It is believed that a general revision of the laws relating to fish and game should be made during the coming session of the legislature, in order that greater uniformity therein may be secured and present conflicting provisions eliminated, and to that end a full attendance of all clubs and persons is urged to the coming meeting.

Extra Pioneer.  
The Pioneer of the 19th contains an article headed "Another Sensation," the facts in regard to which are briefly as follows: It seems that the Catholic priest at this place, Father Joseph Dupuisier, living on regular housekeeper was in the habit of having his housework done by the young girls of his congregation, who would be sent singly and in complete ignorance to the passages by their parents for that purpose. He made attempts to assault four or five of these girls at different times and about the 24th of last month succeeded in forcibly committing a rape on one of them. It is charged that during the succeeding week he forcibly violated this girl four times, and made attempt at least on three others. This girl is a mere child of about fifteen years, and very much for her age. The priest told them that if they ever told he had the power to "make them strike them dead," and by such threats so terrified them that they dare not tell their parents. This went on for nearly a month, when one of the girls relatives of the child notified that something was the matter with her, questioned her, and obtained from her the whole revolting story. He at once told her parents, and on the evening of the 13th her father swore out a warrant for his arrest before Justice H. G. Squires, which was placed in the hands of Constable Bonefas and Marshal Onstaid; but when they arrived at the parsonage the child had flown. He had been notified of what was going on while the warrant was in preparation, by a prominent member of community, and of the church, who says he advised him to "skip" to avoid a scandal of the church. The warrant was then given to deputy sheriff, John Healy, who followed him to Manistique; but did not succeed in making an arrest. Your correspondent withholds the names of the girls implicated for the present for obvious reasons; but the above facts as charged in the complaint. It is to be hoped the authorities of this county will leave nothing undone to bring this man to justice if guilty, which there seems small room for doubt.
