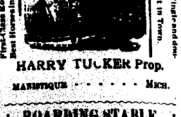

No Tolerant of Anarchists.
No amount of watchfulness, no degree of personal vigilance, no amount of effort will enable us to prevent the bomb-throver from hurling us to death. IRON MOUNTAIN, Mich., Nov. 27.

ABSOLUTELY PURE

New York, Nov. 25.—R. G. Dun's weekly review of trade says to-day: Consumption increases slowly, and all branches of business are awaiting for its growth. There has been a 25 percent improvement in stocks, about \$1.25 for trusts, while the price of products has declined a little on the whole, but the volume of business has somewhat increased.

Exchanges through clearing houses outside New York show a decrease of only 7.7 per cent, for although last year's business at this season was extraordinary, the week ended Thanksgiving last year, are only this year's 35 per cent less than those of last year, the decrease for the latest week being even smaller in freight earnings.

Trade waits for the revival of industries and the work's returns respecting industrial progress are rather conflicting. There has been a heavy sale of cotton goods at very satisfactory prices, and the market has decidedly a strengthening appearance. Sales of wool have been the largest since September, 1892, amounting at three chief markets to 8,285,200 pounds, against 4,813,500 for the same period last year, and which is said many purchasers are of a speculative character, there are no orders that large buying by our own mills is prompted by increasing orders. In the manufacture of boots and shoes, the demand employs an increasing number of factories, and the orders are in much larger amount for the season than formerly in any year. The shipments from Boston, according to the Shoe and Leather Reporter, show a decline of 12 per cent, for the week. A gradual increase in the business is reported at all centers, not wholly confined to goods for home use.
