After being given nearly five years in which to comply with the car-coupler law the object of which is to prevent accidents that now bring death to several hundred trainmen every year, the railroads appear before the interstate commerce commission and ask for five years more in which to equip their cars with the life saving device.

The President recommends Hawaiian annexation, and, as usual, the President is right. It is American now, and for the future. Anything else would be un-American. The marvelous mechanism of the human body and the still more marvelous control which the mind exercises over it, have been strikingly illustrated in New York during the past week. For six days and nights, with slight intermission, men have sat astride of the bicycle and pedaled constantly round and round the circular track at as rapid a pace as they could command until the motion became automatic. With ordinary wheelmen flesh and blood would long since have succumbed to the fearful strain. But in the case of the experts who have persisted, or rather been goaded on by their trainers to the end of the race, bodily suffering has been endured to the verge of dissolution. With haggard faces and vacant expressions these living automations have gone on and on, until their very appearance has become shocking to the spectators. But the bodily condition of the contestants has not

been the worst result of the strain. The mental effects have been even more pitiable than the physical. Raving madness or strange hallucination has taken possession of most of the contestants and deprived them of all reasoning power. Still the power of the will over the body acted unflinchingly until the last moment of the race. All previous records have been broken by this wonderful six-days' contest. It has been an astonishing exhibition of what flesh and blood can do when driven on by the intangible power of the will. But the sacrifice has been too great. Such prostration of human powers is not a commendable thing, however remarkable it may prove as an exhibition of endurance. It is trifling with life, mental and physical, it is brutalizing as a spectacle and degrading to public taste. On the grounds of humanity and public morals such exhibitions ought to be prohibited. Free Press.

**THAT CHINESE WALL.**  
How about the Chinese wall? In August and September, 1896, under the Wilson-Gorman monstrosity, our exports to Belgium were worth \$5,149,519 in the same months of 1897 they were worth \$1,086,540. In these two months of 1896 our exports to France were of the value of \$6,929,634, and in 1897 they counted as \$1,429,437. Our exports to all parts of the world stood at \$107,077,786 in August and September of 1896, and at \$13,144,636 for the like period of 1897.

The Democrats told us that as soon as we bought less from foreign countries we should sell less to them; and they spoke of the new Tariff as a Chinese wall, designed to keep out trade. Well in round numbers, we bought less by \$15,000,000 from foreign countries in August and September of this year than in the corresponding period of 1896 but we sold more to foreign nations by considerably over \$24,000,000. These figures prompt the question. How about the Chinese wall?—Inter Ocean.

**PROTECTION AND "LUCK."**  
Many of the Free-Trade papers have been doing a lot of talking about the great "luck" of the McKinley administration in "coming into power just at the time when prosperity was returning to the country." They have only got the cart before the horse. This is what is to be expected of men who put foreign interests before American interests. They get accustomed to seeing things twisted.

The facts are better expressed by saying that prosperity began to return to the country just as soon as the McKinley administration came into power, or, rather, just as soon as it was known that Major McKinley was elected and that Protection was to be given in the near future to American industries. It is a little trick which prosperity has—to come back to the country just as soon as Protection replaces Free-Trade. We have seen it do it more than once in the history of the country.

In applying the term "luck" to what has happened the Free-Traders are following in the steps of those shiftless, imprudent, short-sighted neighbors of the prudent, industrious man of sound judgement, who enviously attribute the rewards of his industry and good judgement to his "luck." Our present prosperity is due to no luck, but to the sound American policy of giving Protection to American industries, of securing the home market to American producers and of providing workmen at American wages.—Economicist.

**RUSSIANS AND MUSLIMS.**  
Russia's official admission that there is danger of a Moslem outbreak in her Asiatic province, is preliminary, probably, to the advance of a formidable Russian army to the frontier. When the Russian government sends broadcast information of this character there is generally a large-sized African in the woodpile. Previous to the Turko-Russian war in 1877 Russia encouraged the circulation of details as to the Bulgarian massacres. When her own people and the people of other Christian

nations were duly informed and excited the Russian army crossed the Pruth.  
Some months ago it was intimated that Russia could settle the Armenian question in two weeks, and there was a very general agreement among the European powers that the advance of a Russian army into Turkish Armenia would be inadvisable. Now, when Kousa admits that the Moslems in the Caucasus and in her other Asiatic provinces are stirred to rebellion by the success of the Turks in Greece, it may be taken for granted that there will be no Moslem rebellion. The Russian army will be prepared for such outbreaks, and Europe has been notified formally to expect a demonstration against the Moslems.

According to the latest returns there are in North Caucasia and the trans-Caucasian district 3,615,000 members of the orthodox Greek church, 984,000 Armenians, 2,105,000 Sunnite Moslems. There is little conflict in these figures, but it has been the policy of Russia in all the Asiatic provinces recently conquered to conciliate the inhabitants. New rules in the direction of the suppression of cruelty and brutality have been adopted, and travelers have remarked the great change in the frontier countries since Russia took possession. It is not probable that any great Moslem agitation will be permitted in Russian territory. The government is proceeding on the theory that prevention is better than cure. The policy is to put a strong Russian army where it will do the most good, and Europe has been notified by wire to look out for it.
