Nearly Killed Carnot.
Assassin Santo, the young Italian who murdered President Carnot, is a hawker by profession. He is said to be very ignorant, having no education; just the right kind of material out of which to make a model anarchist. His sister and his late employer say he was "infatuated with anarchy," and made himself useful to the cause by distributing incendiary pamphlets, etc. He became "infatuated with anarchy" — how? By attending anarchist meetings and hearing the talented orators of all governments preach treason. All that was vicious or devilish in his nature was appealed to, developed, cultivated. All that was good in him was smothered, strangled. He is a fair type of the foreign anarchist. He is a fair representation of the masses led and controlled by clever and brainy advocates and leaders of anarchy.

Assassin Santo is living true to mottoes of that freedom of speech which means license to preach treason, denounce and defy law and authority, urge men to commit crimes and even violate their oath of allegiance to the devil. Of such is the kingdom of anarchy.
Who rests the responsibility? Assassin Santo was made an anarchist and a murderer by this "freedom of speech" in France. There are thousands of ignorant and vicious men who have been made anarchists by such freedom

of speech in this country. Where does the responsibility begin and where does it end? Are the supporters of good government, the defenders of law and order, the true and loyal people, entirely blameless when such freedom of speech leads to such results.
"Kill, burn and destroy," says anarchy, and we protest against and do not prohibit such freedom of speech. Then our anarchy kills, burns or destroys, we are shocked at such "dastardly outrages." Then we demand punishment of the persons guilty upon the man who was taught and urged to commit crime, but we permit those who taught him to do such things to go and do likewise. We hunt down the graduate from the college of crime but we let the college go on turning out more graduates.

Is this what freedom of speech means, then? Anarchy does not mean this. It is time to say very plainly, "outlook. If it does not mean this it is time to say so."

Forty Years, 1854-1894.
The call for the republican state convention for July 31st marks a notable epoch. It marks the completion of forty years since the organization of the republican party in Michigan. It is not necessary to say that Michigan led the way, and that the first state convention ever held by the republican party was that which assembled under the oaks at Jackson, July 6, 1854.

A whole generation has passed away since then, and a new nation has been born, or the nation has had a new birth. It is hardly possible to estimate the distance we have traversed in those forty years. Measured by events, the ground would be estimated by epochs rather than by decades. The men who inaugurated the great movement, who organized and pushed the first party, have nearly all passed away.

Among those who signed the call for that historic convention were Zachariah Chandler, Jacob M. Howard, Henry P. Baldwin, Franklin Moore, Hovey K. Clark, John Ward, John A. Bagley, Elmer B. Owen, Charles M. Crosswell, Austin Blair, Isaac P. Christianity and Charles T. Gorham. Of these, Governor Blair and General Gorham are still among us, but all the others must have gone over to the majority. But what a galaxy it was! What strong sterling men and what a record they have made!

A review of those forty years ought to be an inspiration to the republicans of Michigan as they look back and see what has been achieved, and take no courage for the accomplishment of the tasks yet remaining before them. One only, during those forty years, has the administration of state affairs passed out of the control of the republican party, and that for the two years following 1860. But the long-to-be-remembered "squawk" legislation of the day, gave the people such a taste of democracy that it is likely to last them for generations.

The growth and development of the state during this period has been something almost marvellous. From a population of 507,521, in 1854, it has grown to a population of two and a quarter millions in 1894. In 1854 the valuation of real and personal property in the state was \$120,362,464.35. In 1891 it was \$1,390,000,000. In 1854 the number of acres of land assessed was 12,167,812.84; in 1891 it was 32,171,787.00.

In 1858 we had but 703 miles of railroad in the state; in 1893 there were 6,957 miles. In 1855 we shipped 1,449 tons of iron ore. In 1890, 7,185,130 tons. In 1854 the salt industry had not begun. In 1890 we produced 4,000 barrels. In 1890 we produced 3,828,937 barrels.

It is not in these facts of material growth that the most important progress of the state appears. It is in the upbuilding of institutions, the advance of civilization, the development of high social conditions and the magnificent exhibition of patriotic devotion to the nation and to liberty that we see the real grandeur of the state. As the republicans of Michigan assembled in this fortieth anniversary convention, let them do honor to the memory of the great men who founded the

party, and to the men who through this long generation, in peace and in war, have successfully conducted its affairs, and to those numerous fresh upon the future, shall be worthy of the past.

This notable epoch ought not to pass without due commemoration.—Detroit Tribune.
