### THE TOWNSHIP ELECTIONS.

DEVELOPED WAS A BETER COUNTY-- ESPECIALLY SO IN INWOOD, SENECA, DOYLE AND GERRY TOWNSHIPS.

THE REPUBLICANS HAVE A MAJORITY ON THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS.

Judge Sweet Ran on Slips and Nearly Defeated N. L. Stevens, the Republican Nominee for Supervisor in Inwood.

Notwithstanding the fact that in many of the township only one ticket was in the field yet a heavy vote was polled throughout the county.

In Doyle, Haworth, Thompson and Harrison townships one column ballots were styled yet slips were used in three of the townships mentioned and in several cases the regular nominees received very small majorities.

In Manistiquie Township the Democratic ticket was more or less of a skeleton on account of the withdrawal of a number of the candidates and the Republican candidates were allocated by handsome majorities. The vote follows:

SENECA TOWNSHIP.  
The People's ticket headed by Supervisor James Harcourt was elected by a handsome majority. Harcourt received 30 straight votes while his opponent received 25. In the "split" Harcourt's majority was reduced to twenty. Although a bitter warfare was waged against "him" his majority is greater this year than it was last spring.

### DOYLE TOWNSHIP.

Although there was only one ticket in the field a bitter warfare was waged on slips against three of the candidates. Judge Sweet received 22 votes for supervisor while the regular nominee, X. L. Nevoaux, received 37. For clerk, Geo. H. Russell, received 14 votes, while A. L. Lundberg received 19. Frank Muller ran on slips against John Johnson, candidate for highway commissioner. Johnson received 39 votes and Muller 25. The balance of the ticket received 65 votes. Fourteen ballots without a mark on them were thrown out. As the votes of these evidently intended to vote a straight ballot and forgot to place the cross in the circle at the head of the ticket, the majorities on the constable slips would have been much greater.

X. L. Nevoaux who was re-elected supervisor is an honest and conscientious official, and the taxpayers of the township, of which he is one of the best, deserve credit for re-electing him. The heavy expenditures of the previous township board for machinery and the fact that an uncertain tax was levied prior to his election last year, made an increase in his salary necessary last year. The fact that this was done was used against him at the polls Monday.

In Harrison township 32 votes cast on which 22 were straight and ten on one or two were thrown out on account of being marked with "O."

In Inwood township there was a three-cornered fight, and Gray was out for supervisor. He had no opponent to run for.

### MRS. ELIZABETH McLELLAN DEAR.

Peter of Coate, Ind., and William of Middletown, Ind. The deceased was a consistent member of the Baptist church and was universally beloved by all. Short funeral services conducted by Rev. J. C. Rowney were held at her home at six o'clock yesterday morning after which the remains were taken to Erin, Ont., the birthplace of the deceased, for burial. Miss Mary and John accompanied them.
