THE WINNERS NAMED.

THE REPUBLICANS PLACED AN EXCELLENT VILLAGE TICKETS THE FIRST MONDAY EVENING.

W. F. CRANE SECURES THE PRESIDENTIAL NOMINATION.

The ticket gives general satisfaction, and will be victorious at the coming election.

Pursuant to call the Republican village caucus was convened at the opera house last Monday evening at 7:30 o'clock.

The caucus was called to order by Chairman Ashford who read the call.

Motion prevailed that Mr. Ashford act as chairman of the caucus.

Upon motion the caucus adjourned to the opera house at 8 o'clock.

When same was reconvened, Mr. G. D. Rahl was elected secretary and Messrs. MacNaughton and Holbein appointed tellers.

The officers were then sworn by Justice Miller Ross.

The task of nominating a candidate for the village presidency was next in order. The names of Messrs. Crane, Gero and Burdick were presented.

Three ballots were necessary before a choice was made. The ballots follow:

TO BE REORGANIZED.

The Manistique Band to be Revived and New Instruments and Uniforms to be Purchased.

A FIRST CLASS TICKET.

Although some may not be entirely satisfied with the result of last Monday evening's caucus, nevertheless all can truly say that a first-class ticket was placed in nomination. There was a good material but active strife between Will F. Crane and Benj. Gero for the presidential nomination. The other contestations were, not so hotly contested, the successful candidates winning easily.

Mr. Crane, the party's choice for president, has been a resident of Manistique since 1894, and is an inspector and shipper of lumber. He is a young man of sound judgment, very popular socially and well-liked by all classes. He is in favor of furnishing every portion of the city with adequate protection from fire, but is not in favor of a waterworks system, that his nomination gives universal satisfaction is attested by the fact that, although two other caucuses were called, no one was nominated in opposition to him.

Joseph W. Scott, the candidate for clerk, was proven by the big majority to be received, is very popular. His fitness for the position is unquestioned. Joe will make one of the best officials that Manistique has ever had.

Angus McLeod was renominated for the treasurership by acclamation. He filled the position so satisfactorily last year that everyone conceded him the privilege of succeeding himself for another term.

E. W. Miller was nominated an assessor by acclamation. He is a good accountant and the personification of honesty—in fact, just the man for the place.

Of the trustees, Capt. John Coffey and Edward E. Burrell were elected by acclamation. These gentlemen are well known by all. Mr. Coffey is the proprietor of a fishing industry here and is a heavy taxpayer. He is a quiet, conservative and popular business man and will be a valuable member of the council.

Mr. E. Burrell is connected with the Burrell Chemical Co., the most important industry in the town aside from the Chicago Lumbering Co. It was conceded by all that the company in question should be given representation on the board of trustees, and a more satisfactory representative than Mr. Burrell could not have been chosen. The remaining two candidates, Messrs E. C. Brown and W. L. Middlebrook are heavy taxpayers, very popular, and have served several terms as members of the board.

There is not a weak spot in the whole ticket.

Rumors are afloat that "slips" may be used next Monday against one or two candidates. The candidates fairly and deserves the support of every person attending the caucus last Monday evening.

Mr. William C. Brouson will undoubtedly succeed himself as supervisor of Hiawatha township. There will quite likely be no changes made in the personnel of the supervisors from the greater number of the remaining townships.

An exchange tersely says that "Bryan is now carrying coals to New Castle. He has invaded the solid south." The industries of the south have received such a great impetus during the present Republican times that the "solid south" will be a misnomer after the coming national election.

THE CAUCUS SHOULD BE ABOLISHED.

The necessity for a primary election system and the relegation of the old time manner of holding a caucus was more apparent than ever Monday evening.

Well known Democrats, including Hon. Patrick McNamara, member of the Democratic county central committee from Hiawatha township, participated in the caucus. Then, too, others that are not legal voters, exercised the function upon this occasion.

Of course the evil might be remedied to some extent were the village incorporated into a city and divided into wards.

However, the fact remains that Manistique has outgrown the country village caucuses.

A HANDSOME SHOWING.

The shift month of February made a showing in Treasury receipts specially gratifying. The receipts from customs ran up to the splendid figure of about \$20,000,000, keeping pace with the receipts from internal revenue. Notwithstanding the large pension payments, amounting to more than \$12,000,000, interest payments of nearly \$4,000,000 and expenditures on account of the war and navy aggregating about \$1,000,000, the excess of receipts over expenditures brought a good balance to be added to the surplus of receipts for the current fiscal year. Compared with February of a year ago the customs receipts showed a handsome increase amounting to nearly \$5,000,000.

OF COURSE THEY WON'T.

The public has lately read in some Democratic papers about the secret understanding that they said existed between England and the McKinley administration. From that text many a sermon has been preached, scolding the Republican party and savagely attacked its representative and demanding that the people rise up and rebuke it. All this stuff read well and promised to have some political effect, but now from a most unexpected quarter facts come that demolish this Democratic babbling.—Lord Rosebery

The best inventor lives here.

The Chicago Inventor Ocean in a two-cent issue devotes a column in writing up "the most novel telephone system in the world."

Notice to Taxpayers.

The auditor-general's office calls the attention of property owners to the fact that lands which are delinquent for the taxes of 1898 and sold in April 1899, may be redeemed by application to the auditor-general until April 30th only. Unless these taxes are paid on or before the last mentioned date, settlement must then be made with the purchaser of the tax title, whom the law authorizes to charge double the amount of the taxes and charges paid by him, together with \$5 additional for each description of land. Lands delinquent for the taxes of 1897 will be sold in May of this year, and payment to the county treasurer on or before the 15th will save additional interest charges.



A RAZORBACK HUNT

ROUNDING UP THE HOGS IS LIVELY AND EXCITING WORK.

The Experience of the Hunter Who, Instead of Doing the Hunting, is in the Hills, Attempts to Drive His Dogs to the Hogs.

While it is generally assumed that the sheep and Angus stock furnish most of the revenues to the rancher in the broken and wooded country south of the Shoshone plain and west of the Colorado river, it is nevertheless a fact that the mountain hog, in some localities, produces a more valuable commodity than any other animal product of the mountain range. The hog is not only a valuable source of food, but also a source of income, for its skin and bristles are used in the manufacture of brushes and brooms.

It is in order to get the benefit of the increase in his stock, however, it is necessary for the hunter to get his hands on the pigs. As this, owing to the roughness of the country and the wildness of the hogs, is no small task, it is generally the custom for all the hunters in a given section to get together with their dogs and practically "round up" the range.

Compared with some of these "hog hunts" a hunt "round up" is a quite unimpressive affair. The morning appointed the dogs are turned loose and started out on the track, and the men ride after them just as on a wolf chase. As the pigs cannot hold out very long one of them usually escapes and his squeal brings back the rest of the bunch in his aid. As soon as the pig is free the sons form a circle around the pigs from the east and then dash out at their terrified and all the while grunting like the rattling of a hundred old engines. By the time the affair has reached its height the hunters ride up and have the dogs on either the left or the right, eight, ten or up to the assistance of the dog, one with a club to beat off the other hogs the other with a bill of rope to tie the one secured. When one of them has been put out of the way of fighting, the pigs are caught and marked.

When the work of "marking" is more like sport than labor it is not less exciting than that of getting the hogs ready for market, for as it is impossible to drive them any distance away from the corral it is necessary to kill several of them, the pigs are simply divided.
