**REPUBLICAN STATE CONVENTION.**

The Republican electors of the State of Michigan.  
 The state convention of the Republicans of Michigan is hereby called to meet at the Hotel Grand army, Detroit, Michigan, on Thursday, May 24, 1900, at 12 o'clock noon for the purpose of nominating fourteen electors of revision and vice president of the United States, and electing four delegates at large and four alternate delegates at large to the Republican national convention to be held at Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, June 18th, 1900. Each congressional district will elect two delegates and two alternates to the Republican national convention to be conducted by the state convention. Also to select a chairman of the state central committee and two members thereof from each congressional district, and the transaction of such other business as may properly be brought before it.

**EDITORIAL COMMENT.**

Will B. Thomas would make a first-class supervisor.

Hon. Fred Warner of Farmington, should be nominated for secretary of state by the Republican state convention.

Victor Maria's friends are urging his claims for the street commissioner. He is popular with all classes and his appointment would be well received.

All indications point to the fact that Ed. Ashford who is a candidate for re-nomination as county clerk and register of deeds will have his wishes gratified.

Joseph Scott is being urged by his friends to make the race for township clerk. He says that if nominated and elected he will attend to the duties of the office to the best of his ability.

The Marquette Mining Journal reports that it is at present enjoying the largest circulation in its history. The Journal thoroughly covers the upper peninsula in its news and telegraphic pages.

Ed. Grundin is an aspirant for the supervisorship in Seney township. That township will undoubtedly be represented on the board during the coming year by Mr. Harcourt. He has a good record as an official.

R. C. McKesson, who has so acceptably filled the office of township clerk is a candidate for re-nomination. Mr. Joseph Scott has entered the lists against him and a close hard fought contest will be the result.

Cornelius Klagstad will have a strong following in the caucus to follow tomorrow. He is amply qualified for the position of township treasurer, and would if honored by the nomination and election, give universal satisfaction.

Hermanville is one of the few towns in the upper peninsula where the curfew idea is enforced. At eight o'clock the factory whistles notifies the boys that it is time for them to go home. Those that do not heed the warning are arrested.

The State Republican published at Lansing has come out in favor of Stearns for the governorship. Its chief reason is that Western Michigan has never been honored by a gubernatorial nomination. The upper peninsula is in the same shape also.

William Longstone of the Detroit Journal should be selected as one of the four delegates at large to the Philadelphia convention.

Edno Sheldon, of the Topeka Capital, has put in many weeks preparing to issue a daily paper for one week. We would like to know what he would do week in and week out, year after year. Anyone could print a truly good paper for just one week.

Capt. John Coffey is being mentioned in connection with the nomination for supervisor on the Republican ticket. Mr. Coffey is perhaps the strongest candidate mentioned thus far. He is a first-class business man and a heavy tax payer.

Sheldon has loaned the box office receipts to such an extent that the proprietors of the Topeka Capital are contemplating a radical departure from the fixed rules at present in vogue in the publication of daily newspapers, and may issue the Capital in the near future as a distinctly christian daily.

Tomorrow afternoon the Republicans of Manistique township will meet at the court house for the purpose of placing a township ticket in the field to be voted for on Monday April 2nd. There are plenty of aspirants for the various nominations and it will not be a difficult task to select a winning ticket this year.

Mr. W. C. Bronson who has served his township so acceptably during the past year as supervisor is a candidate for re-nomination. When he took the office last spring Hiawatha township was in debt to the extent of nearly \$1000. Since that time the debt has been wiped out and a handsome surplus remains.

We have been much interested in the discussion that has monopolized the columns of the Sidway Record during the past few months. The participants are rival lumber firms who wish to control township politics. Some bitter accusations have been made pro and con, and if Sidway were located in the latitude of Kentucky half of its citizens would give this time have died with their boots on.

Many good people have been pained by the flippancy of newspaper men who have their fling at Parson Sheldon and his Christian newspaper enterprise. Now that the paper is a reality it must be admitted that it has created a favorable impression so much so that Christian people wish that the newspaper men everywhere would read the life of Christ and catch just a glimpse of His beauty and power and reveal it in their newspaper work.

