Some of the professional and amateur howlers have been claiming to see in the recent Wall Street bearishness an indication of the crash which they say is sure to come after such prosperity as the country has been enjoying. The specialists of a few bears in Wall Street hardly have any such significance, and no sign of a crash or of anything but continued prosperity anywhere else. There is not a single bull where, so far as known, is not a single workman anywhere who is not idle from choice. There are no closed factories and none in imminent danger of closing. There is not a railroad which does not find its freight cars too few to accommodate the ever-crowding traffic. There is not a single discouraging sign anywhere.

Our prosperity is stable, and will be lasting, because it rests on a sound foundation. It has its origin in our present system of giving protection to American industries against the assaults of foreign manufacturers who employ the low-priced labor of their own countries. It will take more than Wall Street speculation to disturb either the protective tariff or our prosperity. And the man who sees signs of a crash is the victim of a disordered imagination and of hopeless pessimism. Either that, or else he predicts the thing which he hopes to see. There are men who would gladly see prosperity disappear if they could in consequence thereof see Republicanism and Protection wrecked.

Schurman's annual address at Cornell College last week concluded with the following clear and temperate statement of the United States in the Philippines.

In the Philippine islands our mission is to educate and elevate the Filipinos and aid them in governing themselves. We shall not adopt the policy of scuttling, nor will we establish a Republic, nor will we ever dream of the policy of extermination. Not oppression, not yet abandonment and desertion; not, these, but honest and fraternal co-operation with the Filipinos for the establishing of a just and stable government in which the natives shall have ever increasing participation in proportion to the development of their political capacities, the growth of their political experience, the progress of the masses in education and civilization, and the evolution of the idea and sentiment of nationality, a sentiment and idea which will be nourished and developed by the habit of common action, the improvement of the means of communication, the freer intermingling of the tribes and races, and hearty native co-operation with the Americans whose best political traditions are but the realization of the dearest ideals of the Filipino peoples.

"Not oppression; not abandonment and desertion." This is the American policy in a nutshell. When did the United States ever oppress the people of a territory it annexed? From the Louisiana purchase to the Mexican war, and from the Mexican war to the acceptance of sovereignty over the Sandwich Islands, the history of American acquisition of new territory has been honorable to the people of the United States and beneficial to the subjects of the districts acquired. Industrial resources have been developed, and the world has grown richer on account of the extension of American dominion. Liberty and civilization have gained a larger empire with each increase. The best guide to the history of the future is the history of the past.

Extracts from Game Laws.

Deer—Open season November 8 to 30, inclusive. Resident license 75 cts., non-resident license \$25.00. One person shall not kill more than five deer any one season.

Moose, Elk and Caribou are protected until 1910.

Ducks and Geese and all wild waterfowl—open season September 1st to January 31st, both inclusive, in the Lower Peninsula, from one-half hour before sunrise to one and one-half hours after sunset each day; provided, however, that it shall be lawful to hunt and kill Blue-bill, Cinnamon-bill, Pidgeon, Pint-tail, Whistler, Spoon-bill, Bitter-ball and Saw-bill Ducks and Wild Geese from September first to May first next following. In the Upper Peninsula the open season is from September first to January 15th.

Prairie Chickens—Not to be hunted or killed until 1902.

Snipe, Woodcock and Plover—Open season October 20 to Nov. 30, both inclusive.

Mourning Doves—It is unlawful to kill, capture, or attempt to capture any Mourning Dove at any time.

Partridge and Quail—Open season Oct. 20 to Nov. 30, both inclusive, in the Lower Peninsula. Partridge Oct. 1st to Nov. 30th in the Upper Peninsula. Partridge, Quail and Woodcock shall not be sold.

Fox, Black and Gray Squirrels—Open season Oct. 1 to Dec. 31.

Beaver—Shall not be trapped or killed until 1906.

Oter, Fisher and Marten—Open season November 15 to May 1.

Wolf, Lynx and Wildcats—Bounty of \$15 00 on old wolf; \$7.00 on wolf whelp under three months old; \$5.00 on lynx and \$3 00 on wildcat.

Mink, raccoon, Skunk and Muskrats—Must not be taken during months of Sept. and Oct.

Bass—Can be taken the entire year with hook and line. Must not be taken in any other manner than by hook and line.

Speckled Trout, Grayling, Land Locked Salmon, California Trout—Open season May 1 to Sept. 1. Only to be taken with hook and line.



Tribune from the South.
[From the New Orleans Times-Democrat.] Apropos of all this, and other news from Paris, we take this opportunity to express our admiration of the extremely able and interesting news service from Paris and from London which "The Chicago Tribune" has been running daily in its columns for several months past. Several of the New York dailies have excellent cable letters from London and sometimes other European capitals in their Sunday issues, but they appear as a rule only once a week, the brief dispatches which they get on the other days of the week not amounting to much in the way of an intelligible and adequate presentation of European news. "The Chicago Tribune's" foreign service, signed "Grace Corbett" from Paris and "H. J. Whigham" from London, taking it all the week around, is a long way ahead of the foreign news service of any of the New York papers.

