SCHOOLCRAFT COUNTY MUST DO SO
IF IT EXPECTS TO PROGRESS.

AN OLD FASHIONED COUNTRY FAIR.
Such an institution would pay for itself
now. It will pay for itself annually as an in-
vestment.

The time is ripe for the organization
of an agricultural society in School-
craft county. Farming has passed
the experimental stage in this county.
For years it has been demonstrated
that the conditions of soil and climate
are such that crops the equal of those
raised in the middle states can suc-
cessfully be raised here. Fruits of all
kinds thrive here also.

The chief industry of this country
has been lumbering during the past 25
years. The insatiable maw of demand
has made vast inroads into the virgin
pine and hardwood tracts of the coun-
try during recent years, so that the
beginning of the end is in sight. The
future of the county will soon be at
stake. It only hopes lies in the utili-
zation of its desirable farming lands.

As we have said before, farming has
passed the experimental stage in this
country. All that is necessary is that
its devotees should receive the proper
encouragement. This encouragement
can best be extended by the holding
of county fairs, where the products of
the soil may be displayed for the pur-
pose of inciting competition and ad-
vancing the public and systematic
cultivation of our resources, whether
from other states might be indetermi-
nate here. Every new bonafide set-
tler is a great acquisition.

Manistique's future is at a state al-
so. We have here the location and
nucleus for a large city. This city has
enjoyed a rapid and substantial
growth since its inception. While de-
pendent upon the lumber industry for
its sustenance in the past yet we are
sufficiently optimistic to think that
when the familiar music of the saw
shall have been hushed, other indus-
tries will take up the refrain and its
conditions will be such that the up-
ward progress of the town will not be
impeded.

Located as it is, Manistique will al-
ways have a place on the map. It is
the natural outlet for a vast territory.
No towns of any size are located with-
in forty miles of it, and its ample
shipping facilities, built by rail and
water, preclude the possibility of its
death. However it is necessary to
fortify it against the shock of transi-
tion. That can best be done by early
development in other lines and in-
dustry industries that stand in need
of supply present life giving neces-
sities in the future.

Farming is bound to become one of
the chief industries of the county, and
Manistique can realize largely upon
the investment if its citizens and
business men show solicitude for that
branch of industry by the construc-
tion of good roads into the interior,
and by encouraging and maintaining
a county fair.

It would not require a very large
sum of money to take the initial step
in the formation of an agricultural
society. A company should be organ-
ized, shares of stock sold, and officers
and directors elected. By taking up
the matter at once, a fair, we could
hold this coming autumn. A thou-
sand or more strangers are living tribu-
tary to this city would no doubt at-
tend. These persons would make their
full purchases here and our mer-
chants would reap a harvest.

Manistique cannot afford to neglect
its opportunities for future advance-
ment. Whether Manistique will pro-
gress or retrograde when the pine is
exhausted, depends wholly upon the
enterprise of its inhabitants.

The pessimist must concede that
there are rifts in the clouds. The re-
sults of the election, the Barrell Chemi-
cal and the White Marble Lime
Co's new mill are indicative of con-
tinued upward progress. The Chicago
Lumbering Co. with its vast invest-
ments in mills, docks and real estate,
will not be content to sacrifice same
when the last monarch of the forest
shall have passed down the river, and
it will undoubtedly devote its energies
in other channels, that will not impede
the upward progress or prosperity of
the town.

Let us foster agriculture and unlet-
tered make an effort to inaugurate a fair.
The step will never be regretted.

In the messages accompanying the vetoes the governor administers a stinging rebuke to the lawmakers for endeavoring "to commit the state to a most pernicious policy of state paternalism and for their failure to pay the Michigan volunteers in the Spanish-American war at least \$4 a day for their services.

It looks from this distance as though the governor had scored again. The legislature, of course, cannot frame a rejoinder to his configuration, but it is difficult to see wherein that body has a reasonable defense.

THE INTERNATIONAL CAR WHEEL COMPANY

In Which Manistique is Interested.

(from Age)

A consolidation of certain car wheel works and charcoal blast furnace properties in the eastern states Canada and Lake Superior district has been effected under the name of the International Car Wheel Company incorporated under the laws of the state of New Jersey, with an authorized capital of \$2,000,000 7 per cent. cumulative preferred stock, and \$10,000,000 common stock.

The consolidation has been effected on the following terms: \$755,000 of the preferred stock and \$3,255,000 of the common stock will be issued in full payment for the real estate, buildings, tools, machinery, plant and good-will of the various consolidating companies. One million dollars of the preferred stock will be sold to provide working capital for the new company. The balance of the preferred and common stock will be reserved for future expansion of the business or the acquisition of other like properties and plant. The new company will not take over the present investments in credits and merchandise, manufactured and unmanufactured stock, iron, etc., and will not assume the liabilities and accounts payable, debts and obligations of any kind of the companies consolidating. Each company will collect their own bills and accounts receivable and also the non-paying debtors, and pay all their outstanding obligations of every kind whatsoever. Manufactured and unmanufactured stock, iron, etc., will be disposed of by each company, but the new company will have the option of purchasing from each consolidating company, at present market value, such manufactured and unmanufactured stock, merchandise, iron, etc., as may be desired.

All real estate, buildings, tools, machinery and plant now used and required for carrying on the business of each consolidating company will be transferred to the new company against the delivery of preferred and common stock as above set forth.

One of the properties acquired by the company is the Marquette Charcoal Iron Furnace property, Manistique, Mich., daily capacity 100 to 125 tons charcoal iron. The furnace Company property includes the supply of ore for this year's operation, and sufficient for operations for a period of 20 years.

It is not the intention to close any of the consolidating plants, as only those have been acquired which have a regular and well established business in supplying steam, electric and other railroads with wheels and castings for regular renewals and new construction. Options have been obtained upon other valuable furnace property, extensive wood supply for charcoal making and ore supply. These properties are now being examined and action will shortly be taken in regard to them. The capacity of the car wheel works acquired will be immediately increased to 2,000 and if necessary to 2500, wheels per day. The furnace property acquired is in shape to start up within a few days and is now supplied with ore for this year's operations.