A few nominations will be hotly contested at the township caucus to be held at the court house tomorrow evening. There are quite a number of aspirants for the highway commissioner, Carl Knuth, Wm. Clemons and Festus Pheneas candidates. Dr. McKesson will have an opposing candidate for the clerkship in Joseph Scott. C. Klagstad, Frank Peterson and Henry Schuetter are aspirants for the treasuryship, and Geo. Steley wants to be justice of the peace.

Mr. Thomas F. Cole of Ironwood, general manager of the Oliver Iron Mining Co.'s mines in the upper peninsula and Minnesota, is being mentioned as suitable timber for one of the two delegates to represent the twelfth district at the national convention to be held at Philadelphia. Mr. Cole has been a life long Republican, is a hustler and one of the most prominent and influential men residing in the upper peninsula. We hope to see Mr. Cole's aspirations in this direction realized.

**PUERTO RICO'S PROTEST.**

Puerto Rico the benefit of 75 per cent. reduction in the tariff. How very kind indeed! Only 25 per cent. shall Puerto Rico pay, because we love her so.

Twenty-five per cent of the regular tariff is no more benefit to Puerto Rico than 200 per cent. would be.

What is the crap that must spit out this little domain of ours for the next year? Is it coffee? No, until the American people change their likes and dislikes, and Brazil drops off the globe, not a bag can be sold the United States for as much as the cost of its production, except as a souvenir.

Is it sugar? Well, not that we have heard of. No, we have not say sugar to spare just at present. Tobacco is the only product of the island this year that is sufficient to keep the human life of its aglow in our caresses.

What is our tobacco worth in New York today? The merchants say they will buy for 35 cents, possibly 40. What is the present duty on our tobacco? Only \$1.85 per pound now, but Congress is going to reduce it for us to 46 1/2 cents. How very nice that will be!

Congressmen, you are trying to take the matter of the collection of our taxes in your own hands, without knowing the condition of our trade, and the consequences will be a prohibition of production, which you will have to follow by an appropriation of \$10,000,000 for the starving human being under your care.

We have taxable property in Puerto Rico, we have taxable trades, and many other sources of revenue. But you cannot tax any crop more than it is worth, for then immediately the property becomes worthless, and no one will produce it except any tax on it.—San Juan (Puerto Rico) News.

**CONVENTION FOR FAILURE.**  
 Democratic success always means depression in business, man to thousands, the closing of factories in his country and increased activity for them in England, and the consequent filling of this country with idle men who want to be industrious but are debared by Democratic policies. So well is this understood that some years ago to say that a business enterprise had "gone Democratic" was recognized as the same thing as saying that it had failed.

The experience of the country with Republican prosperity following the long gloom of Democratic business depression all over the country has given emphasis to that saying.—Salt Lake City "Tribune."

**ABOLITION OF WAR.**  
 The "Social Democratic" platform, upon which Mr. Eugene V. Debs, of "buy a gun" fame, has been nominated for the Presidency, demands among other things "abolition of war so far as the United States are concerned, and the introduction of international arbitration instead."

We are under the impression that so far as the United States are concerned war has long been abolished. There has never been any but one war among these States, and it was ended thirty-five years ago. There has been no danger of a repetition of it, though Mr. Eugene V. Debs apparently tried to provoke one when he set himself up as a "president" of a foreign dignity and authority with the President of the United States and exhorted each of his followers to "buy a gun." We can see no such danger of instate war as would warrant making prohibition of it a live political issue.

So far as the United States are concerned, we should be glad to see war abolished. But we should also like to hear Mr. Debs and his fellow "Social Democrats" explain how it is to be done. "You may recollect till the cows come home," but here are you going to keep other nations from making war upon you? It would be easy to disband the Army and abolish the Navy, but the doing so would not preclude possible war for them. A nation may disarm itself and announce that in no case will it engage in war, but it cannot in that way make all other nations agree not to make war against it.

Some of the Republican papers are commenting on Governor Pingree's alleged candidacy for a seat in the United States senate as if it were treasonable for him to even think of such a thing as antagonizing Senator McMillan for the position.

