**EDITORIAL COMMENT.**

Good politics, sound sense and a spirit at the fitness of things dictate that Osborn's combination for the gubernatorial nomination should not be handicapped this

The upper peninsula has more than a fighting chance to name the next governor of Michigan. All that is needed is concerted effort upon the part of the Republican voters of the peninsula. Hon. Chase S. Osborn, the upper peninsula's candidate is receiving many assurances of support from all portions of the state and if the delegates from this section of the state act as a unit he will land the prize. It goes without saying that he would make one of the very best governors the state has ever had. A multiplicity of candidates from this section for the minor positions on the ticket will complicate matters. The upper peninsula can not expect to land more than one nomination, if that be the governorship.

**BECKHAM WILL BE GOVERNOR.**

Although Taylor was elected governor of Kentucky, he will relinquish the office.

The peace conference held at Louisville Monday night between seven representatives of the democratic party, resulted in the unanimous signing of an agreement embodying six specific propositions, which promise a settlement of the party differences which have brought about two state governments in Kentucky. This agreement, in substance, is as follows:

First—That if the general assembly in joint session shall adopt a resolution ratifying their recent action adopting the conference report secured by Goebel and Beckham, the contestants, W. S. Taylor and John Marshall shall submit without further protest.

Second—That all parties shall unite in an effort to bring about such a modification of the election law as will provide for non-partisan election boards and insure free and fair elections.

Third—That the conditions shall remain in status quo until Monday, the general assembly meeting and adjourning from day to day until that time.

Fourth—That nothing will be done to hinder or prevent a joint session of the general assembly for taking action on the ratification resolution.

Fifth—That the state contest board shall meet and adjourn from day to day on Tuesday, without taking any action on the contests for minor state offices. This postponement is suggested in order that the action of the general assembly on the ratification resolution may be taken first.

Sixth—That the state troops shall be removed from the state capital at once, though with all necessary precaution for the public safety. This matter is to be under the direction of Gen. Dan Lindsay, of Frankfort.

Seventh—That the republican officials and officers of the state guard shall have immunity from charges of treason, usurpation, contempt or any other such offenses.

**SAM STEIN IN THE RING.**

It would appear that the Milwaukee newspapers are desirous of conducting the approaching political campaign in the upper peninsula. The Journal of that town has been booming Chase S. Osborn's gubernatorial candidacy, and now comes The Sentinel with its views on the subject, in which the following very interesting bit of political history appears:

"In Menominee and Delta counties of the upper peninsula, the obstacle which is likely to rear its head in the way of Osborn's proposition for gubernatorial nomination is Sam Stephenson. He was defeated by the Sheldon-Osborn combination four years ago and his feelings towards both these gentlemen are anything but fraternal. He figured as Sheldon's bogie man in

the congressional campaign two years ago, but so far in this one has maintained silence regarding his intentions. He is not the power in the upper peninsula he was some years ago, but he still retains a firm hold upon Menominee and Delta counties."

The Hon. S. M. Stephenson has had his day, politically speaking. The electors of the upper peninsula have been decidedly generous to him, bestowing congressional honors upon him four successive times, and, so far as Delta and Menominee were concerned, were inclined to continue him in office for the remainder of his days. But he was overthrown by defeat by the Osborn-Sheldon combination, as the Sentinel is pleased to term it, and the courts so decided. Now he should exhibit his manliness by maintaining silence in the matter of Osborn's candidacy. If Sam "still holds a firm hold upon Delta" it is surprising bit of information. The Iron Port was not aware that any single politician had Delta in his vest pocket. And it does not believe he has.

Whether or not Delta will give its support to Mr. Osborn we do not pretend to know, but its loyalty to the upper peninsula would indicate as much. At any rate Sam Stephenson, for whom the republicans of this county have done no inconsiderable, would better "get even" in some other way—it would be more to his credit—and not interfere with matters political simply because he has an axe to grind.

**THE REAL BANKER.**

Several Republican newspapers in the country which claim that Free-Trade is a dead issue, because of the unexampled prosperity, are probably not aware of the fact that many sections of the country, and our colleges in particular, are being flooded with Free-Trade literature, especially of the kind aiming to show that the Protective Tariff is responsible for the so-called trusts. The worst of it is that the Free-Trade propagandists are receiving aid and comfort from Republican victims of the foreign market crash, who have somehow persuaded themselves that certain of our industries no longer need protection, and that we are in a position to make considerable concessions to foreign producers in return for a prospective small increase in our export trade. As we well know from past experience, the protective system is never so much endangered as when its professed friends have come to think that its safety is not menaced by the ever active and aggressive Free-Trade movement.—"Guntion's Magazine."

