ADMIRAL SELFRIDGE IN COMMAND OF THE MEDITERRANEAN SQUADRON.

The Greek Americans who have crossed the Atlantic to fight for their country may be the cause of some little perplexity. These who have become American citizens are liable to demand American protection if captured and parley would naturally be unwilling to grant it.

A Midnight Blaze.