We have a plan that the government will get the senatorship, but it has a perfect right to make a try for it. The seat Mr. McMillan holds is his by the gift of the people and they should take a notion to do it their own legal impediment in the way of their giving it to Pingree. Two years ago Pingree was the dominant influence in the Republican party in Michigan. He has grown no worse since and we are not sure that the party has grown any better, and if he was good enough to be its nominee for governor in 1898 he ought to be good enough to be permitted to be a candidate for the senatorship now.—Mining Journal.

The Lansing State Republican is out with a double headed editorial championing the cause of James S. Stearns for governor on the ground that election should this year decide the contest for the republican nomination. It holds that the candidates are worthy and able, and as Mr. Stearns belongs in the western part of the state, a section that has never yet been honored with the governorship, Stearns is naturally the man. Taking it for granted that this is good logic, and certainly lacks all right, the Upper Peninsula candidate will have a good chance of riding into Lansing on the chariot which Mr. Stearns' friends are evidently going to build.

The Upper Peninsula has never been honored with a governor and certainly few people can be found who will not concede that by reason of its wealth and great area it is entitled to the honor. Chase S. Osborn is a candidate not only above reproach, but the equal in ability and energy to any candidate now seeking the honor mentioned. In one respect he is in a better position than any of his competitors. He is making a fair fight, and has earned the respect and friendliness of all the other candidates. "This condition of affairs will be of special value," will be said by the many candidates and where a strong second choice man will likely carry off the price.—Mining Gazette.

## THE LATEST FOREIGN DISPATCHES

**FIFTY-SIXTH CONGRESS.**  
The legislative, executive and judicial appropriation bills were reported to the United States senate on the 15th and the Porto Rico tariff bill was introduced in the house on the 16th.

Bills were introduced in the United States senate on the 14th requiring railroads to report details of operations to passengers and providing for pensions for government employes. The Philippine question was further discussed. In the house the District of Columbia appropriation bill was taken up, and under the latitude allowed the Nicaragua canal, the Philippine question and the advisability of electing senators by the people were discussed.

Bills were introduced in the United States senate on the 16th to prevent the exportation of gold, and for the opening of libraries in Manila. The Porto Rico appropriation bill was further discussed. In the house resolution was introduced proposing a constitutional amendment giving congress power to control trusts. The District of Columbia appropriation bill, carrying \$5,605,378, was passed.

**FROM WASHINGTON.**  
A counterfeited five-dollar silver certificate, serial 1550, check letter B, plate number 20, has been discovered. It was issued in Washington in the name of Charles P. Hengeshack, a mail carrier, and fatally wounded the child of Mrs. Hengeshack.

The president has affixed his signature to the financial bill, thus making it a law.

**THE EAST.**  
In a tenement house fire in Newark, N. J., 14 lives were lost. The death of Mr. Thomas K. Hecker, a prominent citizen of Hartford, Conn., aged 94 years.

At Indianapolis, C. B. Cones & Son, manufacturers of clothing, suffered a loss of \$150,000 by fire.

Flames ruined the plant of the Davenport (Ia.) Canning company, the loss being \$1,000,000.

The death of Herman Determan, editor of the Columbus Westlake, one of the largest German papers in the country, occurred at Columbus, O., aged 55 years.

Fire destroyed the big Rothchild-toledo warehouse at Miami Beach, O., the loss being \$150,000.

# SESSION ENDS

Kentucky Legislature Adjourns After Two-Week Session.

Frankfort, Ky., March 11.—The legislature of Kentucky adjourned sine die Tuesday. A conference between Maj. Gen. Culler and Culler and Culler resulted in a perfect understanding being reached. Gov. 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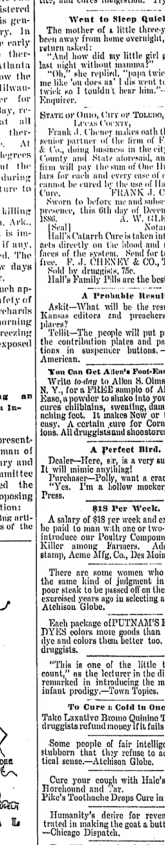
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# MAP OF POSITIONS OF BRITISH IN SOUTH AFRICA