**GOOD CANDIDATES NEEDED.**

The political party that hopes to succeed in great things must look after the little things. Gain the confidence of the people in local affairs and they will feel the safe in entering larger interests to those who have proven faithful at home. Let the Republican party do its duty faithfully and fearlessly to the citizens of Manistique in village matters and we strengthen our cause in Schoolcraft county. The Republican party can nominate good men for every single office to be filled this spring; this is what should be done. There should be no factionalism, no evening up of personal quarrels. If, as Republicans, we do not do all we can to give the people of this village, careful and competent officials, we are merely inviting a re-

buke which will eventually come and will hurt the party throughout this county.

**PROF. GRAVES' CLAIMS**

Professor Graves, principal and professor of the Petoskey Normal Academy has announced himself as candidate for the State Board of Education on the republican ticket. So far as Prof. Graves' ability to do the finest sort of service in such a position there is no sort of question. He is not only a university man, but has in practical school work demonstrated his ability as one of the finest and most successful educators in this state. He came here in 1888 as superintendent of our public schools, but having friction with the conservative school board, organized and opened the new year the Petoskey Normal Academy which has been successful from the beginning and is now recognized as one of the very best Normal Schools of the state. Mr. Graves became a member of the republican party five years ago and has since been a member of the Michigan Club and always present at its meetings in Detroit. As a representative of Northern Michigan, and is beyond all question the ablest and most progressive educator of Northern Michigan, the Record will cordially support Prof. Graves' candidacy for member of the State Board of Education.—Petoskey Record.

Mr. Powers, who Prof. Graves wishes to succeed, will not be a candidate for re-nomination.

The Professor is well known here having conducted several teachers' institutes in this county, and also having the honor of holding the first institute ever held in Schoolcraft county in August 1892. Mrs. Graves will be remembered as Miss Katie Miller, a former teacher in our public schools.

**SEWALL SHIVERS OFF.**

Mr. Sewall, of Maine, Mr. Bryan's running mate in 1896, says he doesn't want the vice-presidential nomination again, and indeed he has cut himself off from any possibility of being associated with Bryan on the ticket by declaring himself an expansionist. He says he has always favored the acquisition of the Philippines since the Paris treaty, and declares that the people of the country should stand with the McKinley administration in all that is being done to hold those islands, as they are worth it.

Mr. Sewall also indulges in a little political prophecy. He says that McKinley will be re-nominated and re-elected, and that Bryan will also be re-nominated, but will, of course, meet with a second defeat. "The fact is," adds Mr. Sewall, "that the country is too prosperous to warrant any hope of change in the national administration, and the people are slow to take up reform measures when the times are good as they are at present."

Mr. Sewall might have added that the people would be especially slow to take up such bogus reform measures that would "reform" the present prosperity out of existence and bring back the old democratic hard times.

It is a notable fact that the level-headed business men of the Democratic party are falling away from Bryan more and more. He has gained some few recruits by his "ant-trust" bill, but it is mainly among the crank class represented by Edward Atkinson and midget class represented by the Springfield Republican. The bulk of his recruits are men who would not be expected to support the Republican ticket in any event while the men who are dropping away from him were in time past the very backbone of the Democratic party. The changes going on by no means strengthen the organization. On the contrary, by allowing it more closely with Populism, they tend to undermine it in the confidence of the nation.—Minneapolis Tribune.

Michigan's coal industry is a strikingly important one. Twenty-five mines are operated and the output averages 100,000 tons a week. Commissioner Cox states that the total area of Michigan's coal basin covers nearly 30,000 square miles, running from Jackson county on the north to Roscommon county on the north, and from Huron county on the west to Mecosta county on the west. It is shaped like a pear, with its stem end in Jackson county, the broadest part being on a line passing through Huron county. Not all of this great area contains coal in veins profitable for working, but the very rich fields in Saginaw county are believed to be only an indication of what the future will develop. There are now more than 200,000 acres of coal lands under lease, each acre being estimated at 4,000 tons.

**IN DEEPER TROUBLE.**

**K. Zanditon Was Arrested This Week.**  
(See News)  
Troubles have multiplied for K. Zanditon since his stock of clothing samples disappeared from his place of business in the Grand Marais. Friday night of last week, during Mr. Zanditon's absence up the line. Saturday morning of last week, Zanditon's personal effects as were left in his room were attacked by the officers to satisfy demand for his clothing samples. Early in the week William Vobe, the clerk who had been left in charge of the store, swore out a warrant for his employer's arrest, on the charge of grand larceny. Vobe alleging that Mr. Zanditon had a watch belonging to him in his possession. Zanditon was located in Grand Marais by Sheriff Swart, who went up after him Tuesday, and brought him to the Soo the following day. The deputy sheriff in Grand Marais, to whom Sheriff Swart wired from Seney, ascertaining that Zanditon was not to leave for the Soo, did not place him under arrest, but allowed him to leave. Sheriff Swart took possession of him as he was boarding the train. It seems that the first intelligence that Mr. Zanditon had obtained of the way his affairs at the Soo had been worked was from the press reports, and he had packed up his samples forthwith and intended to return at the earliest opportunity, about the same time that the sheriff left the Soo.

