Call for the Republican County Convention.

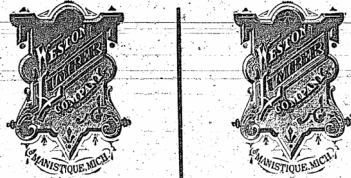
