The Schoolcraft County Red and Tan Club Adopts a Constitution and By-Laws.

Taylor, the new Republican governor of Kentucky, was formally installed on office last Tuesday.

A Newberry man recently sold his wife for \$2,000.00. The husband's wife was worth \$10,000.00. He's not an imbecile of the extreme either.

The announcement of Terry's gubernatorial aspirations does not appear to meet with a very bright response throughout the state.

Judging from the frequent visits Bryan is making to Texas it will be surprising if he will succeed in keeping that state in the Democratic column next year.

The Escanaba street car line is now completed to Flat Rock and the street cars now meet all Soo Line trains. The traveling public appreciates this.

The editors of the state will have an opportunity of taking a trip to Florida and Cuba in January. The total expense of the trip will not exceed \$75 and about fifteen days will be required to make the trip.

Minnesota has been disgraced by its Pop-DEM governor. He was a bright and shining participant in an "anti-imperialistic" meeting this week and endorsed the malignant epistles hurled at President McKinley.

The Soo News says that a committee of business men will take a junket for the purpose of looking over the tannery plants at "Cheboygan, Munising and Manistique." It will not take them very long to investigate Manistique's tannery.

The cognomen "Hogtown" can justly be given Detroit. It has had the government for four years, has a U. S. senator and now is grooming a candidate for the governorship. It is asking a great deal for a city that usually gives a Democratic majority.

A German statesman visiting this country says: "With enormous natural resources, the best of raw material, the most skilled labor, fine taste, and masterly management American industries will play a gigantic role in the world's future trade. America's energy is bound to bring success in every department."

A San Francisco merchant who has just returned from a business tour of Eastern manufacturing centers reports that manufacturers are so overcrowded that they have been forced to stop taking orders. Their works are running to their full capacity, wages of employees are being advanced and there are no unemployed spinners and weavers to be had at any price. This era of prosperity is recognized everywhere as the direct result of the domestic and foreign policy of the McKinley administration.—San Francisco "Chronicle."

The money circulation of the United States is slowly, but steadily increasing, and it is now very near the two billion mark. On the 1st of last November it was \$1,963,716,148, and on the 1st of the present month it had increased to \$1,985,039,964 a gain of \$22,323,816. Should the gain for December be as great as for November, our money volume at the beginning of the year 1900 will exceed \$2,000,000,000. The increase comes from gold and the moderate expansion of the national bank circulation.

The younger element in the party are unanimously in favor of Hon. Chase S. Osborn for the governorship. This element should be recognized for the many successfully waged political conflicts in the past may in great part be attributed to the stalwart young adherents of the party. Gray hairs are no longer deemed an essential badge for one holding positions of trust. The active and aggressive portion of the party should be given a share of the honors, and in no manner could this be more fittingly done than to nominate brilliant and brainy Chase S. Osborn for the governorship.

The National Republican League has convened with a full attendance.

Ex-Senator Allen has been appointed by Governor Paynter, to fill the senatorial vacancy caused by the death of Senator Hayward.

Bryan insists that the financial bill at present before congress should be defeated because it is not in the interest of Democracy. Since the country has not paid any attention to the interest of Democracy its condition has appreciably improved. Bryan's complaint, therefore, will not be heeded.

That there are dampcloths in the industry as well as in other walks of life was proved by the prayer uttered by a Baptist minister at an anti-meeting held in Manistique last evening. In his incoherence he said: "God grant not to give our own soldier boys stress, for we believe it not Thy will."

An unfortunate and serious accident was the result of the careless use of an air gun yesterday. One of Manistique's popular young ladies may be permanently blind in one eye. An ordinance should be passed by the village council prohibiting the carrying of firing air guns on the streets. Other cities have banished the nuisance in this manner and it is to be hoped that Manistique's council will act before another accident occurs.

The state of Michigan must pay the beet sugar factories almost \$100,000 in bounty for the production of sugar for three months, and almost all of this will go to one factory at Bay City, seven other in Michigan being about ready to assault the state's treasury. This payment will be made pending the bounty law of 1897 is held to be constitutional, and this fact will be ascertained just as soon as the legal machinery can be started. It is easy to figure out what the state will have to pay for the privilege of having eight beet sugar plants within its borders. If it costs \$100,000 to support one factory for three months, how much will it cost to support eight factories for seven or eight months, the period during which they are in operation.—Detroit Journal.

NO TARIFF THINKING.

Representative Payne of New York, chairman of the House Committee on Ways and Means, is certain that the present Congress will do no tariff tinkering. "The Fifty-sixth Congress has important work on its hands," said he in a recent interview. "There will be no tariff legislation during the present session. The condition of the country is today thoroughly prosperous and will continue unless ill-considered and radical legislation affecting the business and financial interests of the nation is enacted during the next few years.

"The country demands and should have a settled assured policy in respect to those questions. The Dingley law as a revenue producer has more than satisfied those responsible for its enactment, and has proved gratifying to the people of the country generally.

"It has furnished ample revenue to carry on the Government from the moment the sugar and wool schedules began to operate. I am convinced that the happy results have produced will be permanent."

