident of this city. A telegram was received here Monday announcing the sad fate, but nothing further could be learned.
