### A QUIET ELECTION.

Only One Ticket in the Field. Very Little Vote Polls.

Not very much interest was manifested in the village election last Monday.

So one of the voters were excused in marking their ballots and others failed to mark them at all so that about a dozen ballots were thrown out. The vote follows:

That the ticket was a strong one is attested by the fact that the Democrats, who by the way have a peculiar habit of quickly assuming the weak points of a Republican ticket and profiting by this discernment when making their states, saw no assailable point and failed to put a ticket in the field.

### FOURTY HOURS ADORATION.

Particulars Regarding the Services at St. Francis de Sales Church.

The origin of this beautiful devotion was the work of His Holiness Pope Clement VII, in 1502, the object being to provide a special form of prayer, in view of the "dignities and protracted ordinances of the Christian commonwealth."

The observance will begin at St. Francis de Sales on Sun. Eve., and will continue through Wed., with a series of early masses on W. Eve. only.

On Sunday morning the services will be held at 8 o'clock, with sermon in English at high mass by Very Rev. Father Murray, O. P., the illustrious Dominikan under whose supervision these devotions will be conducted. Immediately following the services the Exposition and solemn procession of the Blessed Sacrament, and the chanting of the impressive Litany of the Saints, 11 the evening at 7:30 there will be copiers, in English, and Benediction.

On Monday there will be masses at 8 and 9 a. m., with sermon in English at the latter. In the evening at 7:30, Rosary, sermon in English and Benediction.

Tuesday, there will be masses at 5, 6, 7, 8, and 9 o'clock, a. m., with sermons at the last in German and French. In the evening, Rosary sermons in English and German, Litany of the Saints, solemn procession and the Exposition of the Blessed Sacrament, concluded with Benediction.

On Wednesday morning there will be masses at 5, 7 and 8 o'clock, and masses at 5, 7 and 8 o'clock, and it is proposed to proceed to Thompson immediately after wards to hold High Mass and devotions.

B, Fifth Michigan cavalry, and went to the front in December of the same year, serving with credit until the close of the war. After the war he served two years as deputy county treasurer, and has been supervisor of his township for 15 years.

#### FOR A PALACE BOAT LINE.

Plans for two passenger steamers costing \$1,000,000 each were presented yesterday to the American Ship Building Company for their consideration. You will find this will save you many an anxious hour and be a reliance in a time of reverse. In time of prosperity, prepare for adversity. The lessons of thrift, independence, of courage to them, what you are, instead of what you are not, are good lessons for your children to learn."