Mr. Zanditon had a preliminary examination before Judge Macdonell Thursday, and his bail was fixed at \$500. He was unable to procure bond, and was remanded to jail. The case will come on Monday. As a sequel to the swift and mysterious removal of Zanditon's stock last week, Wm. Vobe, the clerk, is in trouble. There has been an apparently well-founded suspicion that Vobe was responsible for the disappearance of the goods, as it seemed impossible that they could have been taken away without his cognizance. The officers were unable to locate the stock, which is thought to be in the hands of Mr. Vobe. Thursday Mr. Zanditon had a warrant sworn out for the arrest of Vobe, changing him with grand larceny. Vobe was brought up before Judge Cornick, and his case set for next Tuesday. Bail was fixed at \$500, and Vobe is also residing at Sheriff Swart's hotel.

Vobe, it is said, acted on legal advice in "sweeping" the stock to secure payment of wages.  
Mr. Zanditon's presence is also desired at Cheltenham, and Sheriff Swart has been requested by the officers there to hang on to his prisoner after his name has been disposed of here.

Zanditon who has represented himself as the agent of the Great Western Tailoring Co., has simply been a customer of that firm. Mr. Zanditon has also handled the line of the Royal Tailoring Co., Chicago, and has not, Mr. McClintock says, been an authorized representative of the Great Western Tailoring Co.

**CUTTLEFISH INK.**  
The Penultimate Liquid Which This Century Animal Knew.  
The cuttlefish are caught in great numbers off the Cornwall coast and are used as a bait for the conger eel, which is the most valuable fish in the district. The cuttlefish possesses a real mucus, but has a long cylindrical sucker with which it adheres firmly to the bait. The method of capturing the fish is as follows: A long line from which are suspended from 200 to 200 hooks baited with potatoes (almost the only bait the cuttlefish will take) is set down into the sea and allowed to stay there for about half an hour. It is then drawn up, and the cuttlefish are found hanging by means of their suckers to the bait.

The late earthquake in Mexico was probably a rebound from the part of the country situated where one of its centers announced that it would be a candidate against President Diaz.

There are now 716 rural free-delivery routes in the country, and in nearly every case they have added to the department's income and relieved its expenditure in that particular district.

The total corn crop of the United States last year was 4,200,000 cases, against 4,314,814 cases in 1898—the largest yield in the history of the nation and an increase of 106,150 cases over the previous year.

A professional union of women gives the following direction for securing "a good fiscal expression": "Don't get any more from the government than you have to pay for."

Ex-President Harrison's maiden speech in the senate was a eulogy, like Senator Dwyer's. The subject was Gen. A. B. Burnside, then recently deceased. Mr. Harrison submitted his manuscript to Senator Sherman, who promised to strike out what should be omitted. "Not a word," said Sherman after reading it over.

The immense bronze statue of Washington is now being cast in New York. When completed it will rest upon a massive pedestal of Tennessee marble upon one of the principal corners in the American capital, near Paris and the unveiling will take place on July 4. The statue which will cost an aggregate of \$300,000 is to be erected to France by the Daughters of the American Revolution.

Three Texas steers ran amuck at the stockyards in Chicago and succeeded in costing bleeding and generally mauling three cowboys and half a dozen ordinary citizens and a dozen or more spectators. People who seem for the excitement of a Spanish bullfight and are contemplating trips to Mexico or Madrid should put away their money and engage seats upon the stock yards fence at the earliest opportunity.

Four thousand American school teachers are planning a trip to the Paris exposition in the summer. If the promoters of the big show desire to make it thoroughly attractive they will do everything in their power to induce the school matrons to come early and stay late. Certainly the United States could send no other exhibit better calculated to attract attention and draw a million of the American people to more justly proud.

Trans-Atlantic steamship companies are anticipating the most prosperous season ever known. The American line has looked about 3,000 passengers and the Grand line about 4,000 four months in advance of the usual rush season. Notwithstanding the unsettled state of affairs in Europe, the prospects are that a greater number of Americans will visit the coming Paris exposition than has ever before been attracted in one year to the French capital.

The United States Tobacco Journal has completed the compilation of a table showing how much tobacco the American smokers consumed last year. An increase was shown in cigars and an increase in cigarettes, the former increasing from 4,667,110 in 1898 to 4,947,722 last year, while the latter decreased from 3,525,486 in 1898 to 3,271,671,000 last year. The increase in cigarette smoking is ascribed to the campaign waged against the little round white rolls by women.

John D. Blinched, convicted of robbery, was arranged for sentence in the court of Judge Foster in New York city. Blinched had told his friends that he would hypnotize the judge and force him to give him a sentence of but a month or two.
