Thanksgiving Proclamation.

The president has issued the following Thanksgiving proclamation:

"A national custom, dear to the hearts of the people, calls for the setting apart of one day in each year as an occasion of special thanksgiving to Almighty God for the blessings of the preceding year. This honored observance acquires with time a tender significance. It enriches domestic life. It summons under the family roof the absent children to glad reunion with those they love.

"Seldom has this nation had greater cause for profound thanksgiving. No great pestilence has invaded our shores. Liberal employment waits upon labor. Abundant crops have rewarded the efforts of the husbandman. Increased comforts have come to the home. The national finances have been strengthened, and public credit has been sustained and made firmer. In all branches of industry and trade there has been an unequalled degree of prosperity, while there has been a steady gain in the moral and educational growth of our national character. Churches and schools have flourished. American patriotism has been exalted. Those engaged in maintaining the honor of the flag with such signal success have been in a large degree spared from disaster and disease. An honorable peace has been ratified with a foreign nation with whom we were at war, and we are now on friendly relations with every power on earth.

"The trust which we have assumed for the benefit of the people of Cuba has been faithfully advanced. There is marked progress toward the restoration of healthy industrial conditions and under the wise sanitary regulations the island has enjoyed unusual exemption from the scourge of fever. The hurricane which swept over our possession of Porto Rico, destroying the homes and property of the inhabitants, called forth the instant sympathy of the people of the United States, who were swift to respond with generous aid to the sufferers. While the instruction still continues in the island of Luzon, business is resuming its activity, and establishment is being rapidly established throughout the archipelago.

"For these reasons, and countless others, I, William McKinley, president of the United States, do name Thursday, the 30th day of November, next, as a day of general thanksgiving and prayer, to be observed as such by all our people on this continent and in our newly acquired islands, as well as by those who may be at sea or sojourning in foreign lands; and I advise that on this day religious exercises shall be conducted in the churches or meeting places of all denominations. In order that in this social feature of the day its real significance may not be lost sight of, but every prayer may be offered to the

As they had previously ordered the street commissioner to cut down poles already erected, this action amounted to prohibition of the use of the streets. Permission was, however, granted to a rival company. Ignominious proceedings followed and the matter has since been in the courts. The supreme court settled the controversy in favor of the telephone company, holding that it is the duty of the council to act upon petitions and to establish reasonable rules and regulations governing the erection of poles, etc. It is held that the authority of the municipality end, and that it has no power to prohibit the use of the streets to telegraph or telephone companies, which have become essential in commercial transactions.



Admiral Farragut's old flagship, the Hartford, has been reconstructed in San Francisco and is again in commission. She is a small and valuable craft compared with a modern armored vessel.

The American army made a tough position, but he cannot stand everything. The steamer Siam, which was over 20 miles on board, bound for Manila, encountered a typhoon on the way, and the chief killing done by most of the animals was killing the boat.

The funeral at Pine Ridge, S. D., of a young man, the Indian chief who after winning 100 battles against unfriendly tribes died from getting of a bullet in the neck, was attended by six of his wives, with faces painted black for mourning, and 22 of his children and grandchildren.

Ella Ewing, the giantess, has completed her residence near Leno, Md. The house was built on a scale proportionate with Miss Ewing's size. The doors are ten feet high and the ceilings and windows look like those of a giant's castle. She is still growing, and is now eight feet and four inches tall.

The Minnesota Valley Historical society is about to build a granite shaft 12 feet high to the memory of the good Indians who befriended white settlers during the Sioux rebellion of 1862. The monument is to be located on state land near the village of Morton.

Dr. Lewish, of London, an enthusiast on the question of automobiles, is now making preparations for a trip across Europe to Peking in an "auto" of his own design. He says he will cover the 8,200 miles between London and Peking in six days. Country roads on that continent must be of an entirely different breed from those we have in this land.
