Reports from the secretary and treasurer were submitted which proved that a very satisfactory year's business had been done the past year.

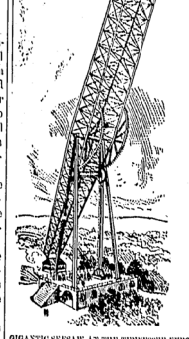

A NASHVILLE NOVELTY.
 Gigantic Screen One of the Sights of the Tennessee Exposition.
 Perhaps you remember playing soccer when you were a child and being lifted to the dizzy height of seven or eight feet on the end of a hand bar on the top of a rail fence. If you go to the Tennessee centennial exposition at Nashville this summer, you will be able to play the same game on a much larger scale. There is to be erected on the grounds of the exhibition a gigantic screen which will lift 25 persons at once to the height of 160 feet.

This monster ladder is to be built of steel. Instead of a rail fence, the axis

will be the top of a tower 75 feet high. On this will be balanced a steel truss 100 feet long. At the ends of the truss will hang cars in which passengers can be comfortably accommodated while they swing through an immense arc. When raised to its utmost height, each car will be 160 feet above its starting place, which, taken in connection with the height of the terrace and the base of the tower, will give an elevator greater than that afforded by the famous Ferris wheel at Chicago and amply sufficient to give even the stoutest heart a thrill.

Around the base of the tower will be a pavilion 60 feet square, which will contain a dance hall, a cafe and other amusements. It certainly will furnish the power to keep the show in motion. Work has been begun on this terrific extraordinary, and it will soon be completed, as the design is of simple construction.

After the Railroads.
 Governor Pingree has created a sensation by his declaration that he will not allow the legislature to adjourn until some laws to tax railroads and other corporate property at higher rates are passed. He threatens to call the legislators together in special session as often as they shall adjourn without passing the laws which he favors.

The Meritt bill, passed by the senate, provides an increase of \$100,000 annually in the specific taxes to be paid by the railroads, but the governor still says the taxes are inadequate. An attempt will be made in the house by Pingree's friends to have the proposed increase in specific taxes doubled so as to put \$300,000 more taxes on Michigan railroads.

Governor Pingree says that he is not particular what kind of taxation is imposed on railroads as long as they do their share. He would be willing to let the Meritt bill go for raising taxes for the whole state if the localities through which all roads run would be able to tax the railroads on the real estate which they own there. This would even things up, leaving the value of rolling stock and the franchises of the companies to be covered by the specific tax on receipts.

The GREEK MINISTER.
 Career of the New Leader Who Has Taken the Helm at Athens.

The man of the hour just now in Greece is Demetrius Hall, who has jumped from the station of leader of the opposition to the post of prime minister. The new premier is about 60 years old, and for over 20 years has been conspicuous in public life. His father is a professor in the University of Athens. At that institution Demetrius was educated, and then he finished his law studies in Paris.

On returning to Athens he soon became a successful lawyer, and in 1875 entered the political arena. He was elected a member of the chamber of deputies in that year and has been successively returned ever since. As a deputy his name attracted attention by his royal, whose most pointed shafts he incessantly directed against the royal abuse of power and royal extravagance.

His most memorable protest was when he publicly denounced the king for converting a warship into a private yacht. When the late M. Tricoups was premier and ran things with a high hand

 under royal favor, M. Hall was the only supply who had the courage to oppose him, and he won the esteem of the people by fearlessly speaking his mind in the chamber. His party has not always been in the minority, for he was minister of justice in 1880 and minister of the interior in 1892.

As long ago as 1890 M. Hall drew an attention of the government to the inefficiency of the army, and he has since then been continually demanding a reorganization of the Greek forces, but his advice went unheeded. After the death of Tricoups and the accession of Dolyanitis to the premiership M. Hall became the acknowledged leader of the opposition. Now he is virtually at the head of the government, for he has insisted on having a ministry composed of men of his own choice. He has refused to accept the distinction, for he and the latter is left with no control over his ministers.

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
