CHASE OSBORN COMES.

Chase S. Osborn, railroad commissioner of Michigan, was the happiest man among the arrivals. He says he feels especially at home in Milwaukee and was glad to get here to visit his old friends in the newspaper business. Mr. Osborn is one of six candidates for the Republican nomination for governor of Michigan. The nominating convention will be held probably in Detroit in the latter part of June, though that is not settled as yet. The call has been issued. Mr. Osborn says that he has the solid support of the upper peninsula of Michigan, which is a third of the area of the state if not a third of the population, and he has some scattering support in the lower peninsula. Mr. Osborn was appointed railroad commissioner of Michigan by Gov. Pingree.—Evening Wisconsin.

MR. OSBORN SAYS HE IS NOT MAKING AN AGGRESSIVE CAMPAIGN IN THE SENSE OF TRYING TO SECURE THE ELECTION OF DELEGATES TO HIM BY WORKING UP SUPPORT THROUGH THE EMPLOYMENT OF PROFESSIONAL MANIPULATORS OF CAUSES AND CONVENTIONS.

He has strong assurances of a good support from all parts of the state, and believes that he stands an excellent chance of winning out, owing to the turn the contest for the nomination has taken, if he is given the support he thinks he is entitled to in this peninsula.

Mr. Osborn is not making war on any of the other candidates, or seeking to belittle their qualifications for the office or claims on the party. But the struggle between Messrs. Ferry, Stearns and Bliss is taking such form that there is a probability of a dead-lock coming in the convention which may make it necessary to go outside of the three to find the nominee. If that happens Mr. Osborn believes that, with a solid upper peninsula delegation backing him, he will have a good show of being the choice of the convention, for he will have strong backing from the lower part of the state.

It seems to The Mining Journal that the Republicans of this peninsula will make a serious mistake if they do not back Mr. Osborn loyally for the first place on the ticket. They have the best chance to get an upper peninsula man nominated for governor this year that they have ever had, or will have again, for years, and it should not be lightly thrown away. If the nomination should fall to some of the other candidates the convention can still easily secure its proportion of places on the ticket, but the greater recognition is what they should strive for first.

Of Mr. Osborn's qualifications for the governorship there is no question, nor is there any doubt of the advantage it would be to this peninsula to have him chosen to fill that office. The duty of the Republicans of this district is plain for themselves and we have faith to believe that they will discharge it with loyal regard for the interests of the peninsula and appreciation of the claims of Mr. Osborn on their friendship.

There is much fuller sentiment in Schoolcraft county and it looks as though a delegation favorable to him would be named. Baker sentiment is as dead as a smelt in the county.

Manistique has a gilt-edged reputation all over the upper peninsula as being one of the very best towns for its size in the state. The point has been raised that Michigan's celebrated tax commission may not have a legal right to be inquiring into the affairs of property owners, says Hon. Ore. "It is said the senate never confirmed the appointment of the commission, or in any way assented in its formation. When originally appointed the senate rejected the list. Then again appointed the commission. They serving until the extra session of the legislature. 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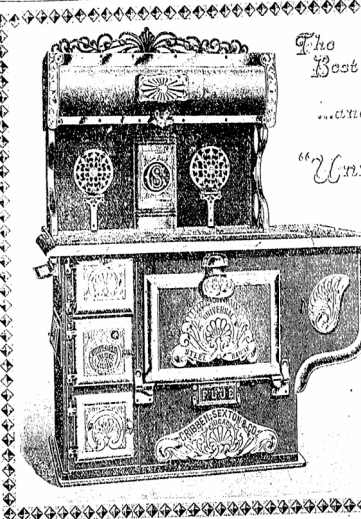
