Criminal Statistics.
A report made by the state labor commissioner says:
On May 1 last there were 266 inmates in Michigan prisons, county jails, etc. of which 129 were males, 137 were females, and 10 were children. The average number of prisoners for crime against life was 2 per cent.; those for crime against property, 1.81; or in other words, there were 1.81 prisoners for every 100,000 of the population.

CRITICS AT WORK.

Find Flaws in the British Plan of Campaign in South Africa—Nationalist Critic at Work.

London, Dec. 23. During the campaign in South Africa the papers are filled with letters and articles criticising the government and the campaign and suggesting remedies, improvements, alterations in the plans and the like. The Times emphasizes of "careless responsibility and carelessness" in the fact that nothing has yet transpired to show how Gen. Buller came to lose 400 men at Stormberg. The dispatches from the front all represent the losses as in persons counted and constant dread of the British advance, but this is probably an exaggeration. The British government now evinces a change from its attitude in 1899 to accept assistance from the Boers. The imperial government has issued a statement that the government will not send troops to the front.

ERIC ANDERSON SUICIDES.

UTILIZES A SNOW-DRIFT THAT WERE AND JUMPS FROM THE SAME SCAFFOLD WITH HIS BROTHER TWO YEARS AGO.

THE TRAGEDY OCCURRED EARLY THIS WEEK.

He and then of South Manistigue for a Year or More. He was then a Highly Respected Citizen of Doyle Township.

Eric Anderson, the last two years has been a resident on the Anderson farm in the Swedish settlement, Doyle township. Two years ago, it will be remembered that Victor Anderson killed his mother and then went to a new settlement in the woods and there committed suicide by shooting and hanging himself.

As some time between nine o'clock last Saturday night and Tuesday morning of last week Eric Anderson, a brother of Victor, committed suicide by hanging. He utilized the same scaffold and the same kind of a noose used by his brother. The nooses consisted of two strands of hay wire.

Last Monday morning Fortes H. Brown went to the Anderson farm for the purpose of getting a load of hay. He could not find Anderson, and when he returned in the afternoon for another load he was astonished. He had noticed that horses and cattle were in a semi-starved condition and felt them. He also notified the neighbors of Anderson's absence. A searching party consisting of Oscar Sandberg, Frank Sandberg, J. P. Nelson and John Nilson started on Tuesday morning. They first forced an entrance into the house, and not finding him there they started for the woods. They searched for him but could not find him outside and they rightly conjectured that he had chise on the same scaffold used by his brother. They found the body as stated above.

Coroner Sautter was promptly notified and he, accompanied by Messrs. F. M. Orr, V. P. Chappel, Sheriff Ekstrom, Benj. Gero and Geo. E. Holbein, left for the scene Tuesday afternoon. After the arrival of the party the body was cut down by Benj. Gero, who happened to have a pair of wire nippers in his pocket, and same was taken to the house, where a jury was empaneled and the testimony of neighbors taken. From examination Anderson died without a struggle. The wire noose cut deeply into the flesh of the neck showing that the drop was a high one. His feet were within three feet of the ground.

The jury consisted of Benj. Gero, V. P. Chappel, A. W. Leinberg, Albert Neveas, Joseph Banast, and Fred M. Orr. Sheriff Ekstrom acted as interpreter and Geo. E. Holbein was the clerk.

John Nilson and J. P. Nelson and Frank and Oscar Sandberg were subpoenaed as witnesses. Extracts from their testimony follow:

John Nilson said—"I have known Eric Anderson since 1882. He was a good neighbor. I last saw him Friday of last week enroute to Whitelade, but did not speak to him. Did not think that he was entirely sane during the past three years."

John P. Nelson said—"I have known Anderson for the past fourteen years. Had no business relations with him. Did not think him of sound mind. My conclusions were based on language that he used about a year ago when I called on him. At that time he said that 'If I kill one man I will not be forgiven but if I kill two or three men I would be forgiven, and I'll be dead.'"

THE TEACHERS INSTITUTE.

EVERY TEACHER, SAVE ONE, IN THE COUNTY PRESENT, A GREAT SUCCESS.

PROF. PATTEGILL, AND WALDO AND THE INSTITUTE.

The Present Institute Promoted by Many to be the Most Successful Ever Held in the County.

The Showdraft County Teachers Institute with Prof. Pattengill and Waldo as instructors, convened at the central building Tuesday morning.

Due to the non arrival of Prof. Waldo, Prof. Pattengill was alone on the opening day.

He opened the work with an inspiring lecture on "Hints from Squibs," (one point that he strongly emphasized was "A teacher must inspire and be inspired with their work, or expire from the profession for public good.") The effect of the lecture was to revive, restore and create not only a stronger love for the work but also to increase one's capabilities for the profession.