One or two of the New York papers have had for years a deservedly high reputation for presenting their readers with news of interest from foreign parts, and the public will not forget its indebtedness to them on that account. But it is beyond dispute that the star of Journalism is Westward taking its way, and that the Journalism of Chicago is beginning to be the metropolitan Journalism of the present, and will certainly be, if things move as they are moving now, the metropolitan Journalism of the future. We do not generally, if at all, approve the politics of "The Chicago Tribune," but, apart from its politics, it is, in our opinion, superior to any of the New York papers. Not only is its foreign news service the best in the United States, but its home news service covers the country with a fulness which the New York papers are strangers to. "The Tribune's" editorial last Sunday must have caused quite a commotion in the Journalism of New York. It was a journalistic effort to which hitherto none of the Gotham papers had equalled.

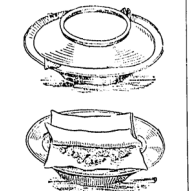

Completed scientific process for conducting it successfully. This opinion is inaccurate as shown by the homemade germinator seen in art. reproduced from Circular No. 18, issued by the division of forestry, United States department of agriculture. A piece of moist flannel is placed on a plate, and seeds put on the flannel, a second piece of moist flannel being laid over them, and a second plate is then inverted over the whole. A certain number of seeds should be carefully counted out, and the germinating ones removed and counted as fast as they appear. In testing crimson clover, if the seed is good, 50 to 90 per cent. should appear within three days. The government seed expert, J. H. Fisher, especially advises tests before sowing crimson clover. Most failures with it are due to old seed, but even fresh seed may be of poor quality. This seed should test 55 to 90 per cent. viable.

LICE HEADED BY ANTS.

Parasites Destroyed on the Roots of Peach Trees for the Honey Dew They Furnish.

Many Ohio peach orchards have been suffering from the attacks of the wood louse or aphid, at a time, however, not known, and complaints were sent in from all over the state to the agricultural experiment station at Wooster asking what should be done to get rid of the pest. The lice were found on the roots of the trees, where they had stripped the bark in order to get to the honey dew more readily. The authorities tried a number of insecticides, but without success, for whereas the wood louse was strong enough to kill the lice it also killed the tree. And, after a long series of experiments the conclusion has been reached that the only way of getting rid of the lice is to exterminate the ants which carry them about, for without the aid of the ants the lice will be utterly unable to get to the roots of peach or any other trees.

A USEFUL SUGGESTION.

Months, then took it off, and in about three months all seemed the better. Where Other Is Used—Place a scantling or pole across just above the point where the trunk of the tree is to be cut, and just high enough to make it touch when standing at the manger. Cows will soon learn to step back and make their dung there. Since using this device above to find it necessary to clean away as formerly, as they keep clean.—D. M. Neliker, in Ohio Farmer.

Cultivation of Hoed Crops.

The frequent cultivation of hoed crops is necessary to prevent the rapid evaporation of moisture. If the ground is sufficiently loose an implement with many small teeth should be used, such as a cultivator with a finger tooth, much like one with large teeth. A small tooth three inches deep is more effective in saving moisture than one of less depth. The land should be tilled after every rain, whether the soil is dry or light. The object of cultivation is to destroy weeds and to prevent the formation of a surface crust. The annual production of corn, broken, favors the capillary movement of water to the surface of the ground, which in turn causes evaporation. Use of cultivator several times between rains, if the intervals are long.

Preventing Early Penches.

Mr. J. H. Hale, the great American peach grower, reports: "I have found that if you pench two weeks earlier by the following method: In the middle of the growing season put a strong wire around a large rim of a tree and twist it fairly tight. This checks the flow of sap and causes fruit buds to form early and in great numbers. On the trunk of the branches of this arm will ripen two weeks earlier than that on the untreated branches and are of a much more highly colored. But this part of the tree will be so weakened by the treatment that it should be cut away after fruiting has ceased, and the wire cut and take its place. Thus one large arm or limb of a tree may be forced each year."

Birds of War.

There is a physician in a sparsely settled district of this country who uses the birds to get bulletins from his distant patients as to the progress of their illness. A regimental pigeon post hereafter will form part of the regular equipment of every Russian field force when mobilized. During the last Russian army maneuvers experiments with the birds were conducted on an extensive scale and their value as messengers was demonstrated. In no case did the birds fail to arrive with their messages sooner than a mounted messenger who had to travel. To England the question of carrier pigeons has not been paid much serious attention. This is the more surprising, as next to the Belgians the English are the greatest pigeon fanciers in the world, numbering tens of thousands. In Brussels there are said to be 50,000 fanciers, and 8,000 in Antwerp. Outside of Belgium the Manchester Flying club ranks highest, and sometimes as many as 20,000 birds have been liberated at once. Military letters could easily be formed in England.

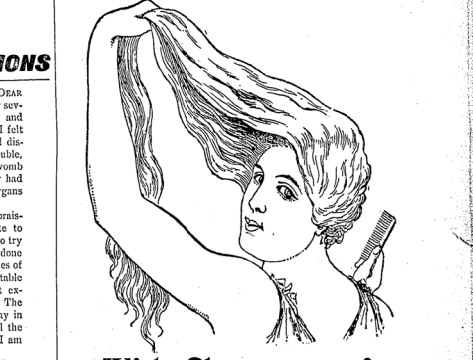

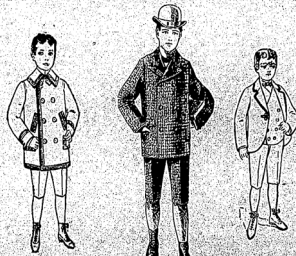
