Prof. J. A. Chisholm, our popular commissioner of schools, took several handsome photographs of the Picture Rocks last summer, and the American Book Co. has decided to use them in a new advanced Geography which will be issued shortly.

Our police force needs re-adjustment. Under the present plan the two highest priced men patrol the town during the day time, while Officer Hayden, who receives the least wages, looks after the city at night. The arrests made in daylight do not exceed two a month, while the arrests made at night average more than two a night. One officer is ample to keep the peace during the daytime, and Officer Hayden should have an assistant at night.

W. A. McKinney received some sugar beet seed last spring from the U. S. Dept. of Agriculture. He planted some of these, and sent two of the beets to Washington for analysis. The average of sugar they contained was 12.3 per cent. The average yield per acre, using Mr. McKinney's yield as a basis would exceed 22 tons to the acre. As beets are worth \$5 per ton it is easy to compute that there would be much money in beet culture in the vicinity of a factory. The soil and climate of the upper peninsula are adapted for the successful cultivation of beets. A factory in schoolcraft county would worth thousands of dollars to the farmers of the county.

In a letter recently received by the writer from Mr. A. C. Hubbell, he states that the Rainy Lake country is coming to the front as a gold producing country. At least \$250,000.00 in gold was taken out of the country this year and the estimate for 1908 is a round million. He also says: "the Randolph mine is a bonanza. We are down 135 feet and the ore goes \$45 to the ton. Will soon start on second level. Air compressors will soon be put in so as to carry the work forward. We are assured that we have a splendid paying property in the Randolph Property in Rainy Lake country is being bought up this winter very fast. The country is booming, development work is in progress very fast all over that country. I shall start work for the mine about January 10, to be gone about two weeks."
