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What wonderful people are the French! At the moment is coming on the minds of the people of the world for the coming Paris Exposition. Electricity applied to Farm Work.
An interesting example of electricity applied to farm work is now operating at a Scotch farm. The whole of the usual farm machinery, such as threshing, sawing, cutting and the like are here driven by an electric motor. The electricity is generated by water power; the turbine wheel which drives the dynamo being about 1,000 yards from the farm. The electric current is conveyed by underground wires to the house and farm, in each of which a storage battery is placed in each place. These supply the electric current for lighting and other purposes when the machinery is not working. The whole of the mansion is illuminated by electric light and an electric motor is now provided for pumping the water for domestic purposes. At the farm there is a large electric motor of sixteen horse-power, which is arranged to drive the farm machinery. This it does quite easily, as it works smoothly and quietly. It requires no governor, as the speed does not vary whatever the load may be. Another feature of interest is the ease and quickness of starting; there is no waiting to get up steam, as the motor is at once started by moving over the switch handle. There are many places where water power running to waste would be used in a similar manner.

An Official Acknowledgment.

The second year of Democratic administration at Washington began on March 4. The Department of Agriculture, presided over by that sterling free trader, Secretary Morton, in its monthly report for March, 1894, "issued by authority of the Secretary of Agriculture," refers to the condition of the country during the first year of Democratic ascendancy as follows:

"There is reason no doubt, however, whether the consumption of shell for food during the year ending March 1, 1894, has been as great as 4 1/2 bushels per capita. It is not probable that there has been any reduction in the quantity of shell actually eaten, but in the matter of waste there was a margin for retrenchment. in the saving of food for the benefit of the needy on whose behalf the appeals for help have been so frequent and urgent.

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The Velocity of the Earth.

Every body knows that the earth makes one complete revolution on its axis in every 24 hours. But how long, have any idea of the rate of speed necessary to accomplish that feat.

The highest velocity ever attained by a cannon ball has been estimated at 1,620 feet per second, which is equal to a mile in 3.5 seconds. The earth in making one revolution every 24 hours must turn with a velocity nearly equal to a cannon ball.

In short, the rate of speed at the equator has been estimated at exactly 1,000 feet per second, or a mile in 3.0 seconds. Therefore it has been calculated that if a cannon ball were fired due west and could maintain its initial velocity independent of the earth, and could keep up the speed with which it left the mouth of the gun, it would beat the sun in his apparent journey around the earth.

Has Rested for Fifty Years.

A story which drifts over from Maine recalls that pathetically delightful story—delightful because it ends so triumphantly for the rebel—of Miss Wilkins' "The Revolt of Mother."

Nearly fifty years ago this Maine mother hung up her dish cloth one morning after washing the breakfast dishes and announced: "There! I'm not going to do any more work."

MINNEAPOLIS, April 24.—Private dispatches received at Northern Pacific headquarters this morning are to the effect that the sheriff from Livingston, Mont., with a large posse has succeeded in overhauling the Butte Coyotes at Columbus, Mont., and that there is a pit-hat battle now in progress for the possession of the Northern Pacific train stolen by the commonwealth.

It is stated by a Great Northern official that Organizer Hogan is at the head of the Butte contingent and that this is the reason why he left the Great Northern conference committee and returned to Montana. Further information in possession of the railroad train, arrived at Billings, Montana, at 11 a. m.

A force of 75 marshals attempted to take possession of the train, but the mob, who were armed, prevented them. Shots were exchanged and the Coxey leader, James Hogan, was shot three times. The wounded were serious. The deputies were surprised, their axes taken from them, and the mob got on the train again and the journey was resumed eastward. The military will now meet them on the Dakota line. Maj. Gen. Schofield, commanding the army, last night sent a telegram to Gen. Meitt, commanding the department of Dakota, instructing him by direction of the president to arrest all the persons engaged in the unlawful seizure of the Northern Pacific train at Billings, and to hold the train and all on board until they can be delivered to the United States marshal for Montana, subject to the order of the United States district court.
