WARSHIPS OPEN FIRE

FOREIGN FLEET AT CANEA BOMBARD CRETAN INSURGENTS.

Were Warned to Desist From an Attack on the Turks but Refused—King George Appals to the Case, Interceding for His Support.

CANEA, Island of Crete, Feb. 22.—A fusillade followed since morning, despite the warnings of the foreign admirals, the united squadrons bombarded the insurgent camp outside Canea.

At 4:30 o'clock in the afternoon signals were made to H. M. S. Dryad, H. M. S. Harrier and H. M. S. Revenge, together with one Russian, one Russian and one German ship to open fire on the Cretan position where the Greek flag was hoisted some days ago.

At 4:45 the insurgents at Akrotiri, having attacked the Turkish garrisons at Harepa, the joint fleet bombarded the Cretas for 25 minutes. The insurgents hid behind their flag with them.

Later reports are to the effect that the English men-of-war opened the engagement. The oblong followed. The Kaiser's Augusta fired incandescent shells.

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AN ACT OF REVENGE.

Further Developments in the North Dakota Tragedy.

BESMONG, Feb. 20.—Further developments in the tragedy at Winton show it to have been more horrible than at first reported. The murder occurred Wednesday afternoon but was not discovered till Thursday morning.

From appearances Mrs. Rouse made it is a case of a struggle for her life and that of her children. Mrs. Walden, the old lady, was killed near the stove and the body dragged to the cellar.
