The bill of the Manistique Light Co. for \$104.14 was allowed.

Paul Greenwood was given the contract for sprinkling the streets this summer and is to receive \$300 per month, and the village president is to designate the time when contract shall commence and end.

Geo. H. Orr and A. S. Patina were elected members of the board of review by the council.

The salaries of the officials of the village were fixed as follows:

Chief of the fire department, \$200; an increase of \$100 a year.

The council as a whole will act as the street committee.

### HAS FAITH IN THE TOWN.

Harry Rose, Purchaser of the C. C. Co. of the Property between the Corner of Cedar and Oak Streets and the Western Building.

One of the largest deals in real estate ever consummated in the city was completed last Saturday and whereby Mr. Harry Rose acquires the lots located between the Bestman building and the corner of Cedar and Oak streets.

The purchase price is not stated but must be large as the property in question is the most desirable vacant business property in the city.

It is Mr. Rose's intention to erect a modern two story building on the corner lot the coming summer and the operations will begin shortly after May 1st.

The building will be a credit to the town, and will be occupied by Rose Bros. for store purposes.

Ten years ago Harry and Leo Rose became identified with the business interests of Manistique. They began business in a modest way in the Coon building. Their business increased to such an extent that in a few years they were compelled to seek larger quarters and the hand the handsome and commodious brick block they are at present occupying was erected by them.

Increasing business compels them for the second time to seek larger quarters and how the demand will be met has its sequel in the purchase made last Saturday.

The building in question will be 60 feet wide and 125 feet deep and two stories high.

Mr. Rose thinks that Manistique has a bright future before it, and in this he is not mistaken. There has been a steady upward growth during the past decade and indications point to a continuance of same. He is to be congratulated on securing the property in question.

Mrs. E. A. Whitney's death.

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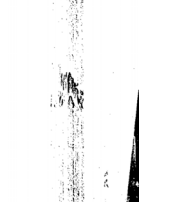
