If reports are correct, there will be several tickets in the field this fall.

Mr. Schapel, of Thompson, is reported to be in the city on business. Dr. Boven was summoned there early this morning.

Lake Michigan was rough Thursday night. One of the Hart boats was sheltered at St. Helena, for five hours, and the other boats were not out until after midnight.

We learn that tickets in this part of the state intend to organize for an active campaign this fall. A full county ticket will be put in the field, and it is further rumored that Walter Thomas Mills may be a candidate for the legislature. He will take the stump for the success of that ticket.

The Pullman works are starting up and the managers have been about getting all the new ties out and work for. The same reports reach us from the mines, where men quit a month or six weeks ago. Laborers do not quit unless they are not employed, and protection from employers. Most of the troops have been withdrawn.

According to Dr. Laver and Debs, the A. R. F. people are throwing away about \$2,000,000 every year in a salary to Debs. They could have a salary of \$20,000 every year, which they are now doing. He seems to be only about a week's class clerk—a kind of herald to cry out and tell the other fellows after a thing has been done.

The effect of the business depression is shown in the form of a decline in railway construction. During the first half of 1894, ending June 30, the railway age reports less construction than in any corresponding period for thirty years. In twenty-three states and territories no new track was laid, the largest addition being single state was 54 miles.

A great Chicago Wednesday caused a loss of nearly \$3,000,000; two persons killed and four injured. It broke out in the lumber yards along the west and south branches of the Chicago river. A high wind was blowing at the time and by the heaviest work the fire brought under control. Cause not known.—The John Sarg Lumber Company lost \$100,000 by it.

From this time on the republicans are in line of battle. The state ticket announced is a good one and must take a hand in this contest, by organizing a strong county ticket. Republican clubs should at once be organized in each township and a thorough canvass made. Let this be a campaign of honest, hard work, and in November can rejoice over the overwhelming defeat of our opponents.

Rev. J. C. Rooney, Mr. and Mrs. H. Quick, Geo. Chantler and Mason H. Quick, delegates to the Methodist Baptist Association, which met at Indianapolis on Wednesday last, returned home yesterday. They report an interesting meeting. M. H. Quick, of this city was elected Moderator and Rev. G. A. Hemmings, of Crystal Falls, Clerk. The meeting next year will be held in the latter named city.

It is rumored that the Democrats will shortly hold their county convention; but it is not yet quite clear who will be their nominees. We have heard one or two names mentioned as candidates for this or that office; but it is not certain that they will be. The leaders seem to be on a still hunt and are yet undecided as to what policy will be. Republicans are not frightened at anything they hear from that quarter.

One of the most important advances in favor of women that has been made recently is the unanimous adoption of the resolution by the Board of Regents of the State University of Michigan. Resolved: That hereafter in the selection of professors, instructors and other assistants for the University no distinction be made between men and women, but that the applicant best fitted for the position receive the appointment.

Republicans are recently appointed postmaster. That county is the one that turns out something like 8,000 republican voters and we presume that there wasn't a democrat in the district to take the office. There are a good many polling precincts in N. Y. that will be nearly made voters of the democratic party this fall.

The vigorous campaign conducted by the women suffrage in New York before the assembling of the Constitutional convention appears to have had an adverse effect. The committee on suffrage, by a vote of 13 to 4, has decided to report against all propositions on the subject, except one in regard to school elections. The committee even rejected the proposition to submit the question to a vote of the people. Probably the strong protest of women who do not deem it wise to confer the ballot upon their sex had much to do with this action. It remains to be seen what the convention will do in the matter.

Queen falls has sent another delegate to Washington to intercede with the President on the subject of her restoration to power. She wants recognition by this government; but will not get it; although Grover and his allies are ready to recognize her as president. Still there is a congress block of him that will checkmate his every move and there is back of congress the people that are opposed to anything like a restoration of form of government. Besides, Grover has all he can do to control the democratic senate on the tariff question. Lil must take a back seat until a more convenient season.

The bill ending the talk to frame a state constitution has received the President's signature, and is now a law. The Senate committee on territories has ordered a favorable report on the bill, which was already passed by the House for the admission of Arizona and New Mexico. When these three territories come into the Union there will be none left but Oklahoma, the Indian Territory, and Alaska. The immense area west of the Mississippi, part of which was the Louisiana purchase, and the remainder wrested from Mexico, will practically all have been converted into states. In order to get the states hereafter we will have to divide up old ones, open up Alaska, purchase the remainder of the Indian Territory, and admit Oklahoma.

Three of the original articles in the August Review of Reviews are devoted to Canadian topics. A sketch of Attorney-General Nova Scotia, while the editor of the magazine, Dr. Albert Shaw, writes on "Toronto as a Municipal Object Lesson." Each of these articles is full of information about affairs beyond our northern border. Canadian politics and government are subjects as to which our education here in "the States" has been sadly neglected. The Review of Reviews is doing a useful service in acquainting its readers more fully with the institutions of our neighbors across the line.
