A TRICOUNTY INSTITUTE.

Will be held at Manistique for the benefit of Schenckville, Alger and Lake Superior.

A Joint Teachers Institute will be held at Manistique during the week beginning October 16th, for the benefit of the teachers of Schenckville, Alger and Algoma.

Plans are being formulated so that the fares of teachers living in this county who desire to attend, will be paid.

The corps of instructors includes persons of national repute.

They are: Principal W. N. Ferris of the Ferris Industrial School, Big Rapids, who is well and favorably known here; will be conductor and he will be ably assisted by Principal D. B. Wilder and Prof. Flora E. Hill, both of the Northern State Normal School, and Prof. F. D. Davis, of Negaunee, commissioner of schools for Marquette county.

Several county teachers, especially those residing in this city and vicinity do not look with any great degree of favor upon the idea.

While taking the school census, Mr. D. W. Thompson decided to take the census of the town also. The work was very carefully done and the result is correct.

He found that Manistique's population is 5,358, divided as follows:

Then if the Filipinos had not submitted at once to their new masters they would have learned the consequences of withstanding an arbitrary and strong military power.

The talented Cadillac editor, Hon. Percy F. Powers, has formally announced his candidature for the auditor generalship. Mr. Powers is thoroughly competent to fill any position within the gift of the people of the state of Michigan. His thousands of friends throughout the state will deem it a pleasure to work and vote for him.

A country that can be guilty of such a travesty on justice as France has proven herself in the result of the Dreyfus case, deserves a permanent boycott from all systems believing in justice. "Made in France" should no longer favorably influence Americans when making their purchases. The frog eating vampires

should be taught a lesson. Lessons are most effectively taught by heroic treatment.

Speaking of Mexican politics, the Inter Ocean says: The race for the senatorship seems to be a close one. Each candidate has his lieutenants at work all over the state. Every legislative district is "planted," and the real contest will probably be fought to a finish before the Senatorial caucus meets.

There is no good reason why there should be had blood over the matter. Mr. McMillan has a perfect right to count another term, and General Alger has more than earned the right to compete with him for the prize. Much could be said in favor of each candidate, while neither has such transcendent ability as to constitute a claim upon the office. The senate would seriously miss Allison and Aldrich in place of Davis, Morgan, and Lodge in foreign affairs, but Mr. McMillan has never achieved popularity. The general public can well afford to let the two rivals run their race without becoming unjustly excited over the result.

JUDICIAL BUSINESS.

Some people, indeed most people, need to learn the benefits of judicial business. In this busy world the man who takes time to sit down is an exception. He is looked on as a loafer or a tramp. Yet after all the man who sits down a reasonable time can do more work in his day than the man who never sits down.

The Malay race, however, never has done so. It has produced intrepid buccannery, who have explored all Oceania, and desperate pirates. It has never created a stable government or a nationality. It has turned out heroes who were handy with the kris, but never a master of jurisprudence. The Malays made their way to Luzon as did the Normans to England. They conquered and seized the lands of the original inhabitants, the Negritos, as the Normans did those of the Anglo-Saxons. But the Normans knew how to rule. The Malays in the Philippines did not. They remained barbaric tribes, with no more government than trifies of American Indians. Those Malays were not a nation when the Spaniards discovered and occupied the islands. They are not one now. They never had any but tribal relations. There is no Filipino nation. There is simply a multitude of discordant and unorganized tribes. They are no more fit in their present raw state to make a republic of than the Iroquois were of the Arabs.

Whether it would have been better for the United States if Dewey had sailed away is past all finding out. Nobody can know what would have happened in that event. But it is clear that his remaining there was a blessing for the Filipinos. It has saved them from the treatment the Malaysago have received from the French and Asiatic tribes from Russia. They have escaped the club of Germany and the grip of the Great Bear. The Filipinos are, indeed, fortunate to have fallen under the guardianship of the most merciful nation on the face of the earth.—Chicago Tribune.

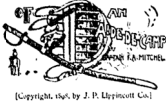

THE MANILA MAIL.

How the Postal System of the Philippines Has Been Improved.

BY JOHN W. WILLIAMS.

The Spanish American war marked a new point in the era of progress in the postal service of this country and fully demonstrated that our postal system was able to meet with efficiency and promptness unforeseen extensions, which in a less thoroughly organized public enterprise would have entailed almost endless confusion and perplexity.

It is true that in the first stages of our occupancy of Cuba, Porto Rico and the Philippines there was some confusion and delay in the transmission of mail, but the promptness with which order was brought out of chaos showed the ability of the postoffice department to grasp and handle the new and complex situation. It was no halcyon task to impart our progressive notions of postal transmission upon Spain's effete and archaic system.