Representative Payne is right. The Dingley law has proved so satisfactory and in all ways beneficial to the country that the people have no desire to interrupt its operations for some time to come.

we had Free-Trade, or Tariff reform, the Democratic administration sold over \$262,000,000 in interest bearing bonds to obtain gold with which to maintain the gold reserve and to pay current expenses of the Government. There has been no drain on the gold in the Treasury since the Republicans were placed in charge of it, because the people have full confidence in the financial ability of the Republican party. If the Democratic party was placed in power tomorrow, our unparalleled prosperity would vanish, our gold reserve would melt away like snow in a brook, and before six months had passed the "wildcat chaos" would be doing business at the old stand, bonds would be sold to pay expenses and maintain the gold reserve, business would be paralyzed and before a year had passed the country would be swept by a panic, and labor would be thrown out of employment.—Benton (Ill.) "Republican."

THE PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE.

Those parts of the President's Message which relate to the new possessions of the United States, and especially to National obligations and opportunities arising out of their acquisition, and which are therefore naturally of peculiar interest at a time when Congress is called upon to deal with these grave problems, are discussed in a separate article. The purely domestic topics of the Message also are deserving of the careful consideration of intelligent citizens, who desire not only to comprehend the discussion of them in Congress, but to contribute to that enlightened legislative opinion by which the legislative department of the Government is expected to be controlled. That the President deals with these matters frankly and sensibly will be generally admitted by fair-minded persons.

Of course, among the opponents of an Administration there are always some who take a curious sort of pleasure in pretending to find fault because on stated occasions it does not settle out of hand every question which it brings to public attention; but such criticism is ineffectual and unimportant. As a whole the President's Message is an instructive exposition of National affairs, and its recommendations are sufficiently explicit.

On the subject of currency and finances the President speaks in a manner which tend to strengthen the majority in Congress in its resolve to establish the gold standard and fortify the Treasury still more firmly, if possible. It is true that positive enactments long in force seem to many persons to be entirely satisfactory and sufficient, but it is also true that a still more prevalent sentiment demands something in addition, and, as the President sagaciously remarks, the fortunate situation now existing "points to the present as the most fitting time to make adequate provision to insure the continuance of the gold standard and of public confidence in the ability and purpose of the Government to meet all its obligations in money which the civilized world recognize as the best." As one means to this end he renews his prudent recommendation that greenbacks once redeemed in gold shall not be paid out again except for gold.

What the President says concerning the importance to every commercial nation of an extensive mercantile marine and the melancholy condition into which our own foreign shipping has fallen will scarcely be disputed anywhere, while the policy which he advises for the rehabilitation of a prostrate and still decaying industry is sure to encounter the opposition of all to whom the word "subsidy" is offensive.

In that class are not a few patriotic and intelligent citizens, but we think it is being constantly diminished by the desertion of men who are not ashamed to get instruction and profit from the experience of other nations. The great maritime powers of the world have built up their ocean commerce, and are still building it up, by giving pecuniary inducements and rewards to individuals. This is done in various ways, some of them more or less circuitous. But the practical encouragement is steadily and deliberately bestowed, whatever form it takes, and the practical results are great and enduring. We believe that the Government of the United States is more than justified in doing the same thing. Just how it should be done the President does not attempt to determine, nor

should Congress prescribe without a more thorough discussion of the question than it has heretofore received.

On other proposals affecting our commercial progress and relations the President delivers a sound and positive judgment, without rehearsing at length arguments already employed and familiar. In truth, there is at this time, while the Commission is pursuing its investigations, no need to use more than a few emphatic words concerning the well-nigh indispensable necessity of an efficient canal uniting the oceans, and the immense convenience, to say the least, of a Pacific cable. If on the subject of the Message arrives at no new and decisive conclusions, honest critics will not find serious fault with its author. The simple truth is that this is a problem on which an extraordinary amount of discussion has failed to produce anything like an agreement, even as to the evils for which a remedy is demanded. The President's final topic, which touches the whole circle of National interests, is the Civil Service. He takes occasion to affirm, what there has been general dissent to deny, that his executive order of last May was designed to effect "a more efficient and satisfactory administration of the system of appointments." We thought it discredit and menacing that in various quarters his modification of the system was at once accepted as a warrant for rather thinly veiled attacks upon the system itself. It is gratifying to learn that in the opinion of those who possess superior means of forming an intelligent judgment after a brief experience the mischief thus done was not so serious as it appeared, and that "the merit system has been greatly strengthened and its permanence assured" through the flexibility imparted to it by the President.

Special Session of the Legislature.

Gov. Pingree has sent out a call for an extra session of the legislature, to convene Monday, Dec. 18, to consider the submission of an amendment or amendments in respect of laws which will provide for the equal taxation of all property by the assessments of the same at its cash value and such other matters as shall be submitted by special message.

The call for the special session on the part of the passage of the Michigan railway taxation bill of the last Legislature, and the submission of it in connection with the special message, says that because of that decision a constitutional amendment is necessary before laws can be enacted providing for equal taxation of all property.