In the afternoon an interesting lecture was given relative to some points on reading.

In the presentation contest that followed Miss Skinner won the honors. In the spelling match Mr. Cornell proved himself to be the champion.

Prof. Pattengill gave his lecture on "Overland and Skyward," at the Methodist church Tuesday evening to a small but very appreciative audience. Owing to the fact that the lecture was not advertised, the attendance was not as large as it otherwise would have been.

The speaker gave the audience a personally conducted excursion from St. Paul to the Pacific Coast via the Northern Pacific railroad, stopping at Yellowstone Park enroute. He conducted his spell bound auditors over plains and mountains, pointing out and describing the wonderful works of nature in a never-to-be forgotten manner. The trip was concluded in one and one half hours, and when the air brakes were applied and the train finally stopped at the terminus there was universal regret on account of the brevity of the trip.

Tuesday's talk on the Northwest territory; Prof. Pattengill, called the attention of his audience to the fact that this portion of the Union, viz: Michigan, Wisconsin, Ohio, Indiana and Illinois, exceed any other portion of the globe in the wealth of its natural resources and what has grown out of them.

Wednesday morning was occupied by Prof. Waldo in an interesting and instructive lecture on federal government, and by Prof. Pattengill on the study of masterpieces in reading.

Dissertations on federal government and Orthodoxy were lectures of Wednesday afternoon's session. Mr. Mix was present and treated the institute with a liberal donation of sweet refreshments.

Wednesday evening Prof. Waldo and Pattengill delivered lectures at the Methodist church. Prof. Waldo's theme was Education—what constitutes an education and the use to be made of an education. The close attention of his audience proved their interest in his theme.

Prof. Pattengill spoke in his usual vigorous and interesting manner, touching several topics. He complimented Manistique on the improvements of her school equipment; gave addresses warning to parents, teachers and pupils of the dangers of cigarette smoking, and ended the need of more hearty cooperation and sympathy in self discipline and government on the part of parents toward the teachers, over their own children.

Prof. Pattengill's lecture on Labor and the School Problem should be delivered before hundreds of men, women and children in every city of this land. Not only will his merits challenge the best criticism and admiration of an intelligent American audience, but any audience in any land where the fair minded, intelligent representatives of labor and capital come together for mutual good.

Prof. Waldo devoted some time to a paper on "The Teacher's Life," so say all of the teachers. Bountiful refreshments in the way of fruit were provided by Mr. Kelso and pleasant games caused the three good nights to come all too soon. A fair number of representative citizens of Manistique were there.

Many of our citizens attended the sessions of the institute and were much pleased with what they saw and heard.

THE LATEST FOREIGN DISPATCHES FROM WASHINGTON.

One of Moscow's most noted savants in the civil war, Shtrom, was killed. The government will pay for the return of families of Spanish prisoners to Spain from the Philippines.

After 30 years' active service, Brig. Gen. C. S. Hart was killed. The Russian flag which had been blown up by the German army, is now in the hands of the Russians.

Representatives of the Filipino congress arrived in Washington to propose to the president terms of peace in the Philippines. In the United States, 4,200 miles of railroad have been constructed in the United States, breaking all records since 1888.

REST IN ARLINGTON.

Bodies of the Maine Victims Are Reinterred. Part Military Honors Are Shown the Dead Interred in Arlington.

Washington, Dec. 29.—Upon the early hours of yesterday morning, the Maine dead, brought from Havana by the battleship Texas on Thursday, were laid away in their final resting places with simple religious services and the impressive honors of war in the presence of the president, members of his cabinet, officers of the army and navy and other representatives of the government.

The lives of these men and women, many of them young, and the nation's grief, were the subject of a moving service of reinterment in the Arlington cemetery. But there was no note of triumph in the grim scene.

The site is a commanding one. In front of the burial place, the two great columns of the Arlington monument, Washington, the dome of the capitol and the spiraling eagle to the right, are visible from the site.

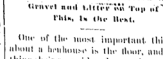

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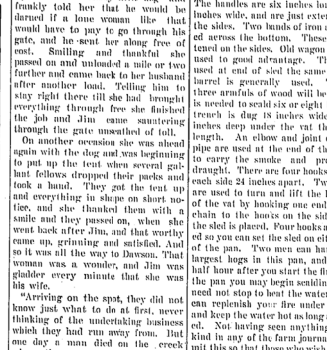

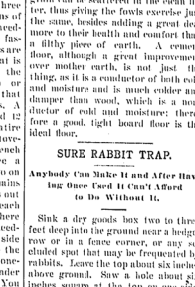