The readers of newspapers are already quite familiar with the story of our postal operations during the military campaign in the West Indies and the establishment and maintenance of mail facilities in Cuba and Porto Rico since the close of hostilities, though comparatively little has been written regarding the operations in the Philippines and the great obstacles which were encountered in getting anything like an efficient service.

On the 6th of June last year congress passed a bill authorizing the establishment of mail facilities in Cuba and Porto Rico and the Philippines, and Director of Post Frank W. Valle, with a number of assistants, was dispatched to the orient, going with the transport expedition which left San Francisco on the 15th of June.

Simultaneously with the capitulation of Manila on the 13th of August Director Valle and his companions established an American postoffice in the old capital of the Philippines. It is related that they entered at the railway about an hour ahead of the United States troops. Before the Spanish garrison had fairly been banished down from the governor's palace—W. S. P. O., Manila, was hung out—if not actually, it was figuratively.

It was the purpose of the new postal authorities to first settle all the postage stamps but it was discovered that there were none in the office to select. It was found that under the Spanish system all stamps were sold by private contractors to an collector of internal revenue, at a discount to private individuals, who in turn sold to the public at face value. One of these contractors had a little booth in the rear of the lobby of the postoffice, and when his place was closed, as it very frequently was, the vendor would purchase stamps had to search for them in the small shops.

The whole postal outfit was found to be very crude. There was not such a thing as a letter case for distribution; that is to say, each piece of mail was similar to postage delivery boxes. Letters were placed in large envelopes on sheets and placed in a canvas bag to be made and sorted on a table. There were four of these envelopes, each with folding doors, with shelves labeled to show what mail they contained.

The boxes for city delivery were arranged around three sides of a quadrangular space, with the fourth side faced the lobby and had two delivery windows. Every boxholder was called to him a postcard receipt, and this was presented by the party calling for mail.

The general delivery case, with its many little boxes for separation of mail alphabetically, to expedite delivery, is an unknown quantity in Manila. There was a carrier service in connection with the Manila postoffice, but it was of the crudest sort. The carriers were paid no salaries by the government, but depended for a living upon the fees they collected from the recipients of the letters. The usual charge was 2 cents for a letter and 1 cent for a paper. There was an entire lack of system in the delivery, and it is a marvel that any letters ever reached their proper destination.

There were none of the obstacles the American postal officers had to encounter. There was the added complication of conducting the office in two languages. It was found advisable to run two general delivery windows, one for Spanish letters exclusively, in charge of Spanish employees, and the other for all other classes, in charge of a soldier.

A LONE LITTLE ISLAND.
Santa Catalina a Federal Possession of Modern Beauty.

One of the unexplored and unknown bits of Uncle Sam's territory is Santa Catalina Island. It lies 20 miles off the coast of southern California and is a little island in the sea. It is the most notable one in that, for all practical purposes, it is a separate and distinct province, being as little under the control of the state or federal government as it is under the control of a feudal lord of the middle ages. A private corporation owns the island and administers its affairs in the most autocratic way imaginable.

This condition of things is owing to an unsettled question of sovereignty between the state and the nation. Were it larger or more valuable the question of its title long ago would have been a matter of weighty discussion in the highest courts of the land.

As it is, it is little more than a piece of land which belongs to the federal government, or a state possession. Santa Catalina, with its length of 22 miles, its width of 7 1/2 miles and its area of 55,000 acres, is included in the United States territory beyond the main continent. Spanish mariners discovered the island. It became a part of the Mexican empire, and was later ceded to the United States along with Alta California and all the great southern territories. Mexico styled Santa Catalina a part of California, and the new possessor of that did not disturb the title. It is doubtful if any one thought enough about the title to contest when it went, and today it appears strange that Mexico did not retain the island as an independent monarchy. Farther to the south, opposite San Diego and only 15 miles from land, are the Coronado Islands, which are still held in Mexico.

Although he is not a Michigan citizen, Prof. Waldo is such by adoption, for he has been a resident of this state practically ever since he was 9 years old; received his education in Michigan, and married a Michigan girl. Born in 1861, in Wyoming Co., N. Y., he removed in 1872 to Plainfield, N. J., where he graduated from the public schools in 1879. In 1881 he entered the Agricultural College, and spent two years there. He entered Albion College in 1885 and completed his course there in 1887, and after graduation taught history and German in the preparatory department of the college. In 1890 he attended the graduate school of Harvard University, and in 1891 became instructor in history and economics in Beloit College, Wisconsin. The next year he was elected to the chair of political science and economy at Albion, which position he has held since. He has been given degrees by Harvard University, University of Michigan, University of Chicago, Beloit College, Michigan Agricultural College and Albion College. In 1890 Prof. Waldo was married to Miss Minnie A. Strong, of Vicksburg, and they have two children, aged 6 and 4 years respectively.
