Semi-Weekly Pioneer.

Dr. C. Mason for State Senator.
Hon. Edward Mason, member of
the republican party for state senator
from the 29th district of Missouri, at
the convention held at Fayetteville
Monday, the 21st inst. Dr. Mason presided
at the convention. He was re-elected
and was upon the same night nomi-
nated.

The convention was called to order
by James A. Cooper, of Monmouth,
chairman of the senatorial committee
of the county. The permanent
committee consisted of the following
members: J. W. Bidwell, of Monmouth,
temporary secretary, both gentlemen be-
ing afterwards made the permanent
officers. The following gentlemen, upon
motion, were appointed by the
chairman upon the several commit-
tees: J. E. Bland, of Fayetteville, chair-
man of the permanent committee;
H. Walton, of Monmouth, permanent
organization; F. Schütz, of Monmouth,
J. W. McMahon, of Clippewa; Dr. Baily
Marking, of Fayetteville; S. H. Bidwell,
of Clippewa; W. B. Fuller, of Clippewa;
J. W. Bidwell, of Clippewa. The reports
of the committees were then read
and adopted. The senatorial
committee will be composed of the
chairman of the several county com-
mittees in the district, and the chair-
man of the committee to be chosen
from the county having the largest representa-
tion in the convention. Messrs. E. P.
Bedford, A. P. Smith and W. C. Brown
were chosen by the chairman as dele-
gates. The call was then made by
the chairman for the nominations. J. W.
McMahon, in a well worded but short
speech, presented the name of Elliot
Davidson of Clippewa, and Dr. Baily
Marking, of Monmouth, the name of
Richard Nelson of the same. The
name of Richard Nelson was then pre-
sented by A. P. Smith, of Delta, and
lastly the name of Joseph Fleishman
was placed before the convention by
James A. Cooper, of Monmouth.

Upon motion, the first ballot taken
was in informal one which resulted as
follows:
Davidson—Clippewa, 8 votes; Mc-
Mahon, 5 votes; Love, 1 vote; School-
craft, 5 votes; total 19 votes.
Nelson—Delta, 9.57 votes.
Fleishman—Monmouth, 13 votes;
Delta, 1.47 votes; total 14.47 votes.
The second and third informal bal-
lots were the same as the above except
that the votes of Delta and Monmouth
were sold for their respective dele-
gates. The fourth ballot, a formal
one, resulted the same for Davidson
but the Monmouth delegation threw
75 votes for Nelson giving him 21
votes, placing him in nomination,
and wild applause of the delegation
and others in attendance. The nomi-
nation was made unanimous.

A committee was sent for Mr. Mason
and Mr. Davidson, and both gentlemen
most heartily thanked the delegation
for the support they were given.
The following resolution was read
by C. S. Osborn and adopted:
Resolved, That we endorse
the national republican platform of
1902 and the present republican plat-
form of the state of Michigan.

2nd. That we hold the party in
power responsible for the business de-
pression and the consequent great suffer-
ing of our citizens, directly result-
ing from the demerits acquiring the
wins of government.

3rd. That we insist with alarm and
determined protest against the action
of the democratic party, in its legisla-
tion in the 53d congress, which so
manifestly and so strongly in the in-
terest of England and other countries,
and we do hereby pledge ourselves to
remain, as we ever have been, true to
America and to American interests as
represented in her laborers, her manu-
facturers and her miners.

4th. We pledge ourselves a hearty
support of the nomination of our repub-
lican party during the campaign and
on election day in November.
