### Cleaned From The Proceedings of The County Board.

The annual meeting of the board of supervisors of Schoharit county was held at the clerk's office, Monday morning, Oct. 9, at 10 o'clock.

Chairman W. H. Hill being absent J. H. McCallum was appointed chairman pro tem.

All present at roll call were P. M. H. Quick, Pres. Village of Manistigue, Geo. Gray, Invoval; John Linton, Secy; W. H. Hill, Manistigue.

Ross Wheeler presented credentials as proxy for Supervisor J. E. Smith, which was accepted by the board. Upon motion the board proceeded to audit the bills presented. The afternoon session was adjourned until Friday, Oct. 13, 1893.

The board again met Friday morning pursuant to adjournment. All members present except A. C. Hubbard and Geo. Gray.

The reports of the Sheriff and jail inspectors were read and placed on file. A resolution was then offered that the chairman of the board be authorized to execute a contract with the Board of Health for the purchase of the board and main dinner of prisoners convicted and sentenced by the courts of said county of Schoharit to said Detroit House of Corrections, said contract to require for the period of five years from and including this date.

At the afternoon session the board proceeded to the equalization of the assessment rolls. The assessment rolls of the several townships show the value of the real and personal property in the county to be \$2,553,500. It was resolved that the said assessment rolls be equalized by deducting from and adding to the assessed valuation of real estate of the several townships as follows: By deducting from Manistigue township fifteen thousand dollars, from Thompson township five thousand dollars, by adding to Doyle township twenty thousand dollars.

The board then adjourned until Saturday morning at 10 o'clock.

The board convened Saturday at the time specified and all the members were present.

The following sums were given by the Auditor General as appropriation to the county of Schoharit, \$5,081.64, as its proportion of the state tax for the year A. D. 1893. The following sum is to be raised for general county purposes \$10,000 and for county poor fund the sum of \$4,000 making total county tax of \$29,000.

The afternoon session was attended by all the members except A. C. Hubbard.

Upon motion W. H. Hill, Geo. MacLaurin and County Clerk Ashford were appointed as a committee to open bids for printing of pamphlets of proceedings of this board.

The following resolution was offered by L. M. French and supported by Geo. MacLaurin:

Resolved, That all orders drawn on the county treasurer prior to January 1, 1894 draw interest at the rate of 8 per cent. per annum until March 15, 1894.
